**CINCINNATI** -- Robert Taft Jr., former United States Senator and Congressman, died at Jewish Hospital here Tuesday from a cerebral hemorrhage. He was 76.

Sen. Taft served in the U.S. Senate from 1971-76 and in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1963-64 and 1967-70. He was a member of the House Republican leadership and helped to lead the effort to enact the Civil Rights Act of 1964. In the Senate, he wrote legislation to extend the National Labor Relations Act to health care workers and co-authored the War Powers Act of 1973. Sen. Taft served on the Senate Armed Services, Labor and Public Welfare, and Banking, Currency and Housing committees.

Before entering Congress, Sen. Taft served in the Ohio House of Representatives for eight years (1955-62) where he was elected Majority Floor Leader (1961-62).

Sen. Taft graduated from Yale University and Harvard Law School and practiced law with the Cincinnati-based firm of Taft, Stettinius & Hollister where he was a partner until his retirement in 1988.

During World War II, Sen. Taft was an ensign in the Navy on active duty from 1942-46 and participated in landings at Sicily, Salerno, Normandy, Guadalcanal and Okinawa.

Sen. Taft was born February 26, 1917 in Cincinnati and grew up here. He is the son of U.S. Sen. Robert A. Taft and grandson of President William Howard Taft.

He is survived by his wife, Joan McKelvy Taft, and his children by his first wife, the late Blanca Noel Taft. His sons and daughters are Bob Taft, who is Ohio Secretary of State; Jonathan Taft of Chicago, Ill.; Sara Taft Jones of New York City; and Deborah Taft Boutellis of Loches, France. He has six grandchildren.

The memorial service will be at 3:30 p.m. Thursday at Armstrong Chapel United Methodist Church, 5125 Drake Road (corner of Drake and Indian Hill roads), Cincinnati. The burial ceremony will be private at Indian Hill Church.

### Robert Taft Jr. Dies; Senator From Ohio

Robert A. Taft Jr., 76, an Ohio Republican who was a former congressman and senator and who was the son of a U.S. senator and grandson of a president of the United States, died Dec. 7 at a hospital in Cincinnati. He had been in a coma since having a stroke Nov. 29.

Sen. Taft's grandfather, William Howard Taft, was president of the United States from 1909 to 1913 and chief justice of the United States from 1921 to 1930. Sen. Taft's father, Robert Sr., was Republican majority leader of the U.S. Senate at his death in 1953 and had lost the 1952 presidential nomination to Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Sen. Taft served in the Ohio House of Representatives from 1955 to 1962 and was its majority floor leader in 1961 and 1962. He served in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1963 to 1965, and again from 1967 to 1971. He served a single six-year term in the U.S. Senate and was defeated for reelection in 1976 by Howard M. Metzenbaum (D), who still holds the seat.

In the House, he worked for passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. In the Senate, he helped write legislation expanding the National Labor Relations Act to cover health care workers. He also advocated amnesty programs for those who had avoided the draft in opposition to the Vietnam War.

His Senate committee assignments included the Armed Services, Labor and Public Welfare, and Joint Economic committees.

Robert Alphonso Taft Jr. was born in Cincinnati. He was a 1939 graduate of Yale University and a 1942 graduate of Harvard University law school. He served in the Navy during World War II, participating in landings in Sicily and at Salerno, Normandy, Guadalcanal and Okinawa.

In 1946, he began practicing law in Cincinnati. When his father died, "Young Bob" spurned pleas from Ohio Republicans that he run for the vacant Senate seat on his name alone. He said he believed he needed more experience before seeking a Senate seat, which he acknowledged he might do in the future.

After service in the state legislature and the U.S. House, he made his first bid for a Senate seat in 1964. That year, President Lyndon B. Johnson carried Ohio by a landslide and much of the Democratic ticket with him. Sen. Taft narrowly lost the Senate race to the Democratic incumbent, Stephen Young.

In 1970, Sen. Taft ran again. He defeated Gov. James A. Rhodes in the Republican primary by 472,000 votes to 466,000. He then defeated Metzenbaum (who was to defeat him six years later) with 51 percent of the vote.

After leaving the Senate, he practiced law in Washington and Cincinnati until retiring in 1988. He had been a partner in the Cincinnati law firm of Taft, Stettinius & Hollister.

Survivors include his wife, four children and six grandchildren. A son, Bob Taft, is Ohio's secretary of state.

# Robert Taft Jr., 76, an Ex-Senator And Heir to Ohio G.O.P. Dynasty

Robert Taft Jr., a former United States Representative and Senator who was the grandson of a President and the son of a Presidential contender, died on Monday at Jewish Hospital in Cincinnati. He was 76.

The Cincinnati Enquirer said he had a stroke on Nov. 29.

Mr. Taft, a scion of a wealthy Ohio family that helped define Republican politics in the United States for more than a century, never sought to follow in his grandfather's or father's quest for the White House.

He was the great-grandson of Alphonso Taft, who served as Attorney General and as Secretary of War under President Ulysses S. Grant in 1876; the grandson of William Howard Taft, who was President of the United States from 1909 to 1913 and Chief Justice of the United States from 1921 to 1930, and the son of Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, who unsuccessfully sought the Republican nomination for President in 1948 and again in 1952.

## Reluctant Politician

Robert A. Taft Jr., who did not have a middle name, was often called "Young Bob" to distinguish him from his father. The younger Mr. Taft won four terms in the Ohio Legislature and ran for national office six times, serving as a Representative from Ohio for three terms and as a Senator for one term, yet early on he seemed to be a reluctant politician.

When his father died in 1953, leaving his Senate seat vacant, the younger Mr. Taft rejected pleas by Republicans that he seek the seat, saying he lacked the necessary experience.

"I never tried to pattern myself after my father," he said after losing his last campaign, a bid for re-election in 1976, to Howard M. Metzenbaum, a Democrat who, at 76, is retiring from the Senate when his term expires next year.

From 1977 to 1988, when Mr. Taft retired, he was a partner in the Cincinnati law firm of Taft, Stettinius & Hol-

nati law firm of Taft, Stettinius & Hollister.

Mr. Taft, a graduate of Yale University and Harvard Law School, began his political career in 1954, when he was elected to the Ohio House of Representatives. He was elected to Congress in 1962 and two years later made an unsuccessful run for the Senate.

He was again elected to Congress in 1966 and re-elected in 1968. Two years later he made another bid for the Senate and this time was successful, defeating Gov. James Rhodes in the Republican primary and Mr. Metzenbaum in the general election.

In his six years as a Senator, Mr. Taft served on the Armed Services, the Labor and Public Welfare, and the Banking, Currency and Housing committees. He helped write legislation to extend the National Labor Relations Act to health care workers.

He is survived by his wife, Joan; four children, including a son, Bob, who is Ohio's Secretary of State, and six grandchildren.
