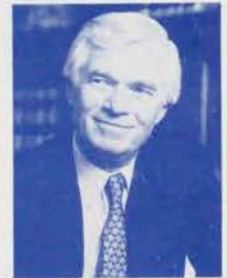

THAD COCHRAN

UNITED STATES SENATOR • MISSISSIPPI



U.S. Senator, Thad Cochran is serving his third term in the U.S. Senate from Mississippi. He first ran for that seat in 1978 and was the first Republican in over 100 years to win a statewide election in Mississippi, and re-elected without opposition in 1990, and is third in the Senate GOP leadership ranks. He is a member of the Committees on Appropriations, Agriculture and Forestry, Governmental Affairs, Rules and Indian Affairs.

Born in Pontotoc, Mississippi, Thad found time for sports, music, Boy Scouts and church activities while maintaining a high grade average in school. He attended the National Boy Scout Jamboree, Valley Forge, Pa., in 1950 and later became an Eagle Scout. In high school, Thad earned varsity letters in football, basketball, baseball and tennis. He gave a piano and voice recital his senior year and was class valedictorian. He was also an active 4-H Club member.


He worked at a variety of after-school and weekend jobs that ranged from "car hop" to helping on the family's 200 acre cattle farm. While an undergraduate at "Ole Miss" he majored in psychology with a minor in political science. He was also a company commander in the Navy ROTC, Head Cheerleader and Vice President of the Student Body. During the summers he worked as a lifeguard.

After graduation he served in the Navy for two years, part of those as a ship's legal officer because of his graduation with honors from the Navy's School of Justice in Newport, Rhode Island.

In 1961 he enrolled in law school at the University of Mississippi, winning the Frederick Hamel Memorial Award for having the highest scholastic average in the first class year. This honor was the first of many during his law school years, including a membership on the staff of the Mississippi Law Journal. Before graduating from law school, he was awarded a Rotary Foundation Graduate Fellowship and studied jurisprudence and international law at Trinity College, University of Dublin, Ireland.

During the 1960's he became active in the burgeoning Civil Rights movement in Mississippi and later was involved in the 1968 Presidential campaign as executive Director of Mississippi Citizens for Nixon and Agnew. Four years later he ran for his first public office as a member of the U.S. House of Representatives.

Thad and his wife Rose have two children, Clayton and Kate.

THE KANSAS DAY CLUB

FROM THE BEGINNING . . .

The political climate was such that in late 1891, four Kansas newspaper men felt obligated to meet and discuss the fate of the Republican Party in Kansas. The four "founding fathers" included Harry W. Frost, Topeka, first president of the Kansas Day Club, C. M. Harger, Abilene, Ewing Herbert, Hiawatha and more notably, William Allen White* of Emporia.

The Kansas Day Club's first meeting was originally scheduled for the first week in January, 1892, but respect dictated a delay because of the death of Senator B. Plumb of Emporia. It was quite by coincidence that the replacement date chosen fell on the anniversary of Kansas' statehood. The banquet has been held every year since 1892, except in 1945 because of World War II.

The first meeting was attended by 105 young Republicans. Harry Frost attributed the Club's successful start to the "tendency of birds and men to flock together."

In his address to the second annual meeting in 1893, Mr. Frost said the mission of the Kansas Day Club was: "To promote Republicans, and to call together in a social way, upon the anniversaries of Kansas' admission into the Union, the Republicans of the State."
