

F or 54 years, The Junior Statesmen Summer School has offered a rigorous academic challenge to outstanding high school students. The curriculum includes a systematic introduction to American government and politics, an exciting high level speakers program, and student debates on current issues (Congressional Workshop).

The collegiate academic environment stresses substantial reading, research, and writing. Classes are held six days a week. Students reside in university dormitories and use campus classrooms and libraries.

The Summer School faculty of outstanding professors is recruited from universities around the country. The faculty, counselors, and administrators all live on campus with the students and are responsible for academic and personal counseling as well as supervision.

There are four sessions of The Junior Statesmen Summer School. Approximately 270 students will be selected to attend the Georgetown University session; 250 students will be selected to attend the Stanford University session; 130 students will be selected to attend the session at Yale University; and 90 students will be selected to attend The Junior Statesmen Summer School session at The University of Texas at Austin.

The classes in American Government and Economics are equivalent to a one-semester Advanced Placement course. With a satisfactory score on the Advanced Placement Exam, students also earn college credit. The Speech Communication course is equivalent to a onesemester high school Honors speech or Honors English elective.

> Following the session, transcripts are sent to the graduates, and to their high schools, upon request. In advance of the Summer School, if high school credit is desired, you should make arrangements with appropriate officials at your school.

> On each campus during Summer School, interested students may attend a special orientation session offered by undergraduate admissions officials who will answer questions about admissions, financial aid, SAT scores, housing, and campus life.

> The total cost of tuition, which includes room and board, textbooks, and all other academic expenses, is \$2,175. Partial scholarships are available. See pages 16 and 17 for scholarship details.

Washington, D.C. Session What's it really like?

F or three weeks over the summer, I flew across country just to go to summer school! That's right...summer school. Why, you might ask, did I do such a thing? This was no ordinary summer school.

The Junior Statesmen Summer School is a program for elite high school students who show leadership ability in and out of the classroom. About 270 students from across the U.S. (including Guam and American Samoa) attended at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C.

Georgetown University is awesome. Every building is gothic and huge; the campus is like its own little city. We lived in a real Georgetown dormitory, ate in the same cafeteria as such legends as Bill Clinton and Patrick Ewing, and saw the Exorcist steps. We took classes in American Government or U.S. Foreign Policy, taught by real college professors. My professor happened to hail from the University of California at Berkeley, and trust me...you could tell.

Along with the classes, we participated in "Congressional Workshop", which is a classy name for student debates. Basically, we were split into congressional houses of 30 students. To start the debate, student congressmen and women from the pro and con sides of the issue gave 6-minute opening speeches, followed by questions from the members of the house. Next, house members expressed their own opinions in impromptu speeches. After closing speeches by the first two speakers, we'd vote on the issue.

Another fun part of the program was the speaker days when the whole group met with Clinton officials, Members of Congress, lobbyists, and reporters. Some significant speakers were Congressman Barney Frank, Edwin Meese, III, Reagan's Attorney General and right hand man, Brian Lamb of C-SPAN, and Supreme Court Justice Anthony M. Kennedy.

It was a big thrill when Justice Kennedy came into the room. We were supposed to meet with his

law clerk. All of a sudden, there I was in the Supreme Court Chambers an arm's length away from a man who is on the court for life. He is one of nine judges who interpret the Constitution and protect our rights. He was a pretty cool guy.

Junior Statesmen pretty much had the run of the Capitol. Some of my friends sat in on confirmation hearings for Judge Ruth Bader Ginsburg. A few kids ran into Mrs. Clinton and shook her hand. One of my classmates found the secret Capitol office of the Vice President. Some students ran into President Clinton, Al Gore and George Stephanopoulos in the basement of the Rayburn Building when they were on the Hill lobbying for the President's budget. That was a massive rush.

Junior Statesmen Summer School was more than just classroom and textbook learning. It was interesting because of the different kinds of people. There were students from the Virgin Islands, New Jersey, Florida, California, and one guy from Alaska. I was just completely blown away when he said that when the temperature gets to 60 degrees below zero they cancel school!

Junior Statesmen Summer School is a wonderful program. If you have any questions, I'd be glad to stop what I'm doing and talk to you. I consider myself to be a reasonably nice guy.

Many come to study in the world famous Stirling Memorial Library which houses 8 million books—making it the fourth largest collection in the country and the sixth largest in the world. If you love politics and want to learn more, or if you are nervous about speaking before a group, this program will give you the knowledge, skills and the self confidence you need. At the end of the month, we guarantee that you will be a more effective leader and a much more dynamic and confident public speaker.

Your Speakers Program will focus on Texas state politics and current issues as you question legislators, statewide elected officials, lobbyists, judges and journalists. These lively,

off the record, question and answer sessions will be held in the State Capitol Building and nearby government buildings, just minutes from your dorm.

The highlight of the program last summer was an opportunity for Summer School students to witness the swearing in ceremony for the Texas State Treasurer. Following the ceremony, which was conducted in the Chambers of the House of Representatives, Governor Ann Richards met with Junior Statesmen and engaged in a lively question and answer session.

The University of Texas is an ideal location for the Summer School. Sprawling across 300 acres in central Austin, the campus is a bee-hive of activity during the summer attracting scholars and visitors from around the world. Many come to study in the eighth largest academic library in the country.

Also located on campus is the Lyndon Baines Johnson Presidential Library and Museum. Your special tour will include colorful highlights of Johnson's state and national political campaigns. You will see the Viet Nam War exhibit and "Great Society" collection giving you and your classmates a glimpse into the controversial decade of the 1960s. Also at the L.B.J. Museum you will see an exact replica of the Oval Office during the Johnson administration and a rock brought back from the moon. In the L.B.J. Library, scholars engaged in research will share with you their insights on the modern American presidency.

Tuition

Tuition, room and board at the Georgetown, Stanford, Yale, and University of Texas sessions is \$2.175. This covers:

Tuition, textbooks, and all other academic expenses, and

Housing and meals. Students are housed two to a room on single sex floors in university student residences. Meals are eaten in university dining rooms.

In Washington, D.C., because you are off campus so many days for the speakers program, you will need to bring money to pay for fifteen off campus meals. All other meals are provided.

At the Stanford Summer School, you will need to bring money to pay for meals while you are in San Francisco for the optional oneday cultural excursion. All other meals are provided.

At the Yale Summer School,

you will need to bring money to pay for meals for one day while you are in New York City. All other meals are provided.

At the Texas Summer School, you will need to bring money to pay for six lunches eaten off campus on speaker program days. All other meals are provided.

Special Group Field Trips

Georgetown Summer School: As part of the speakers program, you will travel by chartered bus to the Capitol Building, Pentagon, State Department, Supreme Court and other Washington locations. At the end of the session, you will enjoy a moonlight bus tour of the most famous national monuments.

Stanford Summer School:

You will travel to San Francisco where you will enjoy historical and cultural attractions.

THE JUNIOR STATESMEN SUMMER SCHOOL

Yale Summer School: As part of the speakers program, you will travel by chartered bus to New York City where you will question exciting guest speakers and enjoy historical and cultural attractions.

Texas Summer School: As part of the speakers program, you will meet in the State Capitol Building and L.B.J. Presidential Library with guest speakers and scholars and for special orientations.

Transportation to the Summer School is not provided. However, Summer School staff members will meet arriving students at nearby airports and transport them to campus. At the conclusion of the sessions, Summer School students are transported by chartered buses to these airports for their flights home. The Junior Statesmen staff will be happy to answer any questions you may have about transportation arrangements.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT AMERICAN GOVERNMENT

Offered at: Stanford, Yale, and Texas

This course is a college-level introduction to the dynamics of the American political system. It is designed to fulfill state educational requirements and to prepare students for the Advanced Placement Examination in American Government and Politics

Through lectures, college texts, and discussions, this course helps you understand the basic operating principles of politics and government as it presents several theoretical and analytic models for understanding the process of American politics at the state and national levels. You are taught to analyze critically the American political system as you examine the roles played by democracy. political thought, and the Constitution. The structure and function of courts, interest groups, political parties, the Presidency, Congress, and the bureaucracy are thoroughly explored. The role of each of these institutions in the policy-making process is examined through the use of case studies of major policy issues in society.

You take three essay examinations and complete a 12-15 page college-level research paper on an issue in American politics. Your research is supervised by the Government faculty and requires extensive use of the university library. Classes are held six days a week. The class is offered for high school credit and is equivalent to a one-semester Advanced Placement American Government course. Students are in class for a total of 85 hours.

Offered at: Georgetown

An identical Advanced Placement American Government course is offered. This session is extremely demanding since it is one week shorter and has an extensive speakers program on Capitol Hill. You must cover course material rapidly. To complete your term paper successfully, you will interview government officials, lobbyists, journalists, or others who play a role in your topic. You will read a college text before arriving in Washington. Georgetown is designed for older, academically advanced students. To succeed, you must be self-disciplined and socially mature. Students are in class for a total of 100 hours. Prerequisite: Georgetown students must have experience writing term papers.

SPEECH COMMUNICATION

Offered at: Stanford, Yale, and Texas

In four intensive weeks of instruction, you are exposed to the fundamental elements of speech communication through a university level course emphasizing the practical use of communication theory through public speaking. Classical and modern communication theories are covered. Fundamentals of persuasion and argumentation are stressed with particular emphasis given to standards of logic and proof.

In addition to perfecting your speech delivery, you will study organization-retention techniques. critical thinking, and audience analysis as part of your speech assignments. During the month, you are required to give at least four prepared and several impromptu speeches. A full sentence outline is required for every speech. Extensive experience is provided in oral and written critiques of speakers.

Classes are held six days a week. While this class is offered for high school credit, it is taught at the university level and is equivalent to a onesemester Honors Speech class or a one-semester Honors English elective. Students are in class for a total of 85 hours.

PUBLIC SPEAKING AND THE LAW

Offered at: Yale

This second semester, university level course, exposes you to the fundamental elements of speech communication by emphasizing the practical use of communication theory through public speaking. Classical and modern communication theories are covered. When taken together with Constitutional Law, this course will extend your understanding of the fundamentals of persuasion and argumentation with particular emphasis given to standards of logic and proof.

Significant outside readings and written work are assigned. In addition to perfecting speech delivery, you study organization, critical thinking and audience analysis. You will give at least four prepared and several impromptu speeches. To extend your understanding of the law, one speech assignment will simulate a courtroom presentation.

Classes are held six days a week. While this class is offered for high school credit, it is taught at college level and is equivalent to a semester Honors Advanced Speech class or English elective. You are in class for a total of 85 hours. Prerequisite: You must have successfully completed a college speech course or Speech Communication at a previous Junior Statesmen summer session

You will study fundamental elements of speech communication through a curriculum divided between theory and practical use of the theory through public speaking. Significant outside readings and written work are assigned. In addition to perfecting speech delivery, you study organization, critical thinking and audience analysis. You will give at least four prepared and several impromptu speeches. Extensive experience is provided in oral and written critiques of speakers.

Classes are held six days a week. While this class is offered for high school credit, it is taught at college level and is equivalent to a semester Honors Advanced Speech class or English elective. You are in class for a total of 85 hours. Prerequisite: You must have successfully completed a college speech course or Speech Communication at a previous Junior Statesmen summer session.

UNITED STATES FOREIGN POLICY

Offered at: Georgetown

This advanced course is designed to meet second semester requirements of high schools offering a year long American Government course. Through lectures, college texts, and small group discussions, the course helps you understand how American foreign policy is made. Key themes of post-World War II American foreign policy are explored. Next, you focus on key issues and on America's role in a post-Cold War world.

You take two essay examinations and complete a 12-15 page analytic paper of university caliber to demonstrate your understanding of the foreign policy process in American government. This research is supervised by Foreign Policy faculty and requires extensive use of the Georgetown Library and personal interviews among the Washington foreign policy establishment.

Classes are held six days a week. While the class is offered for high school credit and is equivalent to a one-semester. Honors American Government course, it is taught at a much more advanced level. Students are in class for a total of 100 hours.

Prerequisite: You must be an incoming senior who has successfully completed high school American Government or a previous Junior Statesmen Summer School, and have experience writing term papers.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT ECONOMICS

Offered at: Stanford

This course is comparable to a one-semester university economics course, covering major economic theories and public policy analysis. It is designed to fulfill state educational requirements and to prepare students for the Advanced Placement Examination in both Micro- and Macro-Economics

Following an introductory section on the "economic way of thinking", you examine decision making by individuals, groups and organizations, with emphasis on how those decisions are made in a market economy. You review economic strategies and how voluntary exchanges between demanders and suppliers are seen as the foundation of the market system. In addition, you study the behavior of individual consumers and producers. The role of government is emphasized with discussion of market failure and the business cycle (swings in the economy's output rate, unemployment rate, foreign trade, and inflation rate). Particular attention is focused on the macroeconomic impact of the U.S. Treasury and Federal Reserve System. The course is enriched by a speakers program which gives you an opportunity to guiz scholars, government officials, and corporate leaders active in economic policy formation. Nobel Prize winning economists, Milton Friedman and Kenneth Arrow recently met for an hour with Stanford Summer School students.

You will take three essay examinations and complete a 12-15 page analytic paper of university caliber which demonstrates an understanding of economic policy generation. The paper involves independent research and extensive use of the Stanford Library. Research is closely supervised by the faculty. Classes are held six days a week. The class is offered for high school credit and is equivalent to a onesemester Advanced Placement Micro- and Macro-Economics course. Students are in class for a total of 85 hours.

Prerequisite: You must be an incoming senior who has successfully completed an Honors or Advanced Placement U.S. History course in high school or a previous Junior Statesmen Summer School session.

WHO MAY APPLY?

Any outstanding high school student may apply for admission as long as he/she will not be graduating from high school in June 1994.

HOW DO I APPLY FOR ADMISSION?

Applicants for admission should submit:

1. A personal essay, typed, double spaced, not longer than three pages or shorter than two pages, covering your academic achievements, academic and vocational aspirations, involvement in school and community activities, and interest or involvement in politics. Are you a leader? Please include examples of your leadership ability. This must be written in essay form.

- 2. An official high school transcript, which your school will send, on your request.
- 3. A recommendation from a Counselor or an English or Social Studies teacher. A form for this purpose is printed on page 21.

4. An application form, printed on page 15

Each element of your application should be mailed as soon as it is ready or available. Typically, when students decide to apply, they immediately mail in the application form and ask their school to send a copy of their transcript to The Junior Statesmen Foundation.

The personal essay and teacher recommendation form may be submitted separately. However, be sure that your name, along with the name of the Summer School session to which you are applying (e.g. Georgetown session), is listed on any materials sent in separately.

WHO IS ADMITTED?

Admission to the Summer School is competitive. No decision on admission can be made until all application materials have been received. Decisions are based on academic achievement, leadership ability, and interest in politics and government. A student is frequently stronger in one of these areas than others. Above all, Junior Statesmen Summer School students are intelligent. articulate student leaders who could benefit from this unique educational experience. Scholarships

he Junior Statesmen Foundation administers a Summer School Scholarship Fund of over \$125,000 to assist students who find the tuition to be a barrier. These funds were donated by Summer School alumni, businesses, government, and philanthropic foundations.

A Scholarship Committee, under the direction of Junior Statesmen Foundation Trustees, annually awards \$55,000 in partial scholarships from this fund using the following criteria: financial need, academic excellence, demonstrated leadership ability, and evidence that an applicant is highly motivated to attend.

Because the demand for Junior Statesmen Scholarships is so great, and because of its commitment to help as many students as possible, The Junior Statesmen Foundation rarely awards a full scholarship. However, each year, many students attend the program by combining a Junior Statesmen Scholarship with locally raised scholarships which together cover their full tuition.

ALICE TWEED TUOHY SCHOLARSHIPS

The Alice Tweed Tuohy Foundation has established an annual Scholarship Fund of \$30,000 to enable outstanding high school students to attend The Junior Statesmen Summer School. With the help of Tuohy grants, Junior Statesmen Summer School enrollment has increased from 46 students in 1975 to 648 students last year.

The Tuohy Scholarships are awarded by The Junior Statesmen Foundation on the basis of both academic merit and financial need. The Scholarship Committee is particularly interested in an applicant's academic excellence and demonstrated leadership ability.

SPECIAL STANFORD SCHOLARSHIPS

Under the terms of a special Junior Statesmen expansion grant, scholarships are available to outstanding sophomores who reside in the states of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin who are admitted to the Stanford Summer School. Scholarship decisions are based on academic merit, leadership potential, and financial need.

MEESE FAMILY MEMORIAL **SCHOLARSHIPS**

The Junior Statesmen Foundation uses the earnings from a \$73,000 endowment fund to provide Summer School scholarships. This fund was established in memory of Scott Robert Meese, Andrew Scott Meese, and Leone D. Meese.

Meese Scholarships are awarded by The Junior Statesmen Foundation to students who possess an outstanding academic record, a sense of compassion and concern for others. and an ability to achieve results through effective leadership.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR SCHOLARSHIPS

Through a grant from the United States Interior Department, students from each of five U.S. Territories may attend a Junior Statesmen Summer School session of their choice with a full scholarship. Outstanding student leaders from Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Republic of Palau, America Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas will be considered for these scholarships, which fully cover Summer School tuition and round trip air fare. These Interior Department-funded Scholarships are awarded by The Junior Statesmen Foundation.

With the help of the Interior Department Scholarships, Summer School enrollment from the U.S. Territories has increased from 11 students in 1991 to 84 students last summer

OTHER SCHOLARSHIPS

For more than ten years. The Ruth Eleanor and John Ernest Bamberger Foundation in Salt Lake City has provided Junior Statesmen Summer School scholarships. Outstanding students who attend high school in Utah are considered for these Bamberger Scholarships.

In addition, partial scholarships are available to outstanding students from the State of Oregon, and special Urban Scholarships are available to students who attend high school in Oakland, Los Angeles, or in the District of Columbia.

Many service clubs, community organizations and school sources also are able to provide scholarships to students in their area. School administrators, teachers, and The Junior Statesmen Foundation staff often are able to help arrange these scholarships. If you want

What Is Junior Statesmen?

Junior Statesmen, a nonpartisan program for high school students interested in public affairs, is designed to help young people develop the skills and knowledge necessary for effective civic leadership. Since the program was founded in 1934, more than 200,000 student members have gained an appreciation of the American system of law and democratic government.

Junior Statesmen is guided by a distinguished Board of Trustees which enjoys the support of political leaders from both parties, educators and civic-minded individuals, organizations and corporations. Although Junior Statesmen is headquartered in the West, students from throughout the country are active participants.



How Does The Program Work?

During the school year, students participate through school-sponsored Junior Statesmen chapters which are guided by volunteer teacher-advisers.

Each year, Junior State chapters participate in several regional and state conventions which feature student debates and offer participants the opportunity to meet and to question political leaders from both parties. These activities give students the chance to gain an understanding of the complexity of public issues, to sharpen their persuasive and analytic skills, and to develop a respect for the opinions of others.

The program is run essentially by high school students themselves. Junior State officers elected on the chapter, regional, state and national levels gain practical experience in the art of self-government. By facing the challenge of running their own program, students have the opportunity to make their own decisions and to see the consequences of those decisions. The Junior Statesmen concept is that democracy must be experienced to be fully understood and appreciated.

Junior Statesmen Summer Schools And Symposia

High school students are offered an advanced month-long academic program through Junior Statesmen Summer School sessions at Stanford University in California and at Georgetown University in Washington, D.C. The rigorous curriculum, taught by outstanding university professors, focuses on American government, leadership, public speaking and debate.

Admission to the Junior Statesmen Summer School is competitive and is based on the applicant's academic achievements and demonstrated leadership ability.

At the Washington Summer School, an extensive speakers program has included most members of President Ronald Reagan's Cabinet, as well as Democratic leaders of the House and Senate. Stanford Summer School students participate in a high-level speakers program in Sacramento, the capital of California.

Symposia on politics and government are conducted each summer in Southern and Northern California and in the states of Washington and Idaho. The California symposia examine the politics of local government, while the Washington and Idaho programs concentrate on state government and politics. The symposia include academic instruction as well as extensive speakers programs.

How Is Junior Statesmen Funded?

Community fundraising and student fees provide much of the income for the Junior Statesmen program. Taxdeductible contributions provide essential income for scholarships and fund the educational and administrative support provided by the Foundation's professional staff.

Many public-spirited corporations, foundations and individuals contribute each year. In addition, donations through bequests, endowments and deferred trusts are particularly encouraged.



New Santa Clara County Symposium Funded by Becky Morgan and Others

Former State Senator Becky Morgan has generously contributed \$25,000 to partially endow a day-long Symposium on Santa Clara Politics and Government. She is an avid supporter of the Junior Statesmen program deeming it "...a vital community asset for developing early interest and participation in our communities." The Symposium allows high school students the opportunity to discuss Santa Clara County issues with community leaders and to find out how they can become more involved in their area.

The First Annual Santa Clara County Symposium, held on May 4, was a phenomenal day with 200 high school students from all over the county participating. Speakers included Becky Morgan, Chairman of the Board of Supervisors Rod Diridon, Supervisor Ron Gonzales, Supervisor Mike Honda, Supervisor and Congressional Candidate Zoe Lofgren, District Attorney George Kennedy and Director of Strategic Planning Jan Decker. The students debated the merits of "Three Strikes and You're Out" and year-round schools. Finally, the participants experienced

working with the county administration through a problem-solving exercise. Students were given a challenge any citizen might encounter with government and then used county resources to solve their problem.

Senator Morgan's initial contribution launched an endowment campaign to ensure long-term funding of both this program and a similar Symposium on San Mateo County Politics and Government. Trustee and Congressman Norm Mineta is chairing the Santa Clara County campaign. T. Jack Foster, Jr. and Supervisor Ted Lempert are co-chairing the San Mateo campaign. In fact, virtually every Peninsula Junior Statesmen Foundation Trustee has gotten involved and the Peninsula students have lent their support as well. Student volunteers, recognizing the importance of this venture, contacted alumni in the area in an effort to gain their support in this campaign.

Junior Statesmen Summer School Held on Four Campuses

The key word in discussing the Junior Statesmen Summer School is growth. In recent vears, the Summer School has grown to encompass four locations and serve hundreds of students. Last summer, 648 students from all over the nation, including the United States Territories, experienced the excitement of Junior Statesmen Summer School.

Our youngest Summer School session, located at the University of Texas at Austin, has almost doubled in size, with 69 students last year. A three-year matching fund contribution from the Alice Tweed Tuohy Foundation played a significant role in the growth of this Summer School. Highlighting the session was the opportunity for the students to attend the swearing-in ceremony of Texas State Treasurer Margaret Whitehead, question and answer sessions with Chief Justice Tom Phillips of the Texas Supreme Court and Governor Ann Richards.

The Yale Summer School, founded in 1989, celebrated its fifth anniversary year with an enrollment of 103 students. The participants had the opportunity to spend a day in New York City where they heard a number of speakers at the

United Nations, The New York Times, and the MacNeil-Lehrer News Hour. This summer, Yale will add to its curriculum an advanced class in Constitutional Law, which will be the third advanced course option at Summer School. With the number of Junior State students who choose legal careers, this program promises to be a huge success.

Georgetown, our largest Summer School session, had its enrollment soar to 269 for the 1993 session. Students from thirty states and five territories spent three weeks in Washington, D.C. As always, the intensive speakers program highlighted this session as did the opportunity to visit the offices of hometown United States Senators and Representatives. The excitement surrounding the Clinton Administration also added an extra special element to last year's program.

Finally, the Stanford Summer School experienced an attendance surge that brought attendance up to 207 students. The advanced course in Economics, launched in 1991, celebrated its third vear as part of the session. As the highlight of the Stanford session speakers program, the students participated in an exclusive question and answer period with former Secretary of State George Shultz.

Overall, last year was a banner year for the Junior Statesmen Summer School. The Alice Tweed Tuohy Foundation has continued scholarship support by awarding a \$30,000 matching fund grant. In 1995, The Junior Statesmen Foundation will establish a fifth session of the Summer School on a Chicago area campus. The site will be announced as negotiations progress.

Urban Program on Track, J.S.A. Alumna Spearheads Effort


In 1992, the Junior State initiated a major effort to develop stronger urban chapters in Los Angeles. The urban program was initially funded by a two-year, \$85,000 grant from the James Irvine Foundation. To date, ten new innercity chapters have been established and are thriving. For example, one hundred ninety-six students from target schools attended the Southern California Fall State Convention and thirty-six students representing thirteen urban schools attended the Junior Statesmen Summer School in 1993.

The program is run primarily out of The Junior Statesmen Foundation's new Los Angeles office, which is staffed by Los Angeles Program Coordinator, Christine Robinson. She is a graduate of the University of California, Los Angeles and a Junior State alumna, a former President of the Convent of the Sacred Heart Chapter. One of Christine's pilot projects is the "Adopt a Sister Chapter" program. This program encourages students from new urban chapters to start a chapter at a neighboring school. She has also taken

advantage of the Los Angeles office's location to interact informally with the students on a daily basis. Christine and Southern California Program Director, Jeff Harris, hope to help the students start five additional urban chapters by the end of the 1994-95 school year.


