On Health Care: Start Over

A bad bill would be worse than no bill at all

THE BEST THING CONGRESS COULD DO NOW ON HEALTH care would be to start over next year. The most important social legislation in a quarter century should not be approved as a last-minute, poorly understood patchwork. From the start, the debate has suffered from the Clintons' wild promises that they could achieve "universal coverage" at little extra cost. This has produced five inconsistent congressional bills that all—in one way or another—fantasize a health-care future that will never happen.

Health politics has become bumper-sticker politics. Everything is being done for image and immediate bragging rights. Vast promises are made of new benefits with little effective control on cost. Health spending already constitutes 21 percent of federal spending and one seventh of all spending in the economy. The danger of a poorly crafted program is that, although it might be "popular in the short-run, [it] could encumber our economy with long-term commitments that we simply cannot afford," warns the bipartisan Committee for a Responsible Federal Budget.*

What really is at stake is the integrity of government. Popular cynicism is no secret. In surveys, Americans express discontent with government. Yet surveys also show that Americans want more from government in the way of health care, education, environmental protection and economic security. Politicians pander to the inconsistencies by posing government as a "solution" to a multitude of problems. The Clintons are practitioners of this style of politics. The trouble is that when the "solutions" don't match the promises, public disillusion deepens.

"Universal coverage" is a swell slogan but a meaningless concept. Almost no one today has complete insurance coverage against all health risks. For example, only about 5 percent of the elderly have insurance for long-term care. And the idea that complete coverage can be constructed is a mirage, because health care is an infinitely elastic concept. It expands with every new technology, drug or discovered ailment. Consider: between 1982 and 1991, the number of cornea transplants doubled, from 18,500 to 41,400. We will never be able to afford everything; some rationing, by income or availability, will always exist.

What the debate skirted is the morally awkward issue of whether health care is a "right"—and if so, what care is a "right." The Clintons evaded this question by promising to control costs and expand benefits. The claim was always dubious. Five outside groups re-estimated the Clintons' "basic package" of insurance benefits. All found higher costs than the White House did. For individual coverage, the costs were put from 9 to 26 percent higher; for two-parent families, the costs were 13 to 59 percent higher. No matter. The Clintons set Congress's agenda.

How bad are the resulting bills? Examine the Senate Finance Committee bill, described as "moderate." Its goal is to raise the share of Americans with insurance to 95 percent by the year

2002. Small firms with fewer than 100 workers could buy health insurance from big purchasing cooperatives. Insurers would have to accept almost anyone who applied. There would be insurance subsidies for everyone with an income of up to twice the poverty line (in 1992, the poverty line for a family of four was \$14,335). What are the bill's defects? Herewith the top three:

(1) **It creates a huge 'off budget' entitlement.** True, the bill doesn't compel companies to buy insurance. But it does decree what all insurance must cover, and the coverage is lavish. Aside from most doctor and hospital bills, it also includes mental health, rehabilitation services, drug- and alcohol-abuse services, hospice care and family-planning services. Although a National Health Board would set the details, Congress would have the final say. And it has little reason to resist inevitable demands for new benefits, because "mandates" could be expanded without imposing new taxes.

(2) **There is no effective cost control.** Indeed, because the bill mandates comprehensive insurance, it would probably accelerate spending. The new spending pressures would overwhelm the tiny measures intended to curb costs: putting small companies in buying pools; and a complex, probably unworkable tax on "high priced" insurance plans.

(3) **Subsidies for the poor aren't financed.** No one yet knows how much the subsidies would cost, but the tax increases in the bill (the cigarette tax goes from \$0.24 a pack to \$1.24 a pack) might cover only half the amount.

In short, the Finance bill would probably speed up health spending, skimp on subsidies and miss its 95 percent coverage target. Other bills are as bad or worse. The House Ways and Means Committee wants bigger mandates and subsidies. It pays for its subsidies mainly from "savings" generated by price and spending controls. But no one knows whether the controls would work or be acceptable. A "single payer" bill has

the honesty of avoiding mandates and pays for government insurance with taxes. However, benefits are so generous that, by one estimate, they would raise health spending by an extra \$300 billion by the year 2000. The increase is assumed away with cost controls.

All these bills indulge in make-believe. Although they sound good, they would break down in practice. A sensible bill might be put together with some modest insurance reforms. But this seems unlikely, precisely because it would be so politically unexciting. What should not be forgotten in the inevitable clamor to "do something" is that a bad bill would be worse than no bill at all. Opposing such a bill is prudence, not obstructionism.

The country deserves a more candid debate than Congress can provide this year. It is between those who consider health care a "right" and those (like me) who think the first focus should be on cost control. If it is a "right," then put the spending in the budget and pay for it with taxes. If the focus is costs, then curb tax subsidies for insurance or impose strict spending controls. Neither approach would be easy. Any sweeping reform requires public understanding. This is now missing. "Great innovations," Thomas Jefferson once said, "should not be forced on slender majorities."

LET ME BEGIN WITH A STORY ABOUT THE FELLOW WHO HAD A REPUTATION FOR BEING THE BEST FISHERMAN IN KANSAS. EVERY TIME HE WENT OUT TO THE LAKE, HE'D COME BACK WITH HIS LIMIT.

AFTER A WHILE, THE LOCAL GAME WARDEN GOT TO BE A BIT SUSPICIOUS, AND ASKED THE FISHERMAN IF HE COULD ACCOMPANY HIM ON HIS NEXT FISHING TRIP.

THE FELLOW AGREED, AND THE NEXT DAY THEY WERE OUT IN THE MIDDLE OF THE LAKE, WHEN THE FISHERMAN REACHED INTO HIS TACKLE BOX, TOOK OUT A PIECE OF DYNAMITE, LIT IT, AND THREW IT INTO THE LAKE. AFTER THE EXPLOSION, HE GRABBED A NET, AND STARTED SCOOPING UP THE FISH WHO FLOATED TO THE TOP.

THE GAME WARDEN WAS ALMOST IN SHOCK, BUT HE MANAGED TO STAMMER OUT THAT HE WAS GOING TO HAVE TO PUT THE FISHERMAN UNDER ARREST.

WITH THAT, THE FISHERMAN REACHED BACK INTO THE TACKLE BOX, TOOK ANOTHER PIECE OF DYNAMITE, LIT IT, HANDED IT TO THE GAME WARDEN AND SAID, "DID YOU COME HERE TO TALK, OR DID YOU COME HERE TO FISH?"

THE POINT OF THIS STORY IS THAT IF THERE'S ONE THING THIS ADMINISTRATION DESERVES CREDIT FOR, IT'S TALKING.

YOU NAME AN ISSUE, AND THEY CAN TALK AND TALK AND TALK ABOUT IT. AND SOMETIMES TALKING HELPS. BUT EVENTUALLY, IT'S TIME FOR THE TALKING TO STOP AND THE "FISHING" TO BEGIN. AND THE NEXT FEW WEEKS MAY WELL BE "FISHING SEASON" IN WASHINGTON, D.C. ON A NUMBER OF ISSUES.

THE FIRST OF THESE IS HEALTH CARE. AS I'VE SAID MANY TIMES, THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. CLINTON DESERVE CREDIT FOR TALKING ABOUT HEALTH CARE, AND FOR PUTTING IT ON THE AGENDA.

AND OVER THE PAST YEAR AND A HALF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE HAVE LEARNED A GREAT DEAL ABOUT HEALTH CARE...AND THOSE OF US IN WASHINGTON HAVE LEARNED A GREAT DEAL ABOUT WHAT AMERICANS LIKE AND WHAT THEY DON'T LIKE.

THE DEBATE BEGAN, OF COURSE, WHEN THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. CLINTON UNVEILED THEIR HEALTH CARE PLAN. I DISAGREED WHOLEHEARTEDLY WITH THEIR PLAN, BUT IT WAS A PLAN THAT WAS BASED ON A FUNDAMENTAL PHILOSOPHICAL PREMISE: A PREMISE THAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT SHOULD RUN THE HEALTH CARE SYSTEM, LOCK,

STOCK, AND BARREL. THEIR PLAN WAS CHOCK FULL OF MANDATES, BUREAUCRACIES, PRICE CONTROLS, AND TAXES.

THE PRESIDENT, MRS. CLINTON, THE WHITE HOUSE SPIN DOCTORS, AND THE DEMOCRAT LEADERSHIP IN CONGRESS, THEN SET OUT TO SELL THE CLINTON PLAN TO THE NATION. AND AFTER A YEAR AND A HALF OF THEIR BEST EFFORTS, THE AMERICAN PEOPLE HAVE DECIDED THAT THEY DON'T WANT TO BUY THIS PRODUCT. AND THEY'RE RIGHT.

THURSDAY NIGHT, THE HOUSE AND SENATE DEMOCRAT LEADERS WENT DOWN TO THE WHITE HOUSE AND TOLD THE PRESIDENT AND MRS. CLINTON WHAT YOU AND I KNEW A LONG TIME AGO--THEIR PLAN HAD NO CHANCE OF PASSING.

SO, IN THE NEXT WEEK OR SO, THE DEMOCRAT LEADERSHIP WILL BE MEETING BEHIND CLOSED DOORS TO COBBLE TOGETHER A NEW BILL. AND IT MAY WELL BE THAT THEY WILL DECIDE TO RELY ON A "ONE VOTE STRATEGY." INSTEAD OF LEGISLATION THAT RECEIVES WIDE BI-PARTISAN SUPPORT, THEY WILL EMERGE WITH A BILL THAT WILL JUST SQUEAK THROUGH THE HOUSE AND SENATE BY ONE OR TWO VOTES.

AND THE BOTTOM LINE IS THAT THEY WANT A BILL THAT WILL HELP THE DEMOCRATS IN NOVEMBER, SO THEY'LL PROMISE SOMETHING HERE, AND THROW A LITTLE PORK THERE, SLAP SOMETHING TOGETHER IN THE BACK ROOM, AND COME UP WITH SOMETHING THEY'LL CALL HEALTH CARE REFORM.

NOW THE DEMOCRATS AND MANY IN THE MEDIA WILL TELL YOU THAT THE REPUBLICANS AREN'T AS COMPASSIONATE AS THE DEMOCRATS, AND THAT WE DON'T CARE ABOUT HEALTH CARE. THAT'S BUNK.

THROUGHOUT THIS DISCUSSION, REPUBLICANS HAVE PLAYED AN ACTIVE ROLE IN THE SEARCH FOR A SOLUTION. SENATOR PACKWOOD AND I HAVE BEEN JOINED BY 38 REPUBLICAN SENATORS IN INTRODUCING REAL AND MEANINGFUL REFORM LEGISLATION.

OUR BILL IS ALSO BASED ON A PHILOSOPHICAL PREMISE: A PREMISE THAT WE CAN FIX WHAT NEEDS TO BE FIXED WITHOUT TAKING AWAY PEOPLE'S CHOICE, AND WITHOUT TURNING THE SYSTEM OVER TO THE GOVERNMENT. OUR PACKAGE OF MARKET AND INSURANCE REFORMS WOULD MAKE A BIG, BIG, DIFFERENCE IN THE LIVES OF COUNTLESS AMERICANS. IF WE COULD HAVE A SECRET BALLOT ON IT, IT WOULD PASS IN BOTH THE HOUSE AND THE SENATE EASILY.

BUT, OF COURSE, WE DON'T HAVE SECRET BALLOTS. AND I'M REALISTIC ENOUGH TO KNOW THAT THE DEMOCRATS DON'T WANT TO PASS A PLAN AUTHORED BY BOB DOLE.

I CAN'T PREDICT PRECISELY WHAT WILL HAPPEN IN THE NEXT FEW WEEKS. BUT I DO KNOW THAT ROBERT SAMUELSON--AN ECONOMIST WHO DOESN'T USUALLY LIKE WHAT BOB DOLE SUGGESTS--HAD AN INTERESTING POINT IN NEWSWEEK.

HE WROTE, AND I QUOTE, "THE BEST THING CONGRESS COULD DO NOW ON HEALTH CARE WOULD BE TO START OVER NEXT YEAR. THE MOST IMPORTANT SOCIAL LEGISLATION IN A QUARTER CENTURY SHOULD NOT BE APPROVED AS A LAST-MINUTE, POORLY UNDERSTOOD PATCHWORK...WHAT SHOULD NOT BE FORGOTTEN IN THE INEVITABLE CLAMOR TO DO SOMETHING IS THAT A BAD BILL WOULD BE WORSE THAN NO BILL AT ALL. OPPOSING SUCH A BILL IS PRUDENCE, NOT OBSTRUCTIONISM."

SO THAT'S WHERE WE ARE ON HEALTH CARE. AND I BELIEVE THE MOST IMPORTANT THING FOR THE REPUBLICAN PARTY IN THE COMING WEEKS IS THAT WE REMAIN TRUE TO OUR PRINCIPLES.

THE MISSION OF OUR PARTY IS NOT JUST TO CUT THE DEMOCRATS PROGRAMS IN HALF, OR MEET THEM SOMEWHERE IN THE MIDDLE. BUT THE MISSION OF OUR PARTY IS ALSO NOT TO CLOSE OUR EYES TO PEOPLE WHO NEED HELP. SO IF THE PRESIDENT AND THE DEMOCRATS COME OUR WAY...IF THEY WANT A MARKET-BASED APPROACH THAT BUILDS ON THE BEST HEALTH CARE SYSTEM IN THE WORLD, AND THAT LEAVES PEOPLE IN CHARGE, THEN REPUBLICANS WILL HELP.

BUT IF THEY WANT TO PASS A BAD BILL, THEN THIS REPUBLICAN WILL SAY THAT NO BILL IS BETTER, AND WE'LL TAKE IT TO THE VOTERS THIS NOVEMBER.

LET US NOW MOVE ON TO NOVEMBER....THERE ARE 118 DAYS BETWEEN NOW AND THE ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 8. AND THERE ARE SOME OUT THERE WHO BELIEVE THAT ALL THE REPUBLICANS NEED TO DO IS STAY QUIET FOR 118 DAYS, AND BECAUSE OF PRESIDENT CLINTON AND LIBERAL DEMOCRATS, WE WILL WIN BIG.

I TEND TO DISAGREE. YES, THE DEMOCRATS ARE DRIVING AMERICANS OUR WAY...YES, TWO THIRDS OF THOSE ASKED SAY THAT AMERICA IS ON THE WRONG TRACK. DECISIONS LIKE WHERE YOUR CHILDREN SHOULD GO TO SCHOOL...DECISIONS LIKE WHAT DOCTOR...WHAT HOSPITAL...WHAT PHARMACY..AND WHAT HEALTH PLAN ARE BEST FOR YOU AND YOUR FAMILY.

AND WE BELIEVE IN SMALL BUSINESSMEN AND WOMEN, FARMERS, LABORERS, AND MANAGERS. WE WANT TO REWARD PERSONAL INITIATIVE AND RISK TAKING IN THE MARKETPLACE. WE BELIEVE THAT IF YOU ARE ALLOWED TO CREATE AND BUILD AND DREAM, THEN AMERICA AND HER PEOPLE WILL BECOME MORE DYNAMIC AND PROSPEROUS.

WE ALSO KNOW THAT THERE ARE PEOPLE IN NEED OF HELP. DON'T LET ANYONE TELL YOU THAT THE REPUBLICAN PARTY DOESN'T CARE FOR THE ILL, THE NEEDY, OR THE POOR.

WE DO CARE. BUT WE ALSO CARE WHEN POOR PROGRAMS, POORLY CONCEIVED, POORLY IMPLEMENTED, AND BASED ON POOR ARITHMETIC, DON'T REACH THE PEOPLE THEY'RE SUPPOSED TO HELP.

WE ALSO BELIEVE THAT EVERY INDIVIDUAL HAS A RIGHT TO PARTICIPATE IN THE POLITICAL PROCESS. THERE ARE THOSE WHO WOULD BRING LITMUS TESTS INTO THE VOTING BOOTH. IF YOU HAPPEN TO GO TO A CERTAIN CHURCH, THEN YOU'RE OUT. WHAT BALONEY. WE BELIEVE THAT WHAT MATTERS IS NOT WHERE SOMEONE KNEELS TO WORSHIP, BUT WHERE SOMEONE STANDS ON THE ISSUES.

BUT MAKE NO MISTAKE ABOUT IT, REPUBLICANS DO BELIEVE IN GOVERNMENT. LIMITED GOVERNMENT. THRIFTY GOVERNMENT. GOVERNMENT WHERE THE FIRST DUTY IS TO PROTECT INDIVIDUALS, NOT TO RUN THEIR LIVES.

AND REPUBLICANS WANT TO PROVIDE THAT PROTECTION BY STANDING UP TO CRIMINALS HERE AT HOME, AND DICTATORS ABROAD. FOREIGN POLICY, BY THE WAY, IS ANOTHER AREA WHERE THIS ADMINISTRATION HAS DONE A LOT OF TALKING, BUT NOT MUCH "FISHING."

"WE THE PEOPLE." THAT'S WHAT REPUBLICANS BELIEVE. AND WE SHOULD LEAVE NO DOUBT THAT THAT'S EXACTLY WHAT AMERICA WILL GET WITH BOB DOLE AS SENATE MAJORITY LEADER AND NEWT GINGRICH AS SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE.

YOU'LL SEE A BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT. YOU'LL SEE A LINE ITEM VETO. YOU'LL SEE A CUT IN THE CAPITAL GAINS TAX RATE. YOU'LL SEE A CUT IN RULES, REGULATIONS, AND RED TAPE. YOU'LL SEE CUTS IN THE NUMBER OF YOUR DOLLARS CONGRESS SPENDS, AND THE NUMBER OF STAFFERS WE HIRE. YOU'LL SEE HEALTH CARE REFORM THAT FIXES WHAT NEEDS TO BE FIXED, BUT THAT DOESN'T PUT A MOUNTAIN OF BUREAUCRATS BETWEEN YOU AND YOUR DOCTOR. YOU'LL SEE A CRIME BILL THAT PUTS THE RIGHTS OF VICTIMS AHEAD OF THE RIGHTS OF CRIMINALS. YOU'LL SEE A CONGRESS THAT'S UNWILLING TO LET BOUTROS BOUTROS GHALI AND THE UNITED NATIONS DECIDE WHAT'S IN OUR NATIONAL INTEREST.

I HAVE NO PERSONAL QUARREL WITH PRESIDENT CLINTON. AND I THINK HE HONESTLY BELIEVES IN HIS PHILOSOPHY. THE PROBLEM IS THAT HIS PHILOSOPHY IS WRONG. AND THE AMERICAN PEOPLE KNOW IT.

IT'S A PHILOSOPHY WHERE THE FIRST THREE WORDS ARE "WE, THE GOVERNMENT. PRESIDENT CLINTON AND THE DEMOCRATS DON'T SEE PEOPLE AS UNIQUE INDIVIDUALS, THEY LUMP THEM TOGETHER AS SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS.

THEY BELIEVE THAT GOVERNMENT KNOWS BEST. WHO SHOULD DECIDE WHERE YOUR CHILDREN GO TO SCHOOL? THE GOVERNMENT. WHO SHOULD DECIDE WHAT TYPE OF CHILD CARE IS BEST FOR YOUR CHILDREN? THE GOVERNMENT. WHO SHOULD DECIDE WHAT'S INCLUDED IN YOUR HEALTH CARE PLAN? THE GOVERNMENT. WHO SHOULD SET THE LEAVE POLICIES FOR YOUR EMPLOYER? THE GOVERNMENT. WHO SHOULD DECIDE THE LAND AND WATER POLICIES FOR THE WESTERN STATES? THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

IT'S A PHILOSOPHY THAT THEY DESCRIBE AS PROVIDING "SECURITY" THEY WANT AMERICANS TO BE SECURE IN EVERY ASPECT OF THEIR LIFE.

AND I WOULD SUGGEST THAT IF THE PEOPLE OF EASTERN EUROPE AND THE FORMER SOVIET UNION HAD ANYTHING FIVE...TEN...FIFTEEN YEARS AGO, THEY HAD SECURITY. NEARLY EVERY ASPECT OF LIFE WAS TAKEN CARE OF, AND NEARLY EVERY DECISION WAS MADE FOR THEM BY THE GOVERNMENT.

BUT THEY WANTED MORE THAN SECURITY. THEY WANTED FREEDOM AND OPPORTUNITY. THEY WANTED CONTROL OVER THEIR OWN LIVES. THEY WANTED THE CHANCE TO SUCCEED OR FAIL ON THEIR OWN. AND AS MANY OF THE LEADERS OF THESE NOW EMERGING DEMOCRACIES TELL ME, THEY WANT TO BE LIKE AMERICA.

AND THAT BRINGS UP A FINAL POINT. LIKE IT OR NOT, FREE PEOPLE THE WORLD OVER LOOK TO AMERICA FOR LEADERSHIP. AND WE ARE THE ONLY REMAINING SUPERPOWER IN THE WORLD. AMERICA IS NOT JUST A MILITARY SUPERPOWER. WE ARE ALSO AN ECONOMIC SUPERPOWER. A TECHNOLOGICAL SUPERPOWER. AN AGRICULTURE SUPERPOWER. AND WE ARE A HUMANITARIAN SUPERPOWER.

AND I DON'T WANT THAT TO CHANGE. MAKE NO MISTAKE ABOUT IT, THERE IS A PRICE TO PAY FOR LEADERSHIP. A PRICE IN TERMS OF MONEY. A PRICE IN TERMS OF LIVES LOST.

THERE ARE THOSE WHO SUGGEST THAT THE PRICE IS HIGH. THAT IT'S TIME FOR SOMEONE ELSE TO BE A LEADER. AND THEY'RE WRONG.

I AGREE WITH WHAT RICHARD NIXON SAID NOT LONG BEFORE HIS DEATH. HE SAID, "IF WE DO NOT PROVIDE LEADERSHIP, WHO WILL? THE GERMANS? THE JAPANESE? THE RUSSIANS? THE CHINESE? ONLY THE UNITED STATES HAS THE POTENTIAL...TO LEAD IN THE ERA BEYOND PEACE. IT IS A GREAT CHALLENGE FOR A GREAT PEOPLE."

THANK YOU VERY MUCH FOR WHAT YOU ARE DOING FOR THE REPUBLICAN PARTY...WORKING TOGETHER, WE WILL MAKE 1994 THE YEAR OF "WE, THE PEOPLE."

SENATE PASSES DOLE/HUTCHISON AMENDMENT TO REIMBURSE STATES FOR COST OF INCARCERATING ILLEGAL ALIENS

WASHINGTON - Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole and Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison (R-TX) today proposed an amendment to provide \$350 million to reimburse states for the costs of incarcerating illegal aliens. The funding must come from the more than \$2 billion appropriated for U.N. activities. After a motion to table was defeated 44-52, the U.S. Senate unanimously adopted the amendment to the 1995 Commerce, Justice, State, and Judiciary. Senator Dole's statement follows:

"This is a sound amendment. It is a responsible amendment. It fully funds an administration request of \$350 million, which is not funded directly in the bill. There can be little doubt that the needs are great.

"The administration's official communication on this legislation says "the Senate is urged to support the separate request for the State Criminal Aliens Assistance Program to ensure that states most affected by the cost of incarcerating criminal aliens receive as much as possible of the \$350 million in requested federal assistance." That is exactly what this amendment does.

"The administration may not like the source of this transfer -- the more than \$2 billion for the United Nations in this legislation. Two billion dollars for what we all agree is a bloated and unaccountable bureaucracy may be acceptable in a time with no budget constraints. But when vital programs like federal reimbursement for illegal aliens' imprisonment are not funded, we need to make tough choices.

"In my view, we should support the states that are incurring costs. The following organizations have endorsed full funding for this program: the National Governors' Association, the National Council of State Legislatures, the National Association of Counties, the National Association of State Budget Officers, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the California Police Chiefs Association, and the California District Attorneys' Association."

As the Senate considers H.R. 4603, the Commerce, Justice, State, The Judiciary Appropriations Bill, I wanted to provide you with the Administration's views on the Hutchison-Dole amendment. The Administration strongly opposes the amendment.

The Hutchison-Dole amendment would provide \$350 million for the State Criminal Alien Assistance Program. On April 22, 1994, President Clinton asked Congress to provide \$350 million to help States pay for their costs associated with incarcerating illegal aliens convicted of a felony.

Regrettably, the Hutchison-Dole amendment pays for this amendment by reducing funds for United Nations Peacekeeping. By the end of FY 1994, the United States will have accumulated about \$1 billion in unpaid UN peacekeeping assessments. The FY 1994 supplemental of \$670 million provided in the Committee bill will pay a significant portion of these arrears.

Without the \$670 million payment, the UN will face a serious cashflow problem and find it increasingly difficult to continue current peacekeeping operations, many of which were initiated by previous administrations, with bi-partisan support. These operations are in such places as Bosnia, the Golan Heights, Kuwait, Cyprus, El Salvador and Lebanon. A \$350 million cut to this supplemental could force the UN to begin eliminating or scaling back operations that serve important American interests.

The Administration remains committed to working with the Congress to identify offsets for funding the State Criminal Alien Assistance Program.

*1 RNC SUMMER MEETING: TALKING UP '94; PLAYING DOWN '96

"Against a backdrop of increasing dissension" by moderate GOP leaders, the RNC met in L.A. for its summer meeting "intent on burying its nascent problems and celebrating a mounting optimism about the party's prospects this November." RNC Chair Haley Barbour "sent a strong signal to his GOP brethren to keep their attention riveted" on '94 and "leave until later any contentious battles over ideology." Barbour: "The best thing we can do to elect a Republican president in 1996 is to have a big Republican victory in 1994." Barbour estimated that 175 House seats are "up for grabs," adding, "I think it is reasonable to expect that we may be able to put together working control, working majorities in the House on many issues." But Barbour called it "unlikely" the GOP could win a House majority. In the Senate, the GOP needs to pick up seven seats to win a majority. Barbour, on those prospects: "That is uphill but it is not nearly as uphill as it was in the beginning of the year." While GOP hopes "have been fanned" this year, the GOP is "not without its own problems" which Barbour hopes "to discuss only minimally" during the meeting. Moderate GOPers have "been grumbling about the growing prominence of religious conservatives. So far, most of the discontent has surfaced in disputes about the party's anti-abortion stance." Recent pleas to remove the anti-abortion plank by CA Gov. Pete Wilson and NJ Gov. Christie Whitman may "presage a huge battle" over abortion in '96. Barbour: "In our party, there are millions and millions of pro-choice Republicans. I'm pro-life, but they're just as good of Republicans as I am.

... I don't see any benefit to try to speculate about something that is not going to happen till 1996." Potential '96 candidates who will speak at the three-day meeting: Pete Wilson, Bob Dole, Dick Cheney, Phil Gramm and Bill Weld (Decker, L.A. TIMES, 7/22).

About 60% of respondents had seen or heard an ad by both of the candidates. Of those, 30% said Feinstein's ads made them less inclined to support her, and 14% said they made them more inclined to support her. 27% said Huffington's ads made them less inclined to support him; 16% said they made them more inclined to support him (Field release, 7/21).

SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS' Trounstine on the "lesson" of this poll: "Even against a remarkably popular incumbent, negative advertising works. ... But while Huffington's unprecedented spending has driven down Feinstein's popularity, it has done little to improve his own." Also, half of the voters "don't know enough" about Huffington to express an opinion which leaves both campaigns in a position to "define" him. Feinstein consultant Bill Carrick: "People are beginning to ask, 'Who is Michael Huffington?' And we're going to help answer that question." Carrick acknowledged that Huffington's "3-1 spending advantage has made a difference." Adds Trounstine, "Moreover, the center of the political spectrum also appears up for grabs. While about eight in 10 strong conservatives back Huffington and a like percentage of liberals support Feinstein, the moderate conservatives split 55-26 percent for Huffington, and the middle of the road voters break 50-30 for Feinstein" (7/21). S.F. EXAMINER's Krieger: "The results of the poll released Thursday suggest that these attacks haven't helped Feinstein recover from the earlier damage caused by Huffington's expensive barrage of TV commercials." One of Feinstein big problems is the "high proportion" of those polled who have an "unfavorable view" of her. GOP consultant Wayne Johnson on Feinstein: "She's managed to stabilize her position. But this new poll can't be very encouraging. She's fired some big cannons, but has not been able to recover." According to some political experts, "it's too early to tell how the contest will develop." Experts also note the "narrow margin was bad news for Feinstein, because undecided voters often end up supporting challengers rather than incumbents" (7/21).

When asked, "regardless of who you prefer, who do you think will win the election?", 46% said Wilson, 33% said Brown and 21% were unsure (Field release, 7/19).

POLL REAX: S.F. CHRONICLE's Yoachum: "With Wilson's job approval ratings declining and Brown's voter references sliding, the underlying message of the poll is not encouraging for either contender." The results of the poll "differ" from recent internal campaign polls which showed Wilson leading Brown by between 5 and 9 points. Pollster Mervin Field: "You have a state in terrible economic and social shape, and the electorate doesn't have any confidence in the existing governor or the alternative. ... This indicates a lack of enthusiasm among Brown voters. Wilson is being downgraded in his job performance but is still closing the gap against Brown. People are voting no on Wilson -- but not voting yes on Brown" (7/20). Brown, on the poll: "We're landing punches." Wilson spokesperson Dan Schnur: "In the last two weeks, Kathleen Brown has thrown the political sink at us and it's barely made a scratch. They went out and tried to buy themselves a poll and they didn't even do that right." The poll was conducted while Brown was airing four television ads attacking Wilson's record. Brown spokesperson John Whitehurst: "It shows how weak he is. One week of television and his numbers collapsed" (S.F.EXAMINER, 7/20). SAN JOSE MERCURY NEWS' Trounstein: "California voters like Republican Gov. Pete Wilson less and less, but they have yet to warm up to Democratic Treasurer Kathleen Brown" (7/20).

Update

Governor Pete Wilson easily won renomination on June 7 defeating businessman Ron Unz. He will now face State Treasurer Kathleen Brown who beat Insurance Commissioner John Garamendi. Governor Wilson is expected to continue with the same themes that Californians have responded to recently. The latest polls have shown that his policies against illegal immigration, for example, are widely supported throughout the state. Additionally, a KNBC/San Francisco Examiner poll conducted May 26-29 (+/- 3.5% margin of error) gave Wilson a 47% to 39% lead against Brown in the general election match-up. *The Sacramento Bee* reported July 9 that a Democrat survey shows Brown trailing Governor Wilson by 5 points.

Brown's sometimes economics advisor Joel Kotkin disassociated himself from the campaign when Brown started running an ad with the line, "America's best Treasurer to Revive America's worst Economy." Kotkin said that the campaign line itself would hurt California's ability to attract business. At the end of the primary period, *The Los Angeles Times* had called into question the first half of the campaign line when it delineated how many campaign promises Brown had broken as State Treasurer. Now a third campaign slogan is being tried, "The only candidate to build a new California." In the meantime, Brown advisor William Bradley has also resigned from the campaign. A Brown press release cited fundamental differences between the campaign and Bradley for his departure.

Los Angeles Times primary exit polls showed that Garamendi voters would break for Wilson 39% to 29%, with 25% looking for someone else and 7% undecided.

POLITICAL UPDATE

1. Congressman Michael Huffington was nominated in the June 7 primary, winning a 3-way primary race with 55% of the vote. This general election race closed dramatically even before the primary, with Huffington and incumbent Dianne Feinstein dead even in the polls.

2. The dramatic collapse of the polls is due principally to Huffington's aggressive advertising. He was the candidate who launched a statewide media buy with a \$6 million ad campaign. The ads first introduced Huffington and then later attacked Feinstein on crime and on her deciding vote for the Clinton tax plan last year.

3. The Huffington campaign has now launched into another phase of their attack on Feinstein. They have begun airing ads critical of Feinstein on her flip-flop on co-sponsorship of the Clinton health care plan (she quietly removed her name as a co-sponsor of the Clinton health plan). The tag line of the ad that started airing last Friday, June 17 is: "The Clinton health plan -- and Feinstein -- dropped in the polls. So, on May 25th, Feinstein flip-flopped and deserted the health plan. It's the only principle of a career politician -- save your own skin." Needless to say, Feinstein was trying to keep a low profile about backing out of the President's plan.

4. Huffington wants to portray himself as a political outsider. Feinstein's strategy seems to be one that Republicans have used for the twelve years of the Reagan/Bush administrations: experience and access to the White House.

5. The newest Huffington point of attack is on President Clinton's new welfare proposal. Huffington is stressing the fact that Clinton's plan will not decrease the number of welfare recipients, but will increase the size of the government.

6. One of Feinstein's counter-attacks on Huffington has been about his residency in California. Huffington only registered to vote in California three years ago. Feinstein also attacked Huffington because of the fact that he was claiming residency in Texas for tax purposes while he was continuing to do business there. His wife and child were living in California (Note: the legality of this issue is not being challenged, just the propriety). Feinstein is calling Huffington a "carpet-bagger" and is calling for him to release his tax forms. He has refused. And Feinstein's ad was roundly criticized as ineffective and reminiscent of Michael Dukakis' ads in '88 that attacked George Bush's consultants.

This is the fourth annual Los Angeles Inner-City Games. The idea was originally conceived as a way to stop children violence and drug and gang involvement. The Hollenbeck Youth Center was built in 1976 entirely from private contributions. Indoor sports such as basketball, volleyball, weightlifting, karate and boxing are provided. Outdoors they have baseball, soccer, flag football, track, swimming, summer camps, etc. All recreational sports are offered seven days a week. Transportation is provided to the youth from their homes.

These particular games are the culmination of year-long sports and other activities run by the Center in a 10-day athletic and special event marathon for inner city kids. The 1994 theme for these Games is "HOPE" -- Maria Shriver and Arnold will present the "First Annual Inner-City HOPE" award to Danny hernandez for saving thousands of youths by providing an alternative to a life of gangs and drugs through his work at the HYC and the Games.

The Games are also taking on a national scope -- representatives from 15 U.S. cities such as New York and Washington, D.C. will be observing these Games in order to establish them in their own communities. Of special note, in 1984 "The Hollenbeck Kid" boxer Paul Gonzales won the Gold Medal in the Olympics. In 1988, Hollenbeck boxing coach LAPD Officer George Lopez participated in the Seoul, Korea Olympic Games.

Arnold Schwarzenegger is the Executive Commissioner -- he and his producers are thrilled at the possibility of your attendance. Other prominent attendees include: Maria Shriver, Mayor Richard Riordan, Daniel L. Hernandez, Bruce Jenner, Sugar Ray Leonard, Whoopie Goldberg, Danny Glover and Peter Vidmar. The VIP Reception runs from 11:15 Am - 1 P.M. Following the Reception are the Opening Ceremonies which AG Lundgren will be attending (1P.M. - 2:15 P.M.) The format of the VIP reception is mix and mingle.


camp...Dented a bit by the straw poll was former Housing Secretary Jack Kemp, who finished fourth."

In summary, the candidates' forum on Friday, June 24th, was a small battle in a long war, but Phil Gramm won that battle.


While 1996 is a long way off, we want to begin to put together names of people who might be interested in supporting Phil Gramm, and we are enclosing a card for you to request more information about Phil.





The Iowa Straw Poll: Dole Survives, But Others Claim Victory

DES MOINES, Iowa — The contest for the Republican presidential nomination unofficially kicked off here Friday night as elected officials and activists gathered from around the state to listen to speeches and cast their ballots in a straw poll that included every conceivable GOP candidate — plus a few inconceivable ones.

The "poll tax" was a \$25 ticket to the event for the benefit of the state GOP. As expected, Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole (Kan.) led the field with 356 votes — 26 percent of the

1,349 total ballots cast. While his showing didn't exactly wow anyone, the consensus seemed to be that Dole received the minimum acceptable level to avoid embarrassment but did nothing to discourage rival candidates from further efforts to organize the state for the February 1996 caucuses.

Clearly, Dole doesn't "own" Iowa, and the caucuses are now fair game for everyone (certainly to the relief of the state convention and tourism board after 1992's Democratic boycott of the contest).

If Dole was the survivor Friday night, the winners were former Education Secretary and Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander and Sen. Phil Gramm (Texas), chairman of the National Republican Senatorial Committee. Not only did they place second and third, re-

spectively, with 15 percent each (Alexander actually edged Gramm out, 205 votes to 200), but each beat the political "point spread" by exceeding pundits' expectations.

Alexander demonstrated that his high-tech/grassroots network of 3,000 monthly "neighborhood meetings," small groups of voters who gather each month to watch an Alexander-hosted discussion of issues via satellite and on 500 cable systems around the country, is a valid organizational tool. His surprisingly strong showing was underscored by the attendance of about 900 Iowa Republicans at an Alexander-hosted breakfast the next morning.

Though Alexander's speech Friday night didn't quite offer the fire and brimstone the crowd heard from commentator Patrick

Buchanan or from Gramm, he did have one of the two best rhetorical lines of the evening. Alexander argued that the solution to public anger with Congress should be to "cut their pay and send them home." There may not be a line this year that sums up voter sentiment toward Congress better than that one.

Gramm gave a classic conservative speech and showed no reticence to throw red meat to the very receptive crowd. He also may have quelled suspicions that his Texas style won't travel well beyond the Southwest.

Gramm's speech to the Houston GOP convention was not exactly a hit (I liked it, but I'm originally from Louisiana), and it convinced many that Gramm could be seen by Republicans in other regions as some kind of a GOP version of LBJ — a wheeler-dealer and a party switcher at that. Iowa isn't exactly New Hampshire or Oregon, but it isn't Amarillo either. Gramm's speech hit a responsive chord, based on the crowd reaction.

Each of the camps denied any extensive organizational efforts, and state GOP Chairman Richard Schwarz insisted that no campaigns bought blocs of tickets or otherwise stacked the deck (even though Schwarz says he encouraged them to do so). But there was a pretty strong suspicion among reporters Friday night that the crowds and votes were not

exactly spontaneous. My guess is that Alexander, Dole, Gramm, and perhaps others may have added a little Astroturf to what was supposed to be grassroots balloting.

Coming in fourth in the straw poll was former HUD Secretary Jack Kemp — a no-show. Kemp had accepted the invitation to attend, then changed his mind, arguing that such events should be delayed until after the midterm elections. Kemp's 156-vote, 12 percent finish was respectable, particularly since he wasn't there. But it certainly wasn't impressive.

Watching from the sidelines very carefully was Sel Rizzo, Kemp's Sacramento, Calif.-based PAC director and chief organizer, who seemed to be pursuing a strategy of investing little political capital in Iowa but watching closely and filing away names and details. In a little-noticed but interesting move, Kemp has relocated his PAC from Washington to Sacramento, capital of the state with the largest bloc of delegates to the GOP convention and a primary that recently moved up from early June to March.

If there was a loser among the big names it was former Defense Secretary and Wyoming Rep. Dick Cheney. Clearly the crowd knew who he was, knew he was a player, and liked much of what he had to say. But Cheney badly needs two things: a very good speechwriter and a very good speech coach (while I'm at it, beefing up the domestic policy side of the speech wouldn't hurt either).

In some ways, Cheney is reminiscent of Dick Gephardt in the middle of 1987. Gephardt had a great deal of raw talent, but it just wasn't coming together. Cheney will always be seen as a solid, impressive (albeit somewhat plodding) figure, but performances like this one and a reportedly similarly underwhelming one at the Virginia GOP convention just aren't going to cut it in the big leagues.

For former Vice President Dan Quayle, who did not attend, his 81-vote, 6 percent

showing was the high point of the evening for his putative campaign. Other than one passing reference to Quayle by another speaker, I didn't see a single button, sign, or sticker — or for that matter see or hear any trace of evidence that the man had ever lived — until the vote totals were announced. I thought there would be some sign of even an impromptu effort on his behalf, but if there was, it was well hidden.

Buchanan gave a rousing speech, but you couldn't call it red meat. It was more like steak tartare. Buchanan had the other great line of the night: Referring to Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee Chairman Vic Fazio's (Calif) assault earlier in the week on the "radical right" and the increased activism of evangelical voters, Buchanan predicted that "it's not the Christians who'll be fed to the lions in November."

The next morning though, standing around and sipping coffee from a Styrofoam cup in the Des Moines Marriott lobby, Buchanan wasn't saying a lot. He shook a

few hands and let himself be seen, but after giving such a rousing, seemingly well-received speech, he had to be disappointed with just a 69-vote, 5 percent finish.

After the results were announced, one got the impression that the crowd was saying "Pat for after-dinner speaker, but not for president." Buchanan's showing lends credence to the view that much of his 1992 support was a protest vote against President Bush, and that with the 1996 conservative vote split several ways, there just isn't a lot of room for Pat.

Former Labor Secretary Lynn Martin fell flat Friday night, giving a speech that Ed Walsh of the Washington Post called "rambling." Others were less charitable. Even under the best of circumstances, Martin's voice is vaguely reminiscent of fingernails on a chalkboard, but Friday night she came across as disorganized as well. It was almost as if she just got up in front of the crowd and tried to wing it. There is certainly room for a woman in this field, and Martin may be well-positioned to go after the moderate vote, but

her appearance here was a disaster and I have doubts about whether we'll see her at such events again.

Former New Jersey Gov. Tom Kean, who had called and asked if he could speak, ad-

mitted at the outset of his talk that he wasn't really running for president. But he nevertheless gave a thoughtful speech, urging "the politics of inclusion" and tolerance within the party to divergent voices.

Kean's critical line was this: "If we say that every woman who has an abortion is a 'baby killer' and that every son and daughter who is gay is an abomination, when we imply that women who demand equality are somehow violating their fundamental na-

tures — well, then, we may relegate ourselves to the sideline."

Though Kean's message was received politely by most of the crowd, it hardly translated into votes. Kean received just two, but then again, he had already said he wasn't running so it really didn't make a lot of difference.

The final speaker of the evening was Sen. Arlen Specter (Pa) who, like Kean, preached tolerance. But Specter did it in his own inimitable style, rubbing more than a few in the crowd the wrong way and earning the only boos of the evening. Specter went a couple of steps further than Kean, reminding listeners of the Founding Fathers' insistence on the separation of church and state and suggesting that religious right forces had taken over the Texas GOP convention just weeks before.

With six votes (less than one-half percent), there would appear to be a limited constituency for such a message, however — at least among Iowa Republican activists. It's unlikely that such a message will be picked up by the likes of Dole, Alexander, Gramm, Kemp, Cheney, or Quayle.

Dole leads GOP hopefuls in test of strength in Iowa

Kansas Sen. Bob Dole last night easily won an Iowa straw poll for potential Republican presidential candidates in the first major test of organizing strength and appeal on the long road to the 1996 GOP nomination.

In Des Moines, 2,100 Republicans gathered for dinner and the straw poll on the eve of the Republican state convention.

Mr. Dole garnered 26 percent of the vote. Former Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander finished second with 15 percent, five votes ahead of Sen. Phil Gramm of Texas with 14.8 percent, followed by former HUD Secretary Jack Kemp, 11.5, former Defense Secretary Dick Cheney, 9.6, former Vice President Dan Quayle, 6.0, columnist Pat Buchanan, 5.1, and former Education Secretary Bill Bennett, 4.3.

Mr. Dole, the Senate minority

leader, said he did not attend because he had a previous speaking commitment. But his operatives in the state were hard at work. Des Moines lawyer Jim Davis, a Dole supporter, said he was telephoned earlier in the week by someone manning the Dole phone bank and was sent a letter inviting him to a Dole-sponsored reception last night at which Mr. Dole was to speak "live" through closed-circuit television.

Mr. Alexander, a moderate who has devoted more time than even Mr. Dole and Mr. Gramm to positioning himself for 1996, had the most visible effort in place all week. Two supporters from West Des Moines bought batches of tickets on his behalf for distribution to supporters. Mr. Dole's organization also bought up and distributed some free tickets to attendees.

Mr. Alexander, who founded a GOP satellite TV system that

broadcasts a monthly show hosted by him, invited all 3,000 of today's convention delegates to a breakfast this morning. Senior Iowa Republicans could not remember so grand and expensive a gesture by a potential candidate.

Mr. Gramm told supporters he was not going to buy tickets for free distribution to inflate last night's vote because he wanted a "true" measure of where he stands at this point and would rather have low numbers, since they will be the benchmark against which his progress is measured over the next year and a half.

Mr. Buchanan, who challenged incumbent President Bush from the right in the 1992 GOP primary, had many workers in action at the gathering.

"I'm amazed," said former Iowa GOP Chairman Darrell Kearney. "I didn't expect to see such high visibility for Buchanan. He seems to have more people working here

than anybody else."

Mr. Kearney, who is the acting chairman of Mr. Kemp's volunteer organizing effort in Iowa, also said the Buchanan brigades had more banners in the hall, including a huge one that said, "Thank you, Pat Buchanan and Pat Robertson, for supporting Christian America."

The seriousness of Mr. Buchanan's presidential intentions was also suggested by postcards, addressed "Dear Buchanan Brigades," that went out to supporters urging them to put up the \$25 admission fee and to vote for "Pat."

"Alert everyone you know who loves Pat and wants to preserve the Reagan platform. The battle is on for the soul of the GOP," the postcard said.

There was speculation that Pat Robertson's Christian Coalition, whose members are expected to make up half the 3,000 delegates attending the state GOP conven-

tion today, would be out in force last night and vote for Mr. Bennett.

But Ralph Reed, Christian Coalition executive director, advised his Iowa affiliates to be nice to everyone but to commit to no one. Coalition sources expected their members to divide their votes among Mr. Bennett, Mr. Quayle and Mr. Dole.

Other names on the ballot included former New Jersey Gov. Tim Wain, former Transportation Secretary Lynn Martin and Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania.

Mr. Gramm, in a speech that drew more applause than any other except Mr. Buchanan's, briefly addressed what the Democrats have made the theme of the week, and perhaps of the next two years: their bashing of the Christian conservatives.

"Today, when half the children born in our cities are born out of wedlock and violence fills our streets, Bill Clinton and the Demo-

crats tell us our problem is Americans who hold strong religious beliefs are becoming involved in the political process," Mr. Gramm said.

Mr. Cheney also picked up on the Democrats' attacks on the Christian conservatives.

"One of the most appalling things we have seen come from the Democrats in Washington lately is this idea that if you're a committed Christian, you somehow don't have any right to participate in politics," Mr. Cheney said.

However, Sen. Arlen Specter, a social-policy liberal, seemed to echo Democrats' criticism and drew scattered boos — and some applause — when he chastised the "far right" for "taking over" the party in Texas and elsewhere. He accused some Christian conservatives of intolerance toward moderates on abortion and other issues.

Leadership for America

Speech delivered to the Iowa Republican Convention

June 24, 1994

Des Moines, Iowa

Five hundred and ninety-seven days from today, you and thousands of other Iowans will gather together in cities and towns across this state to begin the process of choosing the next President of the United States. Nobody here tonight knows who will be elected President in 1996, but everybody here tonight is dedicated to the principle that it will not be Bill Clinton.

Today, half the world is struggling to get out of socialized medicine, but under Bill Clinton and the Democrats, the United States of America is the only country on the planet that is trying to get into socialized medicine -- and I intend to stop it.

Today, when half the children in our cities are born out of wedlock, when our streets are filled with crime and violence, Bill Clinton and the Democrats are alarmed that Americans who hold strong religious values are beginning to stand up, speak out and demand changes in American government. You know, if somebody stood at a microphone like this and said, "If you don't have strongly-held religious views, you ought not to be involved in American politics," I'd be offended. But I am equally offended when people stand at microphones like this and imply that if you do have strongly-held religious views, you ought not to be involved in the American political process. As Abraham Lincoln said so long ago, "We do not claim that God is on our side, but we earnestly strive to be on His."

Now, I've been asked tonight by several members of the media, aren't we in a bit of a hurry for 1996 to come? Yes, we're in a hurry for 1996 to come because we're in a bigger hurry for Bill Clinton to go.

We lost the 1992 elections because Bill Clinton and the Democrats confused people about who they were and what they wanted to do. I believe Bill Clinton is well on his way to solving that problem for us for at least a generation. But we also lost in 1992 because we confused people about who we were and what we wanted to do.

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I believe that in 1994 and in 1996 we need to draw a bright line of distinction between what we stand for and what Bill Clinton stands for -- and what better place to start than on taxing and spending? In 1950 the average American family with two children sent \$1 out of every \$50 it earned to Washington, D.C. Today that family is sending \$1 in every \$4 to Washington. At the current rate of growth in federal spending, in 20 years government will spend 53 cents out of every dollar earned by every American. Bill Clinton says, let's accelerate this trend. We say, let's stop it and let's reverse it. And I know how.

Let me tell you how I'd do it. It's very simple; I call it "The Dicky Flatt Test." I look at every program in the federal government, and then I think of some honest-to-God, flesh-and-blood working American. For me, that's Dicky Flatt, a printer from Mexia, Texas. He's a family businessman. His print shop is open until 6 o'clock every weeknight and 5 o'clock on Saturday. And whether you see him at the PTA or the Boy Scouts or the Presbyterian Church, try as he may he never quite gets that blue ink off the end of his fingers. I'd look at every program and I'd think of the millions of Dicky Flatts of this country and I'd ask one simple question: Will the benefits to be derived by spending money on this program be worth taking the money away from Dicky Flatt to pay for it? Let me tell you something: there are not a hell of a lot of government programs that'll stand up to that test.

When we start using the Dicky Flatt Test, the deficit problem will be over, but I want to do more. This year in the budget debate, I offered an amendment to cut funding for three big government agencies and in turn to double the dependent child exemption from \$2,300 a year to \$4,600 a year. And you guessed it: The Democrats got up and said, "Gramm wants to cut spending for housing. Gramm wants to cut spending for education. Gramm wants to cut spending for nutrition." And I got up and said, "I don't want to cut spending for any of those things. I want to change who does the spending. You want the government to do the

spending. I want the family to do the spending." I know the government and I know the family and I know the difference.

I want to repeal the 1992 tax increase. I want to repeal the Clinton tax on Social Security benefits set to go into effect next year. I want to raise the personal exemption and the dependent child exemption so working families can keep more of what they earn. And I want to cut the capital gains tax to provide incentives for Americans to work and save and invest again.

Bill Clinton's health care plan is socialized medicine and I oppose it. Clinton's government-run health care system would bankrupt our country. Rationing health care would

destroy the greatest medical care system in the history of the world, and the Clinton payroll tax would bankrupt tens of thousands of small businesses and put millions of Americans out of work. But that's not the worst of it. The worst part of Bill Clinton's plan is not that it costs us our money and our jobs. It costs us our freedom. When my mama gets sick, I want her to talk to a doctor, not a bureaucrat. And so help me God, on that issue there will be no compromise.

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I've got some good news for you and bad news for Bill Clinton. There is a big

difference between Elvis and the President's health care plan because Elvis may be out there alive and well somewhere, but the Clinton health care plan is dead. Republicans want to make insurance portable so you can change jobs without losing your insurance. We want to make it permanent so it can't be taken away if you get sick. We want to reform medical liability. We want to let people establish tax-free medical savings accounts. And we want the American people to decide in the 1994 elections whether the government should run our health care system.

I don't claim that I know the ultimate solution to the root causes of violent crime in America. I yield to no one in my desire to find and eliminate the root causes. But there is one part of the crime problem that I know how to solve. We do not have to live with the situation where each morning's newspaper tells of some violent criminal who has been convicted of five or six brutal crimes but is out on the streets again and has just killed somebody's child. I know how to solve that problem. How? By putting predator criminals in prison and keeping them there. And we can reduce the cost of keeping them in prison if we stop building prisons like Holiday Inns. And while we're at it, let's make prisoners work to pay for the cost of their prison stay.

There have been a half dozen public opinion polls taken this spring showing that for the first time Americans don't believe their children are going to do better than they have done. Never in my mother's life did she believe that. Neither of my parents graduated from high school. But my mother had a dream before I was born that I was going to college. I fought it. They kept trying to inoculate me with learning. I failed the third, seventh and ninth grades. But my mama prodded me all the way through college to a Ph.D. in economics. In the world we grew up in, mother's dreams did not die easily in America.

I want to bring back the American Dream for those of us who know it, and I want to share it with those who have never known it. We need to win the 1994 elections. We need to re-elect Terry Branstad. We need to win control of the Senate and the House. And in 1996 we'll have a Republican President and a Republican majority in both Houses of Congress.

As I said in the prayer opening a luncheon kicking off the 1994 campaign the other day, "Lord, if you give us control of our government again, this time we won't waste it."

**SENATE PASSES DOLE/MOSELEY-BRAUN AMENDMENT PROVIDING \$100 MILLION
FOR HUMANITARIAN ASSISTANCE; HELPS ADMINISTRATION
RESPOND TO COLOSSAL RWANDAN CRISIS**

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Senate this morning unanimously approved an amendment by Senate Republican Leader Bob Dole (R-Kansas) and Senator Carol Moseley-Braun (D-Illinois) allowing the President to transfer \$100 million in humanitarian relief for Rwanda from other international programs in the legislation. The amendment was added to the 1995 Commerce, Justice, State, and Judiciary Appropriations Bill.

Senator Dole's statement delivered on the Senate floor follows:

"The scenes of the flood of Rwandan refugees are heartbreaking. Husbands watching their wives die; children alone on the side of the road, next to their dead parents. The situation in Zaire is a humanitarian catastrophe of staggering proportions. Around two million Rwandans have crossed the border into Zaire, only to find severe shortages of food and water. And now, we hear news of an outbreak of cholera which could make the current death tolls skyrocket.

"The international relief organizations were clearly not prepared for this massive flood of Rwandan refugees. I welcome the action taken by the Clinton administration to send A.I.D. Administrator Brian Atwood to assess the situation and the decision to commit an additional \$41 million dollars to provide assistance to needy Rwandans. However, looking at our experience with the humanitarian crisis in Somalia and in Bosnia, these funds will be rapidly expended and more assistance will be needed. We're talking about nearly two million refugees in Zaire -- with little food, little water, no shelter, and no sanitation.

"And so, this amendment is intended to provide the administration with sufficient resources to respond to this colossal crisis. These funds could be used for any type of humanitarian assistance -- food, water, water purification supplies, sanitation equipment, or medicine and medical supplies. It seems to me that America has a responsibility to respond quickly and appropriately to this humanitarian nightmare -- I have no doubt that the American people care about suffering Rwandans and support the U.S. government providing the aid they so desperately need."

Senator Moseley-Braun issued the following statement:

"The magnitude of this humanitarian tragedy compels us to act. The Congress and the President must work together to provide assistance to the Rwandan refugees dying by the hundreds each day in refugee camps. Our humanitarian assistance will save lives. We must do what is right."

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
