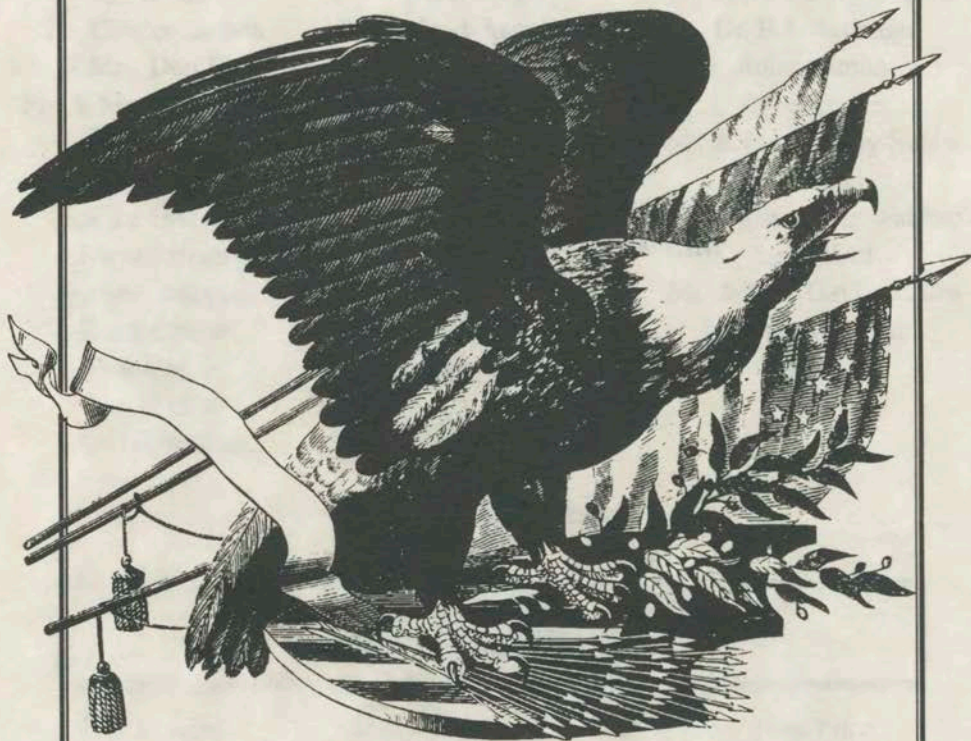

RE: Oklahoma Agriculture Issues

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○ AG PRODUCTION

The wheat grain/stocker cattle enterprise accounts for 75 percent of the agriculture revenues generated in Oklahoma. Other major production includes cotton, peanuts, hay, sorghum, corn and oats.

○ FARM ORGANIZATIONS

Unfortunately, many of the national farm organizations (National Cattlemen's Association & National Cotton Council) have shortsightedly contributed to McCurdy and not Inhofe.

Within the state, conservative organizations include the Oklahoma Farm Bureau, Oklahoma Cattlemens Association, and the Oklahoma Grain & Stocker Producers. Moderate to liberal organizations include the Oklahoma Farmers Union and the Oklahoma Wheat Growers Association.

○ PRIVATE PROPERTY RIGHTS

Private property rights initiatives are very important to Oklahoma farmers and ranchers...especially wetlands and endangered species reform.

Both Inhofe and McCurdy have cosponsored wetlands reform in the House.

Only Inhofe has cosponsored endangered species reform.

Only Inhofe has cosponsored the two major property rights bills: the Private Property Rights Act of 1994, and the Private Property Owners Bill of Rights.

○ ANTI-AGRICULTURE VOTES

McCurdy recently voted for a maritime subsidy bill which dramatically increased vessel tonnage taxes. This would increase the annual tax on a ship carrying Oklahoma wheat to Europe from \$67,500 to \$228,000. Inhofe did not vote.

McCurdy voted in 1986 to override the President's veto of the textile quota bill, endangering retaliation against Oklahoma wheat exports.

## Congress's Secret Drawer

The ongoing drama in the Capitol makes it clearer than ever that Congress can't control either itself or its budget. A large part of the problem is procedure, an arcane set of rules evolved over the years to let Congresspersons protect each other and keep constituents in the dark. Rep. Jim Inhofe has launched a campaign against the keystone of these rules, the veil of secrecy covering a device called the discharge petition.

It works like this: The House conspires to bottle up in committee all the bills that are popular in the country but unpopular on Capitol Hill—balancing

the budget or limiting terms, for example. The Rules Committee is particularly crucial, as it was in shelving civil rights bills in the 1950s.

The Rules Committee simply sits on a bill, allowing members to posture in public in support while never having to vote on it, much less enact it.

The discharge petition is supposed to serve as a protection; a bill can be forced onto the floor if a majority of Members sign a petition. But that rarely succeeds, because until the required number of 218 is reached, the list of signers is kept strictly secret. So Members can still posture in public and effectively vote the other way in secret, even co-sponsoring a bill but refusing to sign its discharge petition. Worse, only House leaders know who has signed, and when a petition nears 218 they can pressure the most pliable members to drop off.

Discharge petition procedures

have the flavor of a covert brotherhood rather than a representative body. Petitions are kept locked in a drawer at the clerk's desk. The drawer can only be opened during a House session and only a signing Member can see a petition. Members cannot take any notes, and can't even bring their own pens to the desk. They must read a statement signed by the Speaker noting that disclosing any names on the petition is strictly prohibited under the precedents of the House, a prohibition imposed in 1931 by Speaker John Nance Garner, but never made part of House Rules. Violators face disciplinary action, up to and including expulsion.

Rep. Inhofe was granted floor time last night to dare House leaders to carry out this threat. Mr. Inhofe filed a bill to require that signatures on a discharge petition be made public, and it was promptly assigned to the Rules Committee for burial. So he started a discharge petition to bring it to the floor, and quietly asked each signer to memorize other names on the list; by now he's painstakingly assembled a list of 200 signers, only 18 short of a majority. He revealed last night that he will disclose the names of all Members who have not signed the petition, and is ready to face any disciplinary action against him.

As a public service, we've agreed to print his list as Congress leaves Washington to visit its home constituencies. Watch this space to learn if your Congressperson wants secrecy or openness in government. Of course, Members not on Mr. Inhofe's petition can sign up for openness before leaving town. As he advised his colleagues last night: "It's just one short trip to the secret drawer to sign discharge petition No. 2. Take a friend."

ENERGY

The main issue in Texas and Oklahoma is what needs to be done to save the domestic oil industry. Oil prices are below the cost of operating many U.S. wells causing problems for independent producers. U.S. oil imports are at an all time high. Imports as a percentage of U.S. consumption hit 58% in July. Sen. Boren, as head of the Oil & Gas Coalition, presented a package of incentives to President Clinton in June which included tax credits, regulatory relief and legislative initiatives. No action has been taken on these initiatives to date. The tax credit is seen as crucial as it would allow marginal well operators to either depreciate their equipment or assist with their current cash flow problems. Sen. Nickles is supportive of Boren proposal. A tax credit for marginal production is the primary focus of support. The Independent producers cannot operate the wells at this level of production and the low prices. Enclosed is a summary of the Oil and Gas Coalition proposal to the President, an oil & gas industry status sheet, and President Clinton's response to Sen. Boren regarding the Oil and Gas Coalition proposal.

ENVIRONMENT

Tulsa and Oklahoma City are both sensitive to Clean Air Act standards. Tulsa especially has taken steps to ensure it does not break the ozone thresholds.

BUSINESS

Tinker Air Force base is the second largest employer in the entire state, next to state government, with 22,000 employees. Employees live in 37 counties from Kansas to Texas. Although not on the list for base closure, but need to reaffirm support to keep it open. McCurdy is implying that BRAC is a political process and that he is needed to keep Tinker open. Nickles stresses that it is an independent commission and we need a republican senate to secure funding so that we don't have to close Tinker.

TRANSPORTATION

Inhofe is a big supporter aerospace industry. He helped out on civil aviation bill, which is of importance to Oklahoma.



### Tax Incentives

#### **I. Tax Credit to Preserve Marginal Production**

- \* Provide a \$3 per barrel tax credit for the first 3 barrels of daily production from existing marginal oil wells.
- \* Provide a \$0.50 per Mcf tax credit for the first 18 Mcf of daily natural gas production from a marginal well.

#### **Tax Credit to Encourage New Drilling**

- \* Provide a tax credit of \$3 per barrel for the first 15 barrels of daily oil production (for new wells drilled after June 1, 1994).
- \* Provide a tax credit of \$0.50 per Mcf for the first 300 Mcf of daily gas production (new wells after June 1, 1994).

#### **Phase Out**

- \* Both tax credits will be phased out as prices (based on BTU equivalents) for oil and natural gas rise.

Oil -- phase out between \$14 and \$20  
Gas -- phase out between \$2.49 and \$3.55

Both tax credits must be creditable against regular tax and Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT).

#### **II. Additional Legislative Initiatives**

- \* Urge the Administration to support the current expensing of geological and geophysical (G & G) costs.
- \* Eliminate the Net Income Limitations on Percentage Depletion. Depletion deduction currently limited to 100% of income from the property, and the deduction from all properties cannot exceed 65% of taxable income. Many producers have little or no income, so they are unable to fully use the deductions from percentage depletion.

#### **III. Regulatory Relief**

- \* Oil Pollution Act (OPA) of 1990. Reduce the financial liability under the OPA and change the definition of "Navigable Waterways" to exclude onshore facilities.
- \* Royalty Reduction. Reassess U.S. Royalty laws.
  1. The existing royalty reduction for marginal oil wells on public lands (onshore) should be expanded to include marginal natural gas wells.
  2. The royalty reduction for offshore production should be extended for new activity, especially deep water and other frontier areas, and marginal properties.
  3. Support legislation that would temporarily suspend the collection of royalties from wells in deep water (e.g. S.318).
- \* Rework "Reinventing Government" proposals to reduce the penalty proposals on royalty collections.
- \* Headoff proposed revised (and costly) EPA regulations being developed for Underground Injection Control. The problem can be solved by enforcing existing regs.
- \* Headoff the Dept. of Interior and Commerce's proposed regs to impose liability on natural resource producers for injuries caused by hazardous discharges. Litigation concern: Damages could include emotional loss of persons who do not suffer from direct contact or use of the natural resources.
- \* Headoff Interior Dept. review of leasing on public lands in order to promote "ecosystem management." Current law is based on "multiple use" (including O&G leasing activity) and should be continued.
- \* Abolish the existing prohibitions against the export of domestic crude oil production.
- \* Consideration of a per barrel tax credit to encourage new production from the Outer Continental Shelf and frontier areas.

### State of the U.S. O & G Industry

- \* **JOB LOSS:** The oil price collapse that began in October 1993 has cost 22,500 more Americans their jobs in the U.S. O & G producing industry. Those job losses come on top of nearly 500,000 industry jobs lost since the mid-1980s.
- \* **IMPORTS:** Oil imports have never been higher, pushing U.S. import dependency to 49.5% of U.S. petroleum consumption.
- \* **OIL PRICES:** have been below the costs of operating many U.S. wells. Avg. 1993 wellhead prices of crude oil were estimated at \$14.26/bl., down from \$15.99/bl. in 1992.
- \* **U.S. OIL PRODUCTION:** averaged only 6.8 million barrels per day in 1993, the lowest level in 30 years. Since 1986, U.S. oil production has dropped by 1.7 million barrels per day.
- \* **Drilling:** the last 2 years have been the worst on record for U.S. drilling. The avg. weekly rig count for 1993 stood at a mere 754 rigs working, just slightly above 1992's all-time record low of 721.

Dear David:

I want to thank you for your leadership in organizing the meeting with your colleagues on oil and gas policy issues. The Administration shares your interest in the strength and competitiveness of this important industry.

Our June 16 meeting was very helpful in clarifying the issues facing the oil and gas industry and your proposed remedies. I would like to suggest the following steps:

First, regarding marginal wells, I would like to work with Congress to identify policies that can extend the margin of economic production while ensuring revenue neutrality. Provisions to extend the economic life of stripper wells onshore, as well as royalty relief for marginal new fields starting up in the deep water Gulf of Mexico could be such policies.

Second, regarding Alaska oil exports, I would like to achieve the benefits of lifting the existing ban without triggering other concerns, such as trade-related problems or adverse consequences for the U.S. maritime industry. The Administration is making a strong effort to reach a resolution on these issues.

I have asked the National Economic Council to continue to coordinate relevant agencies in moving forward with you in these two areas. Additionally, I have asked OMB's Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs to ensure that rulemakings about which members expressed concerns at the meeting are faithful to the regulatory philosophy of my executive order, which calls for assessing all costs and benefits of available regulatory alternatives and selecting approaches which maximize net benefits.

Thank you again for your very constructive initiative. I look forward to working with you to identify and adopt policies that benefit the oil and gas industry and the nation.

**POLITICAL UPDATE**

- The Oklahoma political environment is very encouraging for Republicans. Although historically Democrat on the state and local level, Republicans have run strongly for President (1992: Bush 43%) and Senate (1992: Nickles 59%), and half of the state's congressmen are Republicans (Jim Inhofe, Ernest Istook, Frank Lucas). This spring, Lucas soundly defeated a Boren protégé in a special congressional election (CD 6) focused largely on Clinton. For state offices, Republicans are mounting a strong challenge led by former Reagan official Frank Keating against the backdrop of a scandal damaging outgoing Governor David Walters (D). Walters has pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor campaign violation, but is reconsidering his earlier announcement not to seek reelection.
- Congressman Jim Inhofe (R) lost the Governor's race to Boren in 1974, was elected Mayor of Tulsa in 1978, 1980 and 1982, but then lost reelection in 1984. He was elected to Congress in 1986, when he won the open seat (CD 1 - Tulsa) created by Jim Jones' run against Don Nickles for the Senate. Publicity about a lawsuit Inhofe filed against his brother contributed to his narrow 52% reelection in 1988. After revelations that he was forced to pay the FDIC nearly \$600,000 to settle outstanding promissory notes, Inhofe struggled to win reelection again in 1992 with 53% in a district that gave George Bush 49%. Early reactions to Inhofe's Senate candidacy among the PAC community have been lukewarm, with many expressing doubts about his viability against McCurdy. Inhofe is strongly conservative, with an ACU rating of 100% in 1991 and 96% in 1992.



- **Congressman Dave McCurdy (D)** was first elected to Congress in 1980 (CD 4 - Oklahoma city and southwest) after a brief stint as a private attorney, preceded by two years as Oklahoma Assistant Attorney General. He has easily won reelection, winning 71% in 1992. Although considered moderate-to-conservative by some observers, he has cast many liberal votes, including support for Clinton's tax hikes and the "stimulus" bill.
- The Oklahoma primary took place on August 23 with the following results: **Congressman Jim Inhofe** defeated State Representative Tony Caldwell, 78%-22%, and **Congressman Dave McCurdy** defeated Cody Graves, 65%-35%. The seat is considered a "toss-up" in the *Rothenberg Political Report* (8/17) because even though McCurdy is a "DLC-type Democrat," he will have to overcome the Clinton handicap. In fact, recent surveys conducted in July and August have Clinton's disapproval at 70%.
- Separately, the big news from the August 23 primary is that Democrat Congressman Mike Synar failed to reach 50% and thus has to go to a runoff. In the open McCurdy seat, Corporation Commissioner J.C. Watts, the former University of Oklahoma football star and the highest ranking elected black Republican in the country, handily won the 5-way GOP primary (49%) though he failed to reach 50%. Thus, he too will have a runoff.

### McCurdy Out of Touch

**T**HERE can be little doubt U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy has been in Congress too long. He has forgotten how to think like an Oklahoman.

Sunday's vote for President Bill Clinton's crime bill is only the latest of betrayals by McCurdy, who has tried to convince Oklahoma voters he is a moderate.

McCurdy opposes term limits for members of Congress, supported gun control legislation and has voted to support President Clinton's legislative program 90 percent of the time, more than any other member of Oklahoma's delegation and even more than far leftists like U.S. Sen. Ted Kennedy.

Voters should have been forewarned when McCurdy campaigned for Clinton in the New Hampshire presidential primary and seconded Clinton's nomination in a speech to the 1992 Democratic National Convention.

## On McCurdy's Vote

ONCE again Oklahoma's Dave McCurdy has helped pull Bill Clinton's political chestnuts out of the fire.

From his position on the House Armed Services Committee, McCurdy gave Clinton valuable support for his proposal to allow avowed homosexuals in the military. While he voted against the final version of the 1993 budget bill, he had given significant rhetorical backing to the Clinton tax increase.

McCurdy has repeatedly sided with Clinton on gun control legislation, and Sunday he helped pass a highly flawed \$30.2 billion crime bill — a victory the president desperately needed after losing badly in an earlier attempt. The bill, which bans about 180 types of firearms, was opposed by all five other Oklahoma House members.

The Norman Democrat said he was pleased that House negotiators had been able to "strip the pork from the bill." But although the price tag was trimmed by \$3.8 billion, the bill still contained \$7 billion in social welfare spending masquerading as "crime prevention."

The revised crime bill provided less for prison construction than the previous version. It also would not allow federal judges to sentence aliens convicted of violent

crimes but require that they be released into the streets pending deportation proceedings.

The Aug. 11 defeat of the administration's anti-crime package was highly symbolic, because it depicted a weakened president who could not whip his own party into line on a popular election year issue. Yet the modified bill was still so faulty that 64 Democrats rejected Clinton's personal lobbying efforts.

The next move is up to the Senate, where McCurdy aspires to sit next year. That body preserves a much higher degree of independence, which might cramp the style of someone who would ignore his conservative constituents' views to rescue a politically crippled president.

## Update

1990 Republican gubernatorial nominee Bill Price endorsed former HUD General Counsel Frank Keating for the GOP nomination. He called Keating the "most qualified candidate ever to run for the office of governor of the state of Oklahoma." In a talk before the Oklahoma Academy for State Goals, Keating said that violent crimes in Oklahoma have increased by 50% since 1984. Violent criminals would receive no pardons, no commutations and no toleration in a Keating administration. He is also a former state and U.S. prosecutor.

On May 5, 14-year state Senator Bernice Shedrick announced her candidacy for the Democratic nomination. She is chairwoman of the Senate Education Committee and played a role in a recently passed education reform bill. She calls herself a moderate, and she comes from a district that the Associated Press called Republican. She referred to herself as "conservative" on state spending issues, but is author of a juvenile justice bill that may result in tax increases. In what was noteworthy for whom she did not mention, Shedrick cited independent candidate Wes Watkins and incumbent Governor David Walters as two potential candidates she could beat. (Walters is not expected to join the race.) She made no mention of the favorite for the Democratic nomination, Lieutenant Governor Jack Mildren.

Mildren introduced his "Blueprint for Oklahoma's Future" on June 1. He called for stronger ethics laws, more stringent requirements for welfare recipients and more prison space. He wants to have more expensive fines for ethics violations. His welfare plan would cut off benefits after two years. He labeled his program "a no-new-taxes kind of plan."



A Political Media Research/Mason Dixon poll, conducted April 29-May 2 found that Mildren was leading Mrs. Shedrick 38%-13% (margin of error +/- 5%). Keating was leading for the Republican nomination over state Senator Jerry Pierce, 30%-23% (margin of error +/- 7%). Mildren and Watkins led both of the Republican candidates in the general election matchups. Many state Democrats continue to worry that Watkins will "siphon away" Democratic votes in the general election.

Governor Walters surprised the state political establishment when he told an Oklahoma newspaper that he has not determined whether to seek a second term. In November 1993, Governor Walters had said he would not seek reelection. However, in an interview with *The Tulsa World* June 23, Governor Walters said that he would not be able to dispel rumors on the matter because, "I haven't decided." *The Tulsa World* also reported that Walters is commissioning a poll to help him decide.

#### INHOFE CONTINUES FIGHT FOR BALANCING FEDERAL BUDGET

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Jim Inhofe announced today that he has introduced H.R. 4815, a bipartisan bill, entitled "The Congressional Fiscal Responsibility Act of 1994". The bill's original co-sponsors are Peter Barca (D-WI), Jim Nussle (R-IA) and Jim Traficant (D-OH).

The bill would force Congress to balance the Federal budget in the years 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2001. A budget will be considered balanced when expenditures of the government are equal to or less than receipts. If the budget is not balanced, each Member of Congress will face a 5% pay cut in 1998, 10% in 1999, 10% in 2000 and 10% in 2001, for a total salary reduction of 35%.

Inhofe said, "In 1989 the Congress voted to raise its pay 40% or \$35,000. Since that time, there has been a huge increase in the deficit, meaning that Congress is rewarding itself while their spending has gone out of control. Every family and businessperson in America understands that if they operate in a fiscally responsible manner, they prosper, while if they operate in the red, they suffer the financial consequences. It is time for Congress to face the real world and understand they cannot spend the U.S. into financial oblivion without hurting their own salary. This should get their attention.

We came close on the balanced budget amendment to the Constitution this year by gaining 271 votes, just 12 short of the 2/3 needed. We cannot lose this momentum. The future of our economy, our children and grandchildren is at stake."

According to the President's own budget forecasts, the national debt, owed by every American, will rise to an astounding sum of almost \$6,500,000,000,000 (\$6.5 trillion) by 1999. The same forecasts indicate that future generations of Americans will be forced to pay as much as 93% of their earnings in taxes in order to meet the debt load if something is not done.

Congressman Inhofe added, "The national debt is not just a fiscal issue, but a moral one. I, for one, don't want to face the children of America when they begin to understand the monumental fiscal injustices they will encounter in the future because of Congress' spending habits. If we are going to tackle the debt, let's do it now, before it's too late."

### End Congress's Gag Rule

We promised in this space recently to publish the names of all the Members of the House of Representatives who refused to sign Rep. Jim Inhofe's petition to reform the secretive "discharge petition" process. That list appears below.

Americans overwhelmingly favor term limits, a line-item veto and a balanced-budget amendment. But getting those issues a hearing on the House floor is nearly impossible because hostile House leaders can bottle them up in the Rules Committee. Rep. Inhofe is risking the leadership's wrath by blowing the whistle on the process they use to hold bills hostage.

The only way to dislodge bills from committee is if 218 Members—a House majority—sign a discharge petition. But because the list is strictly secret, the Speaker can easily squash such petitions by pressuring Members to drop off. Only 44 of 490 discharge petitions have ever succeeded.

Congress's secret list allows Members to practice a form of hypocrisy. They can publicly support popular bills while quietly withholding their names from the document that would help them become law.

Rep. Inhofe says it's time voters learned where their representatives really stand. His bill to make the secret list public is, of course, shelved in

committee. So just before Congress recessed, he announced that he would release to us the names of the 223 Members who had not signed a discharge petition for his bill.

Listed Members were informed by Rep. Inhofe that their names would be published. At one point the list of those who hadn't signed his petition had only 217 names. But when Mr. Inhofe came within one signature of the House majority he needed, six Members suddenly removed their names from his petition. Those Members who backed out appear below in bold.

Two others co-sponsored Mr. Inhofe's bill but didn't sign his petition. Rep. Martin Meehan calls this an oversight, and he will sign. Rep. James Hayes may sign, but he "prefers to be asked rather than told."

Rules Committee Chairman Joe Moakley is clearly worried. Last week, he faxed Members a letter suggesting that they call colleagues on the Inhofe petition "to ask them to reconsider their support."

A number of groups, including some tied to Ross Perot, are now up to speed on how arcane rules distort the legislative process. Don't be surprised if a fair number of voters now try to convince their Members that the time has come to give up their secret rites.

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## Perot Supports Boren, Inhofe In Reform Aims

WASHINGTON — Calling Sen. David Boren and Rep. Jim Inhofe "men of high ideals who stand on principle," former independent presidential candidate Ross Perot said his supporters are trying to help the two Oklahomans win passage of their congressional reform proposals.

In a telephone interview last week, Perot said

members of United We Stand, America had "really been working" to persuade their own congressional delegations to help Inhofe open up the process used for forcing votes on controversial issues.

"All across the country, we are tapping every congressman on the shoulder" about Inhofe's proposal, Perot said. "I think it's paid off."

Danny Finnerty, a

spokesman for Inhofe, said Perot's group had helped "enormously."

"They've been a driving force in this thing," Finnerty said.

Inhofe has sponsored a resolution to change the discharge petition process, which can force the House to vote on controversial bills that have

been buried in committees.

The Tulsa Republican wants the names of those signing a discharge petition to be made public from the beginning. Under current House rules, the signatures can't be made public until a majority — 218 — members have signed.

Inhofe said the secrecy rule allows a House member to express support for legislation such as a balanced-budget amendment but then refuse to sign a discharge petition to force it out of committee.

Perot said the House leadership buries any legislation it doesn't want to

consider, but that Inhofe's proposal would bring more public pressure for votes.

Opponents say, however, that special-interest groups will use the petitions to pressure lawmakers.

Inhofe's own proposal has been buried in the House Rules Committee, and Inhofe has been working to get enough signatures on a discharge petition to force a vote on it.

A showdown may come this week when Congress returns from its August recess.

Finnerty said that, with the help of Perot's group and others, Inhofe had been gaining support. But congressional leaders have been putting pressure on members not to sign or to remove their names if they have signed, he said.

"There's no way to know where we will be on the exact number till they get back," Finnerty said. "There's no way to speculate. I have no idea about what the leadership has been able to accomplish."

Meanwhile, Perot said Boren, D-Seminole, was admired by members of United We Stand, but he declined to say whether Boren should run for national office.

Perot and Boren are longtime friends and speak regularly together about a variety of issues, leading to some speculation that Boren — who has harbored thoughts of running for president but would have great difficulty getting the Democratic Party nomination — might want to run for president as a United We Stand candidate or as Perot's running mate, should Perot choose to run again in 1996.

Perot got 19 percent of the U.S. vote last year as an independent presidential candidate — 23 percent in Oklahoma — but has not said whether he will run again in 1996.

The Texas businessman said he had never talked to Boren about running for national office but that Boren had the qualifications and "a wonderful mind."

"We certainly have the highest regard for Senator Boren in our organization," he said.

He said Inhofe and Boren were

principle and cannot be bought."

Perot said "we saw a lot of people bought off" during the fight over the federal budget but that Boren had resisted appeals to vote for the package for the sake of Clinton and the Democratic Party.

Perot testified before the Joint Committee on the Organization of Congress in March. Boren is chairman of that panel, which is examining ways to make Congress more efficient and accountable.

Perot last week said congressional reform was a top priority of United We Stand and that the group was planning to run ads warning representatives that their actions would be remembered at election time next year.

He said the group wanted to see an end to the revolving door that allows former U.S. government officials to go to work as lobbyists for foreign countries. Perot said former officials should only be allowed to provide Congress with information, not campaign money, junkets or anything else of value.

"Americans' interests need to be taken care of, not the interests of the foreign nations," Perot said.

Boren has authored a bill that would tighten lobbying restrictions on former government employees, but it is not part of the reform committee's agenda.

Perot said the group also wants a line-item veto for the president, a constitutional amendment mandating a balanced federal budget, and a term-limit bill that would be tied to the economic performance of the government.

He said, "The president's economic plan never balances the budget. It gets it down to a \$200 billion increase in the debt by the year 1994, then it takes off again and goes back up to \$400 billion by the year 2001."

"Assuming we had a plan that would balance the budget by the year 2000, then we would want a term-limits plan passed that goes into effect if Congress does not stay on the schedule it projects."

Boren's committee is not expected to include term limits or a balanced budget as part of its plan.

## For Inhofe, It's An Air War

### He's Using Talk Radio to Drum Up Support for Balanced-Budget Rule

U.S. Rep. Jim Inhofe, R-Okla., has taken to the radio airways coast-to-coast in an effort to force congressional approval of a balanced-budget amendment.

He says he will win.

The issue faces a Feb. 22 showdown in the Senate, where passage would send it to the House for a crucial vote in March.

The issue fell nine votes short in the House in 1992, but this year Inhofe is counting on congressional freshmen, election-year politics and radio to round up the votes.

Lawmakers in the 100-member Senate tried to revive the 1992 issue, but they couldn't muster the 60 votes required to break a Democratic filibuster.

Inhofe is the point man for a bipartisan group of eight co-sponsors in the House and Senate, including conservatives and liberals, who have forced the Senate vote on the issue.

Last week he began 75 interviews with radio stations and networks across the country. Some of the interviews are carried on a single station, but others are on networks with as many as 1,000 stations.

From his Tulsa office Monday, Inhofe voiced his views over stations in Baltimore and Dallas.

Then with Watergate conspirator G. Gordon Liddy, a radio host in Virginia, he reached a network of 167 stations.

Tuesday, Inhofe was back in Washington, where he spoke to the USA Radio Network, which serves 1,051 stations across the country.

Also on his Tuesday schedule were discussions with a station in San Antonio and one in San Diego, and an interview by the Washington-based National Empowerment Network, a cable service.

In his radio appearances, Inhofe is targeting lawmakers who have not signed a resolution to balance the budget.

He told the Baltimore talk show host that his group had four targets in the House. Then he named them, and urged listeners to write them and demand they vote for a balanced-budget measure.

Inhofe figures that the issue has 270 votes in the 434-member House and needs 20 more to gain the two-thirds required to adopt a resolution for a constitutional amendment.

"I can assure you we will have those 20 before the first week in March," Inhofe said.

An Inhofe aide said that if Congress approved the amendment, it would need ratification by two-thirds — 38 — of the 50 state legislatures to be adopted.

Inhofe said he would do a second round of talk shows and answer listeners' calls on the eve of the Senate showdown, but believes he will have the required votes by then.

During his interviews, Inhofe has several papers spread in front of him containing the points he

wants to make.

One list is of lawmakers who voted for and against similar legislation in 1992.

Another lists uncommitted lawmakers in selected radio markets.

A third outlines his arguments for the amendment.

Inhofe is quick to point out that this is not a conservative cause only. The amendment's key sponsor in the Senate is Sen. Paul Simon, D-Ill., a liberal, Inhofe says.

During the talk shows, Inhofe repeats stories he said came from Simon.

He quotes Simon as saying, "If I could add one amendment to the Constitution, it would be to prohibit the federal government from borrowing money."

Another quote he attributes to Simon:

"There were so many heroes at the Alamo because there was no back door. Congress needs a situation where there is no easy way to escape."

Inhofe used a similar media plan last year to make known the names of lawmakers who had not signed petitions to bring up legislative matters. The names on the petitions had previously been kept secret.

"We use this mechanism to end run around Congress and go to the people, and it worked," the fourth-term House member said.

All of Oklahoma's congressmen, except Democrat Mike Synar, favor the measure, Inhofe said.

**T**HERE can be little doubt U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy has been in Congress too long. He has forgotten how to think like an Oklahoman.

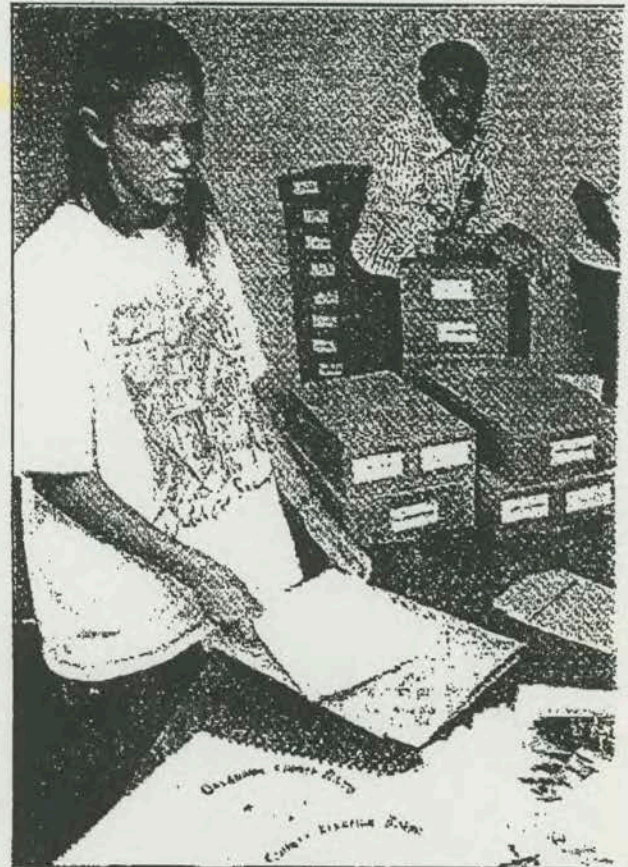

# Congress Primaries Becoming

## 2-Party Affairs

It's always been Democrats against Democrats in state congressional races at primary election time. This time, it's also Republicans against Republicans as Oklahoma appears to be moving toward a stronger two-party system.

The most fiery clashes have appeared on the Republican side of the ticket in the U.S. 4th Congressional District in the central and southwestern parts of Oklahoma and in the U.S.

1st Congressional District in the northeast.

Those races both drew a slew of candidates after two congressmen, Democrat Dave McCurdy of Norman and Republican Jim Inhofe of Tulsa, announced for the U.S. Senate seat being vacated by Sen. David Boren, D-Seminole.

The congressional seats are up for grabs at a time when Tinker Air Force Base is being threatened with possible closure in the next round of defense cuts; an issue key to the 4th District race.

State Democratic Chairman Mike Turpen says the GOP is engaged "in civil wars."

State Republican Chairman Clinton Key is not as glad as Turpen that infighting among candidates is occurring on the GOP side. He says negative campaigning and personal attacks often backfire and hurt the entire party.

Nevertheless, Mike Warkentin, a tax attorney and newcomer to Republican politics, has attacked 4th District frontrunner J.C. Watts' financial dealings at every turn. He pointed out a home foreclosure in the '80s, and unpaid bills and liens.

Warkentin, 36, says he's curious how Watts could become the major owner of a multimillion-dollar apartment complex after becoming statewide corporation commissioner, despite his financial history.

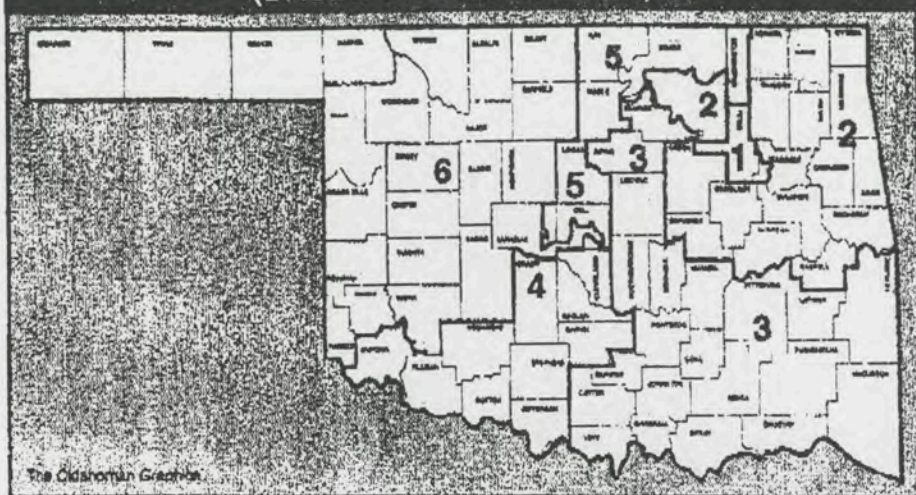
Watts, 36, proudly notes that he is the only candidate who has held statewide office.

He says his experience as a businessman shows that he is a risk-taker, and that he's paid — or is paying — his old debts.

The former University of Oklahoma quarterback says his visibility throughout the district comes via his work as a youth minister, especially in working with young Christian athletes.

The Watts team is predicting a victory without a runoff. And when the field is narrowed, he is

expected to draw national support.

State Rep. Ed Apple, R-Duncan, is silent on the Warkentin-Watts tiff hoping the voters will examine the records of the candidates.

He points out that in 1990, the Democrats brought out the big guns — Boren, McCurdy and others — and tried to lock Apple out of his House seat, but Apple survived as a Republican in the Democrat-dominated southwestern part of the state.

State House minority leader Larry Ferguson, R-Cleveland, said he believes Apple would have a better chance than Watts in November against a Democrat.

Like Rep. Frank Lucas, the new 6th District incumbent, elected in special election earlier this year, Apple already has won in Democrat territory where Watts is untied. Apple could garner Republican support in the Norman area, Ferguson said.

Apple said he's helped Duncan acquire industry by cutting through bureaucratic red tape, but utilizing government help at the same time.

Every candidate espouses a deep concern for survival of all of Oklahoma's military bases, although some candidates think they could do it better than others.

Republican Howard Bell, 70, who has run as a Democrat in other races, is on the ballot. Bell, who lists his occupation as insurance, is from Blanchard. The other contender on the GOP side is R. Peter Saker, 71, who is retired from the military.

On the Democratic side, the candidates are Tully McCoy, 46, district attorney for Cleveland, McClain and Garvin counties.

His main platform has been crime, "the number one issue in this country," a theme he repeats over and over in his campaigning.

As district attorney for 12 years, McCoy probably has more name

recognition than any of the other Democrats. "I have already done it," he said as far as holding political office.

Democratic candidate John Clark, 50, retired commander of Tinker Air Force Base, makes a similar point stressing that his area of expertise is the military and he knows how to show that the air depot is vital.

Clark's late entry into the race has rankled some longtime Democrats, although others predict his military background will get him and McCoy into the runoff.

In the central part of the district, David Perryman, 37, a Chickasha attorney in a law firm with 26 employees, stresses the economic importance of Tinker. He said he has worked with several communities in the Chickasha area and throughout the district proving he is a good negotiator.

Meanwhile, Wayne Krug, 34, an attorney from Lawton, is hoping McCoy and Clark will split the votes in the northern part of the district while Perryman's support is concentrated around Chickasha.

Krug said he's hoping his base of support will come from Lawton and the southern part of the district, which could toss him into the runoff.

At a Thursday candidates' forum, Krug made the point that Oklahoma has lost about 9,000 jobs among small independents in the oil industry, and he would work to make national laws more conducive to Oklahoma's oil needs.

Another Democrat, candidate J.W. Chandler, 60, took a conservative stance on most issues, stressing morality as the key word in moving the government forward. The Blanchard resident is retired from the state Department of Agriculture.

Regarding term limits, he takes a hands-off approach saying the people have the right to vote out any



congressman they don't want.

Term limits need to be imposed on the chairmen of the major congressional committees in Washington, Chandler said.

Krug took the strongest stance against term limits, saying passing that state question on the runoff ballot Sept. 20, could be "a terrible detriment" to the state of Oklahoma, giving more populated states the edge. He said term limits would work only if they were "equally applied."

In the Tulsa area, six Republicans are jockeying for position in the U.S. 1st District race.

Former football star Steve Largent, 39, has "somewhat the edge because of name recognition," party Chairman Key said.

Former state Rep. Rob Johnson, 39, received the endorsement of the Tulsa World newspaper.

Most of the campaign battling has been between Largent and candidate Paula Unruh, former state GOP chairwoman.

Unruh, 62, charged that Largent should raise money at home rather than from his Seattle football friends where he played professional ball for 14 years with the Seahawks.

Largent answered that he has support from several spheres and is proud of his community service in that state.

Meanwhile, Joan Hastings, 62, a former state legislator and county clerk, also is running, along with former Tulsa mayor Dick Crawford, 60.

Richard Bunn, 48, an engineer who garnered 30 percent of the vote against Inhofe in his last bid for re-election, also is running.

The winner on the GOP side will face Tulsa oil man Stuart Price, 38, in the November general election.

Turpen believes Democrat Price could pull off a huge surprise in November by capturing the seat held for years by the Republicans. Last week, Turpen said, Price raised \$50,000 at a fund raiser where he was introduced by Tulsa Mayor Susan Savage.

In the U.S. 2nd District, longtime Democratic incumbent Mike Synar, 43, faces two Democrats in the primary who are without name recognition or big campaign treasures. They are Bill Vardeman, 71, of Fort Gibson and Virgil Cooper, 71, of Drumright.

But in the general, Synar will face one of three Republicans where a more severe contest is expected. Jerry Hill, 54, of Muskogee, who drew 41 percent of the vote

against Synar in 1992, is back in the race. Another Republican seeking the post is physician Tom Coburn, 46. The least-known Republican candidate is T.J. Tipton, 33, of Tahlequah.

Meanwhile, in the 3rd District, incumbent Bill Brewster, 52, faces primary opposition from Mike Newport, 39, of Ada, a strong anti-abortion advocate.

In the 5th District, there will be no primary contest. In the general election, incumbent Rep. Ernest Istook, 44, is the Republican candidate, with Tom Keith, 63, of Edmond, running as an independent.

In the 6th District, three Democrats are vying against lone Republican Rep. Frank Lucas, 34.

They are Dave Mui, 39, Oklahoma City; Lige Stewart, 71, Edmond; and Jeffrey Toilett, 33, of Oklahoma City.

# Keating: 'Qualified, Conservative'

**A**PPROACHING Tuesday's primary with hope, Republican gubernatorial candidate Frank Keating describes differences within the Republican field as "minimal. We have good solid conservatives running. The difference is the background and experience of the candidates.

"I am one of the candidates with legislative experience — a term in the (state) House and nearly two terms of experience in the (state) Senate. As Senate Republican leader, (U.S. Sen.) Don Nickles was one of my troops, as was Jerry Pierce," the Bartlesville state senator who is his principal rival for the GOP nomination.

Keating continued, during an Aug. 9 interview, sketching his private sector experience. "I've been a professional, owned a cattle ranch in the eastern part of the state, and a family oil and gas company. The private sector experience is there, as does exist for some of the other Republican candidates.

"What separates me is the major management responsibilities I've had that no one else has had. As the senior Oklahoman in both Ronald Reagan's and George Bush's administrations, I've supervised 85,000 federal law enforcement officers — that's at the Treasury, the U.S. Customs Service, U.S. Secret Service, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms. Then, as an associate attorney general under Ed Meese, the U.S. Prisons, the U.S. Marshals, the Immigration and Naturalization Service, Interpol, all 94 U.S. attorneys doing all the federal prosecutions in the country.

"Then, as Jack Kemp's right arm, as the general counsel and later the acting deputy secretary of HUD, a \$23 billion operation by the end of the term, I was the architect of the clean-up of the department. I know not only government management, but also the political workings of the state, as well as the federal, government."

Keating says "I'm the only one who can appeal to conservative Democrats and raise the money needed. ... (In order to win as a Republican in Oklahoma, you have to raise money, you have to bring your 'song' to the Democrat voter. ... Crime, which is certainly number one or number two on anybody's agenda, is a strong suit

for me. ... I've arrested people as an FBI agent, prosecuted them as a state and federal prosecutor, and supervised their lockup when the federal prison system was under me."

Calling himself a "smiling conservative" with policy alternatives, Keating described "coming back to Oklahoma — though I remained a property owner, a taxpayer, and voted here every year." He returned "after six years ... in a national administration," angry at these facts: "We are seventh in the nation in poverty. We're 28th in population, but 45th in income. Oklahomans make 81 cents on the dollar that everybody else makes.

"I've gone all over the state and talked to perhaps 1,000 business men and women. I've asked them, 'What can we do to make our state more prosperous? How can we make our families stronger?'"

The result is a reform plan he has dubbed "Oklahoma One." The objective is "to make ourselves more prosperous, one job at a time," and to improve neighborhood life through a focus "on crime and welfare — how to make our families stronger. ... Education is a piece of that neighborhood/family agenda, as well."

Keating promises, and offers specifics for, "a revolutionary reform of workers comp ... that will actually result in lower premiums. Any other reform is not a real reform." He supports right to work, and says so "in front of unions as well as management groups."

He goes further, backing sweeping tax changes, investment credits and economic incentives. His vision recalls that of former Delaware Gov. Pete du Pont, who after the 1976 election brought his state out of the doldrums and into the top tier of economically vibrant states.

Keating makes this case for comprehensive changes: "Most cities in America are unsafe and unlivable, and it would be powerful for me as governor" to say to businesses "Come to Oklahoma to live and work. It is inexpensive, it's safe and it's livable." And, we'll give tax breaks: "That's a very positive prosperity statement. ... Oklahoma, to get out of the cellar, has to do revolutionary things in trade and economic development in order to be recognized as an enterprise-friendly state, which we are not at the present time."

Keating credits as a bright spot the Quality Jobs Program (QJP) of David Walters, the Democrat he hopes to replace. He notes, "Most business people I talk to say that it has attracted some interest. The fact is that if the culture of the state is viewed as unfriendly to enterprise, then one piece of legislation will not change that culture. So, you have to do more. As governor, I have to be able to say to entrepreneurs around the U.S., as well as our local small businessmen and women, that we are open for jobs, we are different than we've been. ... There is no reason we can't be far more prosperous. ... It's a disgrace that for the first time Arkansas is more prosperous than we are."

On welfare policy, "we could not perversely create a system to so destroy the African-American community in this country than we did with the welfare system. And, the same with low income whites. It is a fact that the welfare system contributes to every negative social pathology. ... Right now Aid to Families with Dependent Children is paid on the basis of the absence of a spouse. ... The out-of-wedlock birth rate among blacks was lower than among whites in the 1930s. But in the 1960s the crowning blow to everything wrongheaded about social policy was the 'Great Society' — and we conceived of a system that could not have done a better job to disrupt families and to destroy stability in our neighborhoods.

"My proposal, assuming (President Bill) Clinton gives us discretion, is that AFDC should be paid on the basis of need, not on the basis of an absent father, and the second out-of-wedlock birth should not be covered. My friends at ... The Tulsa World, said 'Every time we come close to liking Frank, he says something stupid, such as don't cover the second out-of-wedlock birth.' Well, then, what do we cover? Five? Four? Three? Fifteen?"

"When does the government finally say, 'We are not going to subsidize destructive social behavior?' You have to do this. A two-year 'cold turkey' rule does make sense."

Casting himself as both qualified and conservative, Frank Keating is ready to bring what he calls "a conservative revolution" to Oklahoma.

# Governor's Race Sparks War of Words

Oklahoma's gubernatorial candidates are running their angel ads on television this weekend, although their halos are a bit askew because of verbal fistcuffs in the closing days of their primary campaigns.

If campaign money means anything — and it has in past elections — Lt. Gov. Jack Mildren should top gubernatorial voting for Democrats and Frank Keating is likely to lead the Republicans.

Keating reported raising \$920,330 through Aug. 8, leaving him a balance of \$114,815 after expenditures.

Mildren's campaign report showed receipts of \$771,002 and a balance on hand of \$364,597.

Other Democrats in the race are state Sen. Bernice Sheddick of Stillwater, Joe Vickers of Pawnee and state Rep. Danny Williams of Seminole.

Among the Republican candidates are Virginia Hale of Oklahoma City, Tom Lay of Tulsa, Jerry Kobyluk of Spencer and state Sen. Jerry Pierce of Bartlesville. Going into the final days of the primary campaign, it was unclear whether Mildren, 44, and Keating, 50, would win their respective party's nominations without a runoff.

Mildren has campaigned on a pledge to "restore honesty and efficiency at the top of state government."

Mildren's agenda includes a special focus on crime, jobs, education and health care. He was an All-America quarterback at the University of Oklahoma in the 1970s.

Sheddick, a latecomer to the gubernatorial race, put together a bus caravan for a weekend handshaking tour of heavily Democratic eastern Oklahoma. Sheddick recently launched an attack on Mildren, charging him with sitting on state boards that had awarded contracts to a law firm in which his brother is a partner.

A Sheddick aide later acknowledged that her allegation had not been confirmed.

Mildren denied the allegation and said he would be a strong advocate of competitive bidding as governor.

Mildren's brother, Richard, accused Sheddick of "desperate tactics," but Sheddick stood by her allegation. Sheddick said she wants to restore the public's faith in their governor.

Sheddick is head of the Senate Education Committee and has the endorsement of the Oklahoma Education Committee.

Her platform has included

ed crime prevention, economic development and jobs, and better opportunities in education and health care.

Sheddick, 53, reported receipts of \$390,317 and an Aug. 8 balance of \$39,534.

Williams, 45, has said that both Sheddick and Mildren have a lobbyist as campaign manager.

"People that represent special interests are running their campaigns," he said. "I would not ask a lobbyist to be on staff in my campaign because I don't want any innuendo or suggestion that I am influenced by (special interest lobbyists)."

Sheddick's campaign manager is Lynne White, a lobbyist. Richard Mildren is his brother's campaign manager and was a registered lobbyist until a few months ago.

Williams has proposed using advanced technology to provide a better future for Oklahoma. He also called for encouraging small business by providing venture capital.

Williams' campaign report showed receipts of \$121,493 through Aug. 8 and a balance of \$16,491.

Vickers, 55, has said the state's economy is tied to roads and bridges and that they must be improved.

He said violence in homes and schools must stop, and assault weapons

must be banned.

Vickers, who retired after 23 years in the Army, said he is strongly in favor of boot-camp prisons for youthful offenders.

In the Republican primary, Keating's closest opponent apparently is Pierce, who has questioned Keating's relationship with a Tulsa law firm.

Pierce, 50, has pointed to a telephone book ad by Keating's law firm that solicits clients for workers compensation and personal injury lawsuits.

Keating said he handles commercial litigation, not workers comp cases.

Pierce has spent 24 years in the Legislature and is running on a slogan that he is "the best friend the taxpayers ever had."

One of his main proposals is welfare reform.

Pierce's campaign report reflected receipts of \$157,206 and a balance of \$0,359 on Aug. 8.

Keating was an FBI agent and a U.S. attorney before being appointed to high-level positions in the Reagan and Bush administrations.

Six state GOP chairmen have endorsed Keating.

Keating has proposed targeted tax cuts to stimulate business and create jobs, workers compensation reform, a crackdown on crime, welfare reform and choice in the public school

system.

One of his tax cut plans would remove the income tax on earnings of senior citizens.

Kobyluk, 40, has said Oklahoma needs a new commitment to honesty in government and that Oklahomans "do not want the same old tired political leadership."

Kobyluk said he would work to create "long-lasting jobs that utilize our state's God-given natural resources."

Lay, 38, was working for Memorex Telex when he decided to run for governor to "return honor to the governor's office."

Lay said that "instead of merely addressing the symptoms," his administration would focus on the causes of high crime rates, economic struggles, rising health care cost and a troubled education system.

Hale, 64, is a grandmother who has financed her campaign with a Visa credit card. She has used radio and 10-second ads on cable television stations across the state to present herself to Oklahomans.

Hale provides care services to elderly people who live at home.

Not on the ballot Tuesday will be the lone independent in the race, former U.S. Rep. Wes Watkins, 55, of Stillwater. He will be on the Nov. 8 ballot.

### TERM LIMITS—THEY'RE A-COMIN'

THE MOVEMENT for limiting terms of U.S. senators and congressmen, as well as state and local officials, will gain major momentum this year. The idea, as unpopular among professional pols as it is popular with voters, will fact of American life by decade's end.

1992 voters in 14 states overwhelmingly passed

initiatives capping terms for federal legislators (12 also did it to state lawmakers). This year term-limit measures will appear in the 8 other states that allow people to put referendums on the ballot by petition.

Opponents are fighting a ferocious rearguard action. They have effectively bottled up a constitutional amend-

ment in Congress. They are challenging the constitutionality of term-limit referendums in several states. They have thus far blocked passage in every state legislature. They hope that because only 23 states have voter initiatives the measure can be deep-sixed by incumbent-loving members of Congress and state legislatures.

Their hope is forlorn. Term-limit-movement advocates plan to push referendums in countless counties, cities and towns. These popular initiatives will create so much political heat that state lawmakers will have to fall in line.

Proponents take heart from what happened in New York City. Against the united opposition of virtually every local politico, union and big business, term limits for city offices passed by a landslide, drawing significant support regardless of income, religion, race or gender.

It would be hard to overstate the changes such restrictions would wring if they became the norm nationwide. Our political bodies would have a wonderfully broad array of people of different backgrounds and would be more responsive to voters. Washington has been far more liberal than the rest of the nation for 25 years. Representatives there use moderate or conservative rhetoric to clothe leftist policies.

First in Congress and then on the local level, incumbents have perfected the art of fortifying themselves against effective challenge, barring scandal or major political upheaval. Abuse of the franking privilege allows lawmakers to send out tax-financed political literature under the guise

of "informing" constituents. "Constituent offices" in congressional districts are usually nothing more than tax-paid political storefronts. Publicly financed computer systems allow incumbents to target voters and groups with special appeals. Political action committees shower contributions on incumbents to ensure "access." In this media age a challenger must spend between \$500,000 and \$1 million to run effectively against a congressional officeholder. This is why, until the check-bouncing scandal of 1992, the House of Representatives had less turnover than the politburo of the former U.S.S.R. The artillery of term limits would quickly blast away incumbent fortresses, opening up politics once again to citizens who don't wish to make it a career.

Congressman Jim Inhofe (R-Okla.) is crafting one of the most radical federal term-limits proposals yet—6 years instead of the previously suggested 12 for House members. (The Senate would remain at the proposed two terms, or 12 years.) The reasoning of

Inhofe, Representative Bob Inglis (R-S.C.) and others: A 6-year cap would entice more nontraditional people into politics. They could achieve major responsibility in a short time instead of 15 to 20 years. A 12-year ceiling would still keep too many nonprofessionals from taking the plunge.

Until this century, the House routinely experienced significant turnover. It was supposed to be a sensitive barometer of public opinion. A six-year restriction would return Congress' lower chamber to its original purpose.

## Smoking Out the Barons

The small coterie of senior Democrats who run the House of Representatives, and who by their manner of running it have stirred the public's desire to raze that institution to its foundations and pulverize the foundations, are not having as much fun as they are used to having. Good.

The river of life seems to them suddenly strewn with sharp rocks, the worst being named Inhofe. The Democratic barons believe the world would be a sweeter and better place if Mr. and Mrs. Inhofe had never conceived their son Jim, who grew up to become a Republican congressman from Oklahoma. He has raised a terrific ruckus about an arcane thing called a discharge petition. His ruckus could, ere long, lead to a revolution.

Discharge petitions are instruments for prying legislation loose from the grip of committee chairmen who do not want the legislation to go to the House floor for a vote, because the legislation would be inconvenient if passed and politically hazardous to vote against. You may never have heard of discharge petitions, because successful ones are like Halley's comet: They do not come around often. Why?

Two reasons. A successful petition requires 218 signatures. And more important, a House decree dating from 1932 requires that the names on the petitions must be kept secret. In the 61 years since that gag rule was imposed, only 45 petitions have acquired 218 signatures.

Make that 46. Inhofe's discharge petition has broken the Rules Committee's iron grip on his legislation that, if passed, would end the gag rule that shrouds the discharge process in secrecy.

Although six Jello-like Democrats bent beneath the pressure of their leaders and removed their names from Inhofe's petition, he, with the help of the Wall Street Journal and Ross Perot's legions and talk radio, got 218 signatures—173 of the 175 House Republicans and 45 of 259 Democrats. He won by being naughty.

Barred by the gag rule from revealing who had signed his petition, he instead gave the Wall Street Journal a list of 223 members who were refusing to sign. Talk radio took up the cry, and Perot's United We Stand America took up a 'round-the-clock vigil outside the Boston office of Rep. Joe Moakley, chairman of the Rules Committee where Inhofe's bill was buried.

The purpose of the vigil was to embarrass Moakley. How quixotic. Trying to embarrass an entrenched congressional baron is like trying to embarrass a sofa: The object cannot experience the emotion. But Inhofe won sufficient signatures from some Democrats who fear publicity about doing their leaders' bidding even more than they fear their leaders.

Why do the leaders—and many lesser members—fear making discharge petitions public and therefore more likely to succeed? Because that will complicate the task of tricking constituents.

Some proposals that are immensely popular with the public would be, if passed, hugely inconvenient for the political class. One example is term limits, which are favored by more than 70 percent of the electorate—large majorities in both parties and all regions—and are enacted wherever the political class cannot prevent them from being voted on.

As long as popular proposals threaten the contentment of political careerists can be strangled by committee chairmen, a representative can be tricky. He can tell constituents that he really favors the proposals, but the secrecy surrounding the discharge petition process will hide the fact that he refuses to help bring the proposals to the floor for votes. So it is with term-limits proposals, which die in that dungeon called the Judiciary Committee. It is chaired by Jack Brooks, a Texas Democrat who was elected the year King George VI died—1952—and who has been enthroned in Congress longer than Henry VIII reigned.

If Inhofe's measure to end the secrecy passes, representatives will no longer be able to smother in Washington some of the bills they praise in their districts. Representatives will not be able forever to hide from the hazardous activity of voting on those bills.

Those barons who bother to argue in defense of keeping the names on discharge petitions secret say this: Publicity would mean "plebiscitary" government and the end of the House as a "deliberative" body. But the secrecy is really part of a scheme to prevent deliberation about important measures.

Moakley, now in his third decade in Congress, might try various parliamentary ploys to defeat Inhofe's reform of the discharge process. He and other careerists might even try abolishing the process. But the public is awake and watching. So the barons mourn and cannot be consoled. Good.

# Oklahoma primary winners set their sights on U.S. Senate

**OKLAHOMA CITY** — Democratic Rep. Dave McCurdy and Republican Rep. James Inhofe, after easy primary wins, turned their sights Wednesday to the general election for the U.S. Senate.

Mr. Inhofe, 59, of Tulsa crushed state Rep. Tony Caldwell in Tuesday's primary, and Mr. McCurdy, 44, of Norman was a big winner over Corporation Commissioner Cody Graves.

Mr. Inhofe said the 1994 election is of monumental importance in the GOP's bid to gain control of the Senate and strike a blow against policies of President Clinton.

Mr. McCurdy said the election affords Oklahomans the chance to send someone to the Senate with the same philosophy and voting record as Sen. David Boren, one of the most popular politicians in state history.

"Make no mistake," Mr. McCurdy said, "I will continue the legacy of David Boren in representing this great state and the mainstream val-

ues that working men and women in Oklahoma share."

Mr. Boren, a Democrat, is leaving the Senate to become president of the University of Oklahoma.

In Oklahoma's gubernatorial primary, former Justice Department official Frank Keating easily defeated four others for the GOP nomination.

On the Democratic side, Lt. Gov. Jack Mildren was forced into a Sept. 20 runoff with state Sen. Bernice Sheddick after failing to get a majority of the vote. Mr. Mildren had 49 percent to Ms. Sheddick's 37 percent. Two others trailed.

Former Democratic Rep. Wes Watkins is running as an independent in the Nov. 8 race to succeed one-term Democratic Gov. David Walters.

Mr. Walters announced that he wasn't seeking a second term last year, two weeks after pleading guilty to a misdemeanor campaign law violation.

Oklahoma voters rejected state Treasurer Claudette Henry, choosing her opponent by a 3-1 ratio in

the Republican primary. Tulsa stockbroker Bob Keaster won with 75 percent of the vote, according to final, unofficial totals.

State Auditor Clifton Scott, whose scathing report about the treasurer's office intensified the glare on Mrs. Henry, won the Democratic nomination with 75 percent of the vote. Mrs. Henry was plagued by a \$6 million securities trading scandal in her office that Mr. Scott called the worst taxpayer swindle in state history.

Former National Football League star Steve Largent won the Republican nomination to fill Mr. Inhofe's seat with 51 percent of the vote. He faces uncontested Democrat Stuart Price in the general election.

Corporation Commissioner J.C. Watts will face state Rep. Ed Apple in the Republican runoff. Mr. Watts captured 49 percent of the vote and Mr. Apple won 35 percent in the Democratic race. District Attorney Tully McCoy, who had 35 percent, will face Chickasha lawyer David Perryman.

## Watts Forced Into Runoff With Apple

Former football quarterback J.C. Watts was stopped short of the goal line Tuesday night, when state Rep. Ed Apple got just enough votes to throw the contenders into a runoff.

The Republicans now go head to head in a Sept. 20 runoff race for the U.S. 4th Congressional District.

Meanwhile, in the U.S. 1st Congressional District race, another former football player, Steve Largent, captured his seat without a runoff, based on unofficial results. With all votes counted, Largent, 39, received 61 percent of the votes, for a total of 25,760.

But U.S. 2nd District Congressman Mike Synar, 43, was thrown into a runoff, failing to win enough votes in his race.

against two Democrats with little name recognition.

With 100 percent of the 308 4th District precincts reporting, Corporation Commissioner Watts took 49 percent of the vote compared with Apple's 35 percent.

Watts received 12,489 votes, with Apple tallying 8,881.

Watts said he thought Apple would receive a percentage of votes in the mid-30s, but the surprise came with candidate Howard Bell, who received 9 percent of the tally, or 2,292 votes. Bell, 70, has run for other offices on the Democratic side of the ticket.

Among the 4th District Democrats, District Attorney Tully McCoy claimed 24,796 votes, 35 percent. He was followed by Chickasha attorney David Perryman with 14,557 votes, 21 percent.

McCoy said, "The people in three counties that know me — Cleveland, McClain and Garvin counties — gave me around 80 percent of the vote. My obligation is to let those who don't know me learn more about his record."

In the 2nd Congressional District, longtime incumbent Synar took an early lead, although he did not capture enough votes to bypass a runoff. With 100 percent of the votes in, Synar had 45,163, or 47 percent of the vote.

Trailing him was Virgil Cooper, 71, a

Drumright retired teacher, with 25,697, 27 percent. Bill Varde-man, 71, a Fort Gibson rancher, had 24,697, 26 percent. Synar, 43, had expected to win the primary without a runoff. His major opposition is expected to come in the general election against a Republican.

On the Republican side, physician Tom Coburn, 46, won without a runoff, tallying 14,846, amounting to 64 percent.

In the U.S. 3rd Congressional District in southeastern Oklahoma, incumbent Bill Brewster, 52, was trouncing his opponent, garnering 71 percent of the vote. With all the votes tallied, Brewster had received 78,958, compared to 32,822 votes tallied by Democrat opponent Mike Newport.

Meanwhile, in the U.S. 6th Congressional District, Jeffrey S. Tollett, an Oklahoma City minister and black community leader, escaped a runoff.

Tollett, who made an unsuccessful bid for Oklahoma City mayor, tallied 30,134, amounting to 51 percent of the vote. He will face Republican Frank Lucas, 34, in the general election.

Major focus of the 4th District race has been concern over the future of Tinker, destined to be considered for closure next year when the government conducts another round of defense cutbacks.

It's important that the direction the Clinton administration is heading is stopped.

McCurdy, 44, and Inhofe, 40, gave up their seats in the U.S. House of Representatives to run for the remaining two years of Boren's term.

Boren, a Seminole Democrat, is leaving the Senate to become president of the University of Oklahoma in the fall.

The general election race for Oklahoma's U.S. Senate seat is expected to draw national attention.

Republicans, hoping to regain control of the U.S. Senate, are expected to campaign against President Clinton in Senate races throughout the nation in an effort to win enough seats to control the Senate.

Last week, Inhofe, displaying confidence in his campaign, announced that he would bring Senate Republican leader Robert Dole of Kansas and Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla., to Oklahoma Friday for a fund-raiser.

During the primary campaign, Inhofe said that if he wins the Senate seat, the probability of the Republicans becoming a majority in the U.S. Senate could become a reality.

The next round of base closings has been part of the campaigns of McCurdy and Inhofe.

McCurdy has emphasized his efforts to protect and win jobs at three military bases in his 4th Congressional District.

He said he was instrumental in keeping Tinker Air Force Base open through the last round of base closings.

The fight for Tinker is a fight for tens of thousands of working men and women in Oklahoma. It is also a fight for a strong national defense because Tinker is critical to the maintenance and logistical

support that our military needs to win wars," McCurdy said. Inhofe said he will be in a better position

to help Tinker in the U.S. Senate next year because Republicans likely will gain control of the upper

house.

If Republicans get control, he likely will be on the Senate Armed Services com-

mittee and could chair a subcommittee, he said.

## It's Inhofe, McCurdy For Senate

U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy and Jim Inhofe easily won their primary races Tuesday and headed toward a pivotal U.S. Senate race that could have national ramifications.

Republicans believe a November victory in Oklahoma could help them wrest control of the U.S. Senate from the Democrats and President Bill Clinton. A pitched battle is expected since both congressmen demonstrated the ability to run effective statewide races.

McCurdy's lead stayed at around 66 percent of the vote most of the night in his Democratic primary win over state Corporation Commissioner Cody Graves.

Inhofe's lead hovered at 78 percent most of the night in the Republican primary as he trounced state Rep. Tony Caldwell of Oklahoma City.

Waiting to challenge McCurdy and Inhofe in the Nov. 5 general election is 46-year-old Denny Corn, an Edmond attorney.

"This is a very exciting night, and we're going to carry it through to shock all of the nation in November," Inhofe said after receiving a pledge from Caldwell to help in the race against McCurdy.

Inhofe said Tuesday night Oklahoma voters will be in a unique position to compare him and McCurdy in the campaign ahead.

For the first time, Oklahoma has two seated members of the House of Representatives running against each other for the United States Senate, he said. "That means the people of this state will have an opportunity to separate the rhetoric from the record and compare how each of us has voted in the past."

McCurdy was just as confident.

"We're here to elect a successor to one of the greatest senators this state has ever known and this country has ever known, the Honorable David Boren," McCurdy said.

McCurdy compared himself to Boren, saying their voting records, their philosophies and their outlook on the future of Oklahoma is the same.

"Don't let pretenders stand in the way. I will continue the legacy of David Boren," McCurdy said. "This election should be a referendum on who can most effectively represent the future of Oklahoma."

With 2,320 of 2,320 precincts reporting, McCurdy led Graves 221,809 to 143,813.

Inhofe led Caldwell 158,048 to 46,166 with all precincts reporting.

McCurdy said Graves offered his support and congratulations and a commitment to work this fall to help him win the election.

Caldwell endorsed Inhofe.

He said he very strongly supports Inhofe, adding

# Largent Sweeps Race

In what one candidate described as "a train running away," former football star Steve Largent Tuesday overwhelmed five other candidates in the Republican race for 1st District Congress and avoided a runoff.

Largent needed 50 percent of the vote to pull in the GOP nomination and fielded around 51 percent. His closest contender — state Sen. Rob Johnson — had around 17 percent.

With all 264 precincts reporting, the unofficial totals were:

Largent, 25,760; Johnson, 8,561; Paula Unruh, 7,004; County Clerk Joan Hastings, 3,989; former Tulsa Mayor Dick Crawford, 3,310, and engineer Richard Bunn, 1,682.

Asked about Largent's victory, Unruh said: "It was like a train running away."

The 1st District includes 246 precincts in Tulsa County and 18 in Wagoner County.

Largent will face Democrat Stuart Price, a Tulsa oilman, in the November general election. Price had no opposi-

tion in the Democratic Party primary.

The 1st District post was considered a vacant seat. Incumbent U.S. Rep. Jim Inhofe, R-Okla., is running for the U.S. Senate seat that David Boren is leaving to become president of the University of Oklahoma. Inhofe had held the House seat since 1986.

Largent, a newcomer to politics, jumped into the lead soon after the polls closed at 7 p.m. He left behind a field of candidates well-known in Tulsa area politics.

Largent, 39, was a star wide-receiver for the University of Tulsa and the Seattle Seahawks in the National Football League.

The 1st District has 331,125 registered voters — 162,918 Republicans, 153,808 Democrats and 14,399 independents.

Hastings, 62, and Unruh, 65, each was hoping to become the first woman member of Congress from Oklahoma since 1920.

Hastings has been elected county clerk twice by wide margins and once without opposition. But that popularity did not transfer to the 1st District race.

Alice Robertson of Muskogee is the lone woman to have served Oklahoma in the House. No woman has been elected to the U.S. Senate from Oklahoma and none has been elected governor.

Bunn and Unruh had made Largent a target in the campaign.

Unruh, a former state GOP chairman, criticized the former football player for campaign literature calling him "An American Hero."

Bunn, 48, an engineer, charged that Largent's business experience was limited to making television commercials for a Tulsa car dealership.

Largent said the "American Hero" label was placed on him by his supporters and that he had represented Fortune 500 companies.

Johnson, 39, was trying to step from the statehouse, where he has served six years, to the U.S. House on the strength of his legislative experience and stands against gun control, abortion and homosexuals serving in the military.

It was Bunn's second attempt at the GOP nomination after losing in the August 1992 primary to Inhofe. Unruh and Hastings also were making their second races for the 1st District seat.

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# McCurdy Inhofe Win

U.S. Reps. Dave McCurdy and Jim Inhofe, as expected, won their party nominations Tuesday for the U.S. Senate.

McCurdy nabbed the Democratic nomination, getting 65 percent of the Democratic vote over Corporation Commissioner Cody Graves, with 33 percent of precincts counted.

On the Republican side, Inhofe defeated state Rep. Tony Caldwell of Oklahoma City, with 64 percent of state precincts counted. Inhofe had 72 percent of the GOP vote.

McCurdy and Inhofe will meet in the Nov. 11 general election, seeking to fill the remaining two years of the Senate post being vacated by David Boren, who will become president of the University of Oklahoma in November.

Edmond attorney Danny Corn of the Natural Law Party also will appear on the November ballot as an independent candidate.

Caldwell conceded the race to Inhofe at 8:10 p.m. and offered a strong endorsement to the 59-year-old congressman from Tulsa.

"Given the choice the public made tonight, it is important that we elect Jim Inhofe to the United States Senate... to stop the Clinton administration from taking the country in the wrong direction," he said in a telephone interview just moments before he went before his supporters at an Oklahoma City watch party.

McCurdy and Inhofe began their races as obvious front-runners and, boosted by fund-raising advantages normally enjoyed only by incumbent congressmen, their leads were never threatened seriously.

Caldwell's bid especially floundered as he never had the money even to launch a television campaign. Inhofe all but ignored him and overwhelmed the young official with both money and better name identification with Republican voters statewide.

Caldwell blamed a lack of time for his poor showing. Although he endorsed Inhofe quickly, he said he was not sorry to come out late in the campaign to accuse Inhofe of not being trustworthy.

Caldwell based those charges on a series of legal violations and lawsuits that had been reported previously.

"I have said all along we need to change this country away from professional politicians," he said.

"I believe that is true." Graves, running from a statewide post, was able to run a much more credible race against McCurdy, but again, money played a key role.

McCurdy, with as much as a 3-1 edge in contributions, was able to go on television earlier.

Graves focused his attacks on McCurdy's opposition to a state term limit proposal, his trips for special interests and voters' discontent with Wash-

ington in general.

The attacks obviously did not do the trick for Graves.

Even a solid performance in their only major television debate, which saw McCurdy stumble a bit, failed to give Graves his much-needed boost.

Both Inhofe and McCurdy, confident of victories on Tuesday, shifted to a fail election strategy even before the voters went to the polls.

Earlier in the day, McCurdy was in Tulsa campaigning for last-minute votes at the Ford Glass Plant.

His visit obviously spoke to the need for him to cut into Inhofe's home base of support for the fall election.

Inhofe was the only candidate to stage watch parties in both Tulsa and Oklahoma City.

The Tulsa World also learned Inhofe was replacing Jack Edens, his campaign manager.

Edens, 48, will become director of communications, while Craig Furrer, a 27-year-old Tulsa who lives in Washington, was named campaign director.

Furrer was deputy campaign manager for the 1992 re-election effort of U.S. Sen. Don Nickles, R-Okla.

McCurdy, who is more than 10 years younger than Inhofe, actually entered Congress earlier.

The Democrat was elected to his current House post in 1980 at the age of 30.

His assignments include the House Armed Services Committee, where he has been a key player in keeping Oklahoma's military bases in good shape.

McCurdy chairs the subcommittee on military installations.

Inhofe, after losing a re-election bid in 1984 as Tulsa mayor, was elected to his House seat in 1986 at the age of 41.

He has served on the House Public Works and Transportation Committee, where he has focused his attention on aviation issues.

In 1993, Inhofe won permission to join the House Armed Services Committee.

Ironically, at the time, he issued a press release stating that his new assignment would give him the opportunity to work more closely with McCurdy.

# Synar Set For Runoff

**MUSKOGEE** — U.S. Rep. Mike Synar was headed for a runoff in the Democratic primary in which he had faced two unknown and poorly funded opponents.

About 10:30 p.m. Synar walked into his campaign headquarters and ignited what had been a gloomy crowd of volunteers.

"My father always told me anything worth having was worth fighting for," Synar said.

It was unclear with 62 percent of precincts reporting who Synar would face in the Sept. 20 runoff.

Synar had 47 percent, while Virgil Cooper of Peabright had 27 percent and perennial candidate Bill Vardeman had 26 percent. In the Republican primary, meanwhile, Tom Coburn easily outdistanced his two opponents and was capturing 63 percent of the vote and apparently the GOP nomination.

Synar said a late negative campaign by the Republican Coburn had apparently hurt him in his own race.

Coburn in advertising had linked Synar to President Clinton but had ignored his own Republican opponents. Coburn said Synar represents big government and is out of touch with the people of eastern Oklahoma.

Coburn said, "I am overwhelmed that we have been able to do this but people recognized that there is a need to change things in Washington."

Cooper, a retired educator, said he had spent about \$5,000 but said he was not really surprised that he might force a runoff with Synar.

"I've been all over the district and I've talked to the people and I don't find too many people who like the way Synar votes," he said.

well International, said "Don't anyone out here want Synar anymore... that's the problem with him."

Even before the primary ballots had been counted, Coburn and Synar were trading barbs back and forth. Both are members of well-established Muskogee families.

"Mr. Synar feels that he should make the decisions for the people of eastern Oklahoma," Coburn said. "But the people of Oklahoma feel that Mr. Synar should better represent them."

Coburn called Synar a liberal and said he is out of touch with the people.

But Synar said the "people of northeastern Oklahoma have a clear choice of who they want to represent them in Congress."

"It is a choice between someone who always has fought for the working middle class and someone who represents the elite and the special interest groups," Synar said.

Meanwhile in the 4th District, Corporation Commissioner J.C. Watts stepped into the lead over state Rep. Ed Apple of Duncan. With 155 of 309 precincts reporting, Watts took 46 percent of the vote compared to Apple's 28 percent.

Among the 4th District Democrats, District Attorney Tully McCay claimed 32 percent of the vote with 67 percent of 309 precincts reporting. He was followed by Chickasha attorney David Perryman with 22 percent of the vote.

The elections in the 1st and 4th Districts are to fill open seats left by Reps. Jim Inhofe and Dave McCurdy, who are making a run for the U.S. Senate.

In the 3rd Congressional District, incumbent Rep. Bill Brewster handily defeated Mike Newport of Ada in the Democratic primary.

In the 6th District, Jeffrey Tollett had an early lead over Dave Mul and Lige Stewart for the Democratic nomination to oppose newly elected Rep. Frank Lucas.

## On McCurdy's Vote

ONCE again Oklahoma's Dave McCurdy has helped pull Bill Clinton's political chestnuts out of the fire.

From his position on the House Armed Services Committee, McCurdy gave Clinton valuable support for his proposal to allow avowed homosexuals in the military. While he voted against the final version of the 1963 budget bill, he had given significant rhetorical backing to the Clinton tax increase.

McCurdy has repeatedly sided with Clinton on gun control legislation, and Sunday he helped pass a highly flawed \$30.2 billion crime bill — a victory the president desperately needed after losing badly in an earlier attempt. The bill, which bans about 180 types of firearms, was opposed by all five other Oklahoma House members.

The Norman Democrat said he was pleased that House negotiators had been able to "strip the pork from the bill." But although the price tag was trimmed by \$3.3 billion, the bill still contained \$7 billion in social welfare spending masquerading as "crime prevention."

The revised crime bill provided less for prison construction than the previous version. It also would not allow federal judges to sentence aliens convicted of violent

crimes but require that they be released into the streets pending deportation proceedings.

The Aug. 11 defeat of the administration's anti-crime package was highly symbolic, because it depicted a weakened president who could not whip his own party into line on a popular election year issue. Yet the modified bill was still so faulty that 64 Democrats rejected Clinton's personal lobbying efforts.

The next move is up to the Senate, where McCurdy aspires to sit next year. That body preserves a much higher degree of independence, which might cramp the style of someone who would ignore his conservative constituents' views to rescue a politically crippled president.

**McCurdy Out of Touch**

**T**HERE can be little doubt U.S. Rep. Dave McCurdy has been in Congress too long. He has forgotten how to think like an Oklahoman.

Sunday's vote for President Bill Clinton's crime bill is only the latest of betrayals by McCurdy, who has tried to convince Oklahoma voters he is a moderate.

McCurdy opposes term limits for members of Congress, supported gun control legislation and has voted to support President Clinton's legislative program 90 percent of the time, more than any other member of Oklahoma's delegation and even more than for liberals like U.S. Sen. Ted Kennedy.

Voters should have been forewarned when McCurdy campaigned for Clinton in the New Hampshire presidential primary and seconded Clinton's nomination in a speech to the 1992 Democratic National Convention.

Oklahoma U.S. Sen. David Boren, whose seat McCurdy aspires to, managed to think for himself and represent his Oklahoma constituency. It would be tragic to replace Boren with a puppet for the Washington establishment.

To put it simply, McCurdy is out of touch with the home folks. Oklahoma Democrats should remember that when they cast their votes today to nominate a candidate for the U.S. Senate.
