RE: Remarks to National Institute of Nursing Research

You are scheduled to deliver brief remarks at a luncheon for the Friends of the National Institute of Nursing Research. About 135 people will be attending, mostly nurses and academics. Eleanor Sullivan, the Dean of the School of Nursing at the University of Kansas will be in the audience.

Pat Schroeder will also speak at the lunch. She has been a big advocate for women's health. As part of the D.O.D. authorization bill this year, she attached an amendment to allocate \$210 million for cervical and breast cancer.

They would like you to speak about health care reform in general with an emphasis on the importance of nursing. Recently, a new institute was created at NIH for nursing research. This is a major accomplishment for the nursing profession.

Nursing research focuses on health care issues related to cost, quality, and access, as opposed to medical research that has a more clinical focus on specific diseases. Nurses are also more interested in prevention and health promotion rather than the treatment of illnesses.

As more emphasis is placed on primary care and prevention, nurses believe that they are in the best position, because of their training, to treat and educate patients on health promotion, self-treatment, and home care.

A recent Gallup poll showed that 86% of Americans preferred receiving their primary care from a nurse rather than a physician. As such, nurses are seeking better reimbursement from Medicare and private insurance for their services. Traditionally, they have not been reimbursed as a distinct profession.

The nurses you will be speaking to feel that the creation of a nursing institute at NIH is the long-overdue recognition that nurses deserve. They should be a friendly audience, although their policy positions tend to be very liberal.
