Dear Senator Dole:

At the suggestion of Garabed "Chuck" Haytaian, Speaker of the New Jersey General Assembly and on behalf of the Officers, Directors and Members of the New Jersey Chamber of Commerce, I have the distinct pleasure to invite you to attend and address informal remarks to our organization's 57th Annual Congressional Dinner, to be held the evening of Thursday, February 2nd in the Sheraton Washington Hotel in Washington, D.C.

We anticipate that 1,500 New Jerseyans will travel by special train that day to Washington, there to be joined by several hundred more to pay honor to the Members of the New Jersey Delegation to the 104th Congress as they take up their heavy responsibilities in a year of change and challenge unprecedented in the past half century.

Dais guests for this event will include all the Members of the New Jersey Congressional Delegation, Governor Christine Todd Whitman and a number of the business, political and labor leaders of New Jersey.

As is our custom, the speaking program following our Dinner will be quite brief and limited to short, informal remarks by Senators Bradley and Lautenberg, by Congresswoman Marge Roukema as Dean of the New Jersey contingent in the House, and by Governor Whitman.

Our Dinner is scheduled for the period 7:00-8:00 P.M. and the speaking program roughly 8:00-9:15 P.M. We hope that you can be present throughout but, if not, we can accommodate your schedule by shuffling the sequence of speakers as may be required. Your remarks of 10-15 minutes duration would be appropriate.

Perhaps a word about our organization and this annual event is in order. The New Jersey Chamber is 84 years young and has long been the leading independent, general business organization in New Jersey. As indicated, this will be the 57th edition of our Congressional Dinner, which is generally recognized as New Jersey's premier annual business/government event and widely regarded in Washington as the largest such single-state event regularly held in the Nation's capital and one that regularly receives extensive media coverage. New Jersey is, of course, one of the most important states from a population and economic standpoint and often viewed politically as a "swing" state.

LET ME SAY THAT EVEN THOUGH
SENATORS BRADLEY AND
LAUTENBERG AND I DIFFER IN
POLITICAL PARTY, WE DO HAVE
ONE THING IN COMMON: WE HAVE
ALL APPEARED ON THE "IMUS IN
THE MORNING" SHOW.

I HAVE TO TELL YOU THAT FOR YEARS AND YEARS, I APPEARED ON SUNDAY DISCUSSION SHOWS LIKE "MEET THE PRESS," AND WOULD HARDLY HEAR A THING. BUT THE MOMENT I STARTED CALLING IN TO IMUS, I COULDN'T LEAVE MY OFFICE WITHOUT HEARING FROM SOMEBODY WHO HAD LISTENED THAT MORNING.

WHATEVER YOUR POLITICAL VIEWPOINT...AND NO MATTER IF YOU PREFER RUSH LIMBAUGH OR DON IMUS--THERE CAN BE NO DOUBT THAT WASHINGTON IS A MUCH DIFFERENT PLACE--AND **CONGRESS IS A MUCH DIFFERENT** INSTITUTION--THAN ANY TIME IN RECENT MEMORY.

IN PAST YEARS, CONGRESS HAS
DEFINED ITS SUCCESS BY HOW

MANY LAWS WERE PASSED, AND HOW MANY PROGRAMS WERE IMPLEMENTED.

THIS CONGRESS SEES THINGS
VERY VERY DIFFERENTLY. WE
BELIEVE OUR SUCCESS WILL BE
DETERMINED BY HOW MUCH
GOVERNMENT WE LIMIT, AND HOW
MANY RULES AND REGULATIONS
WE CUT.

YES, WE UNDERSTAND THAT **GOVERNMENT HAS DUTIES AND** RESPONSIBILITIES. BUT WE ALSO UNDERSTAND THAT THE AMERICAN **VOTERS GAVE THIS CONGRESS A** MANDATE--A MANDATE TO REIN IN GOVERNMENT, AND TO RETURN POWER TO THE STATES AND TO THE PEOPLE.

I KNOW YOU'VE HAD A VERY
FULL DAY, AND I WON'T KEEP YOU

VERY LONG. BUT I DID WANT TO
SPEND A MINUTE OR TWO TO
DISCUSS SOME ISSUES WHICH MAY
BE OF IMPORTANCE TO THE
CHAMBER.

I SPOKE EARLIER TODAY WITH A
OFFICIAL FROM THE U.S. CHAMBER
OF COMMERCE, WHO PASSED
ALONG A SURVEY OF OVER 6,200
CHAMBER MEMBERS FROM ACROSS
THE COUNTRY, RANKING THE TOP

POLICY ISSUES.

AND THE NUMBER ONE ISSUE
FOR CHAMBER MEMBERS, I'M
PROUD TO REPORT, WAS
UNFUNDED MANDATES.

THAT WAS ALSO THE #1 ISSUE
OF SENATE REPUBLICANS--IN FACT,
WE DESIGNATED IT S.1. AND IT'S
THE MOST IMPORTANT STEP IN
DUSTING OFF THE TENTH
AMENDMENT, AND RESTORING IT

TO ITS RIGHTFUL PLACE IN THE CONSTITUTION.

IT HAS NOW BEEN PASSED BY **BOTH THE HOUSE AND THE** SENATE, AND ALL THAT IS NEEDED IS A CONFERENCE COMMITTEE TO SETTLE A FEW MINOR DIFFERENCES BETWEEN THE TWO HOUSES, AND THEN WE'LL SEND IT TO THE PRESIDENT.

AND LET ME TAKE THIS

OPPORTUNITY TO THANK

GOVERNOR WHITMAN--AND ALL OF

AMERICA'S GOVERNORS-
REPUBLICANS AND DEMOCRATS-
WHO WORKED SO HARD TO PASS

THIS LEGISLATION.

THREE OF THE TOP TEN ISSUES
ON THE SURVEY HAVE TO DO WITH
REDUCING PAPERWORK AND
REGULATIONS.

AND THOSE RESULTS DON'T SURPRISE ME. EVERYWHERE I TRAVEL I GET AN EARFUL FROM SMALL BUSINESSMEN AND WOMEN WHO ARE BEING BURIED UNDER AN **AVALANCHE OF RULES AND** REGULATIONS--MANY OF WHICH MAKE ABSOLUTELY NO SENSE. ONE INDUSTRY THAT IS **ESPECIALLY HARD HIT BY GOVERNMENT REGULATION IS**

NEW JERSEY'S PHARMACEUTICAL INDUSTRY.

THE FACT IS THAT THE AVERAGE RESEARCH COST OF EVERY NEW DRUG--TWO-THIRDS OF WHICH **GOES TO MEETING FDA** REQUIREMENTS, IS \$230 MILLION. ONE PHARMACEUTICAL CALCULATED THAT IT SPENT MORE ON FORMS AND PAPERWORK THAN IT DID ON ALL RESEARCH FOR

CANCER AND OTHER DISEASES. NO ONE IS ADVOCATING PUTTING UNSAFE DRUGS ON THE MARKET. I CAN'T HELP BUT BELIEVE, HOWEVER, THAT THERE MUST BE WAYS TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF BUREAUCRATIC HOOPS WE FORCE PHARMACEUTICALS--AND ALL BUSINESSES--TO JUMP THROUGH.

SOME RELIEF MAY COME FROM LEGISLATION I INTRODUCED TODAY WHICH IS AIMED AT RESTORING **COMMON SENSE TO THE RULE** MAKING PROCESS. THIS LEGISLATION WILL INSIST THAT FEDERAL AGENCIES TAKE INTO ACCOUNT THE COSTS, AS WELL AS THE BENEFITS, OF REGULATIONS. AND IT WILL REQUIRE THAT AGENCIES USE ONLY "SOUND

SCIENCE" WHEN MEASURING RISKS.

ANOTHER TOP ISSUE ON THE

SURVEY WAS CIVIL JUSTICE AND

PRODUCTS LIABILITY REFORM.

WE'VE FOUGHT THE PRODUCTS
LIABILITY REFORM BATTLE FOR
ABOUT A DECADE NOW, AND HAVE
ALWAYS ENDED UP A VOTE OR
TWO SHORT OF BEING ABLE TO GET
CLOTURE.

IN THE NEXT WEEK OR TWO. SENATORS GORTON AND ROCKEFELLER WILL INTRODUCE BI-PARTISAN PRODUCT LIABILITY REFORM LEGISLATION. I EXPECT THE COMMERCE COMMITTEE WILL MARK UP THIS LEGISLATION IN MARCH, AFTER THEY DISPOSE OF **TELECOMMUNICATIONS** LEGISLATION--WHICH I KNOW IS

ALSO OF INTEREST TO MANY OF YOU.

WELFARE REFORM AND HEALTH CARE REFORM ARE ALSO ON THE CHAMBER'S LIST, AND ON THESE ISSUES, OUR GUIDELINE IS SIMPLE: WE WANT TO RETURN POWER TO THE STATES, AND TO GIVE **GOVERNOR'S LIKE CHRISTIE** WHITMAN THE FLEXIBILITY TO SOLVE PROBLEMS WHERE THEY ARE BEST SOLVED--AT THE LOCAL LEVEL.

FINALLY, I DO WANT TO NOTE THAT THIS IS THE FIRST BANQUET YOU HAVE HELD IN MANY YEARS WITHOUT DEAN GALLO. DEAN WAS A GOOD FRIEND, AN OUTSTANDING PUBLIC SERVANT, AND HIS WISDOM IS STILL MISSED AROUND THIS TOWN.

LET ME LEAVE YOU WITH THREE
WORDS--"LIBERTY AND
PROSPERITY."

THAT, OF COURSE, IS THE STATE
MOTTO OF NEW JERSEY, AND IT'S
ALSO THE GOAL OF THE 104TH
CONGRESS-BY GIVING LIBERTY
BACK TO THE PEOPLE, WE CAN
ENSURE AMERICA'S PROSPERITY
FOR MANY YEARS TO COME.
