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AS YOU KNOW, I'VE HAD THE PLEASURE OF SPEAKING TO THIS GROUP ON MANY OCCASIONS OVER THE YEARS. BUT TODAY IS DIFFERENT.

THIS IS THE FIRST TIME SINCE 1954 THAT THE BUSINESS COUNCIL HAS BEEN IN WASHINGTON WHEN REPUBLICANS HAVE CONTROLLED THE CONGRESS.

LOOKING AROUND THE ROOM, I DON'T SEE TOO MANY PEOPLE HERE WHO WERE MEMBERS OF THE **BUSINESS COUNCIL IN 1954, BUT I DO KNOW THAT YOUR KEYNOTE** SPEAKER WAS STROM THURMOND. AND THE FIRST THING I WANT TO DO THIS MORNING IS TO SAY "THANK YOU" TO ALL THOSE WHO HELPED TO MAKE OUR MAJORITY POSSIBLE.

## FOR THOSE WHO DIDN'T HELP, THEN LET ME ASSURE YOU THAT THERE'S STILL TIME.

I'M HERE TODAY FOR TWO REASONS.

THE FIRST IS TO JOIN WITH THE OTHER MEMBERS OF THE CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP IN PREVIEWING WHAT TO EXPECT IN THE COMING MONTHS.

I DON'T KNOW WHAT NEWT **TOLD YOU THIS MORNING, BUT I CAN GUARANTEE YOU I'M PRETTY** MUCH IN AGREEMENT WITH WHATEVER HE SAID--AS LONG AS IT DIDN'T INVOLVE GIRAFFES. FROM MY POINT OF VIEW, NEWT IS DOING AN OUTSTANDING JOB AS SPEAKER. THE HOUSE "CONTRACT" **IS SLIGHTLY DIFFERENT FROM THE** PLEDGES THAT REPUBLICAN

SENATE CANDIDATES MADE IN 1994. AND THE HOUSE RULES **GUARANTEE THAT THEY CAN MOVE** FASTER THAN WE CAN. **BUT WE SHARE THE SAME MISSION: AND THAT'S TO REIN IN** THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT. THAT MEANS MAKING GOVERNMENT A WHOLE LOT SMALLER, A LOT LESS **ARROGANT, AND GETTING IT OUT** OF MATTERS BEST LEFT TO THE

## STATES, CITIES, BUSINESSES, AND FAMILIES ACROSS AMERICA. IN SHORT, WE WANT TO DUST OFF THE 10TH AMENDMENT, AND RESTORE IT TO ITS RIGHTFUL PLACE IN THE CONSTITUTION.

AND WE TOOK OUR FIRST STEP TO DOING THAT BY PASSING UNFUNDED MANDATES LEGISLATION IN BOTH THE HOUSE AND THE SENATE. I THINK A CONFERENCE COMMITTEE WILL IRON OUT THE MINOR DIFFERENCE SOON, AND WE SHOULD SEND IT TO THE PRESIDENT IN A MATTER OF WEEKS.

THIS LEGISLATION DOESN'T JUST AFFECT STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS--IT ALSO AFFECTS YOU, BECAUSE STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENT PASSED ALONG THE

### COSTS OF MANDATES TO TAXPAYERS.

NOW, I KNOW YOU HEARD FROM PRESIDENT CLINTON LAST NIGHT, AND I'M SURE HE TOLD YOU THAT HE HEARD THE MESSAGE OF LAST NOVEMBER, AND THAT HE'S IN FAVOR OF REDUCING THE SIZE AND SCOPE OF GOVERNMENT. AND I HOPE THAT ONE OR TWO

**OF YOU MIGHT HAVE VERY** 

# **RESPECTIVELY MENTIONED THAT IF HE'S FOR LESS GOVERNMENT INTRUSION, THEN WHY HAS HE APPARENTLY DECIDED TO ISSUE AN EXECUTIVE ORDER THAT WOULD PROHIBIT FEDERAL CONTRACTORS** FROM HIRING PERMANENT **REPLACEMENT-WORKERS DURING A** STRIKE.

# AS YOU KNOW, THE DEMOCRAT CONGRESSES OF THE PAST HAVE TRIED AGAIN AND AGAIN TO PASS STRIKER REPLACEMENT LEGISLATION--AND WITH YOUR HELP, WE WERE ABLE TO STOP IT EVERY TIME.

AND NOW PRESIDENT CLINTON WANTS TO ATTEMPT AN END RUN AROUND THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS AND FORMULATE LABOR-

MANAGEMENT POLICY THROUGH AN EXECUTIVE ORDER. IT'S BAD POLICY, IT WOULD SET A TERRIBLE PRECEDENT, AND SENATOR KASSEBAUM AND I HAVE SENT A LETTER TO THE PRESIDENT URGING HIM TO CHANGE HIS MIND. **RIGHT NOW IN THE SENATE,** WE'RE TRYING TO MAKE SURE THAT A HANDFUL OF SENATORS WHO SUPPORTED THE BALANCED

BUDGET AMENDMENT IN THE PAST DON'T CHANGE THEIR MIND NOW THAT WE'RE SHOOTING WITH REAL BULLETS.

THE VOTE IS SCHEDULED FOR NEXT TUESDAY, AND IT'S GOING TO BE VERY CLOSE. SOME HAVE SUGGESTED THAT IT'S BETTER FOR US TO LOSE BY ONE OR TWO VOTES, SO REPUBLICANS CAN GO OUT AND CAMPAIGN ON THE ISSUE IN 1996, AND THEY MAY HAVE A POINT. I HAPPEN TO BELIEVE, HOWEVER, THAT PASSING THE BALANCED BUDGET AMENDMENT NOW IS THE CORRECT COURSE TO TAKE.

AFTER IT'S ADOPTED, WE WILL IMMEDIATELY BEGIN WORK ON A DETAILED FIVE YEAR PLAN THAT WILL PUT THE FEDERAL BUDGET ON A PATH TO BALANCE BY 2002. THIS PLAN WILL NOT INCREASE TAXES, AND IT WILL NOT TOUCH SOCIAL SECURITY--BUT EVERYTHING ELSE WILL BE ON THE TABLE.

OTHER ITEMS ON OUR AGENDA IN THE SENATE ARE THE LINE ITEM VETO, TELECOMMUNICATIONS, CRIME, AND PRODUCT LIABILITY AND TORT REFORM. WE'VE COME CLOSE ON TORT REFORM THE PAST FEW SESSIONS, AND I THINK THIS MAY BE THE YEAR. BUT YOU CAN BET THAT THE AMERICAN TRIAL LAWYERS ASSOCIATION WILL BE FIGHTING IT EVERY STEP OF THE WAY.

I'M ALSO PROUD TO HAVE INTRODUCED THE MOST SWEEPING DEREGULATORY BILL IN MEMORY. THIS LEGISLATION WOULD REQUIRE MAJOR REGULATIONS-- THOSE WITH A \$50 MILLION IMPACT ON THE ECONOMY--TO UNDERGO A COST-BENEFIT ANALYSIS BEFORE THEY GO INTO EFFECT.

JUST AS IMPORTANT, THIS BILL WILL BEGIN A PROCESS THAT ENSURES THAT WE STOP USING THE MOST ABSURD SCENARIO POSSIBLE WHEN EVALUATING RISKS TO HUMAN HEALTH AND SAFETY.

WE NEED TO INJECT REALISM INTO THE RISK ASSESSMENT PROCESS. **MY LEGISLATION ALSO CONTAINS A PROVISION THAT WILL** ALLOW FOR REVIEW OF EXISTING RULES. WE DON'T JUST WANT TO PREVENT MISTAKES IN THE FUTURE--WE ALSO WANT TO REIN IN GOVERNMENT TODAY. AND WE'LL BE LOOKING AT HEALTH CARE REFORM. BUT

**INSTEAD OF LOCKING OUT** BUSINESSES FROM THE LEGISLATIVE PROCESS, WE'LL BE ASKING FOR YOUR IDEAS. I HOPE THAT ALL OF YOU SAW THE NEW YORK TIMES ARTICLE FROM LAST WEEK THAT DETAILED HOW HEALTH COSTS PAID BY EMPLOYERS DROPPED FOR THE FIRST TIME IN A DECADE.

## THIS IS PROOF THAT THE MARKETPLACE IS WORKING TO RESTRAIN MEDICAL COSTS, AND THAT LEGISLATION LIKE THE CLINTON PROPOSAL OF LAST YEAR IS THE WRONG SOLUTION.

### PRESIDENTIAL

NOW LET ME TURN TO THE SECOND REASON I'M HERE TODAY.

## AND THAT'S THE FACT THAT WHILE THE MAYFLOWER IS A NICE PLACE TO MEET, I CAN THINK OF A BETTER PLACE.

AND TWO YEARS FROM NOW--IN FEBRUARY OF 1997--I THINK THIS MEETING SHOULD BE HELD IN THE WHITE HOUSE. AND I'D LIKE TO WELCOME YOU THERE. WHILE IT WON'T BE OFFICIAL UNTIL APRIL 10, I'LL LET YOU IN ON THE SECRET THAT I'M RUNNING FOR PRESIDENT. AND IF ANY OF YOU HAVE SOME EXTRA TIME ON YOUR HANDS, I WOULD LIKE YOUR SUPPORT.

I WOULD ESPECIALLY LIKE THE SUPPORT OF ALL THOSE WHO HAVE EMPLOYEES THAT LIVE IN NEW HAMPSHIRE.

MAKING THIS DECISION WAS A TWO-STEP PROCESS FOR ME. THE

FIRST OCCURRED LAST JUNE, AT THE CEREMONIES MARKING THE **ANNIVERSARY OF D-DAY, WHEN I RETURNED TO THE HILLS OF ITALY I** HAD CLIMBED NEARLY 50 YEARS **BEFORE, AS A PLATOON LEADER IN** THE 10TH MOUNTAIN DIVISION. AS I WALKED AND TALKED WITH **10TH MOUNTAIN VETERANS AND** THEIR FAMILIES, I THOUGHT ABOUT THE AMERICA OF OUR YOUTH...THE

**AMERICA WE RISKED OUR LIVES TO** PROTECT, AND ABOUT OUR HOPES FOR THE GENERATIONS WHO WOULD FOLLOW US. I DID A LOT OF THINKING THAT DAY, AND ON THE RETURN TRIP HOPE. AND I CONCLUDED THAT PERHAPS THERE WAS ONE MORE **MISSION...ONE MORE CALL TO** SERVE.

I THOUGHT I MIGHT HAVE SOMETHING THE COUNTRY NEEDS **RIGHT NOW IN HER PRESIDENT:** SOMEONE WHO KNOWS WHAT MADE AMERICA GREAT IN THE FIRST PLACE...SOMEONE WHO **KNOWS WHAT HAS BEEN** SACRIFICED TO KEEP US FREE...SOMEONE WHO WOULD DO **ALL IN HIS POWER TO LEAD AMERICA BACK TO**  HER PLACE IN THE SUN--AND WHO KNOWS THE WAY.

AND THE SECOND STEP IN THE **PROCESS CAME LAST NOVEMBER** 8TH. MAYBE I WAS HEARING A **MESSAGE I WANTED TO HEAR, BUT** IT SEEMED TO ME THE AMERICAN **PEOPLE WERE SAYING THAT** PRESIDENT CLINTON WAS STEERING **OUR COUNTRY IN THE WRONG** DIRECTION.

AND WHILE CHANGING **CONGRESS WAS A GOOD FIRST** STEP, WE'RE NOT GOING TO GET **AMERICA POINTED IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION UNTIL WE HAVE A** PRESIDENT WHO WILL WORK WITH THEM AND NOT AGAINST THEM. AND I HOPE THAT YOU WILL SEE ME AS SOMEONE WHO HAS THE **EXPERIENCE TO KNOW HOW TO GET** AMERICA TURNED AROUND, AND

## WHO HAS THE VISION TO LEAD IT IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.
