THANK YOU.

IT IS A PRIVILEGE TO BE HERE TONIGHT AND TO RECEIVE YOUR CONGRESSIONAL LEADERSHIP AWARD.

WHENEVER I'M ASKED TO MAKE REMARKS AFTER ACCEPTING AN AWARD, I TRY TO FOLLOW WHAT FRANKLIN ROOSEVELT CALLED THE "RULE OF 3

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B'S"-- BE BRIEF. BE SINCERE. BE SEATED.

I DO WANT, HOWEVER, TO TAKE A FEW MINUTES TO DISCUSS SOME ISSUES IMPORTANT TO AMERICA'S ECONOMY, AND IMPORTANT TO YOUR INDUSTRY.

THE THEME OF YOUR CONFERENCE THIS YEAR IS THAT THE INFORMATION **HIGHWAY IS "PAVED WITH SILICON."** THERE IS NO DOUBT THAT SEMICONDUCTORS--WHICH ARE THE **FNABLING TECHNOLOGY FOR THE \$500 BILLION U.S. ELECTRONICS INDUSTRY--ARE THE CRITICAL BUILDING BLOCKS FOR OUR MODERN INDUSTRIAL ECONOMY.**

COMPUTER CHIPS ARE NOT JUST IN COMPUTERS ANYMORE. THEY ARE IN CARS, TELEVISIONS, CELLULAR PHONES AND SATELLITES. I'VE EVEN STARTED TO THINK THAT IT'S A COMPUTER CHIP THAT KEEPS STROM THURMOND GOING SO STRONG.

TODAY, AMERICA STANDS ON THE THRESHOLD OF A NEW ERA. WHILE SOME SEE AMERICA'S POWER DWINDLING, I SEE IT GROWING. I SEE **OUR RENAISSANCE, AND ITS CALLED THE INFORMATION AGE. YEARS OF** LEADERSHIP IN TELECOMMUNICATIONS, WHETHER IT WAS INVENTING THE **TELEGRAPH OR THE MICROCHIP, GIVES US THE RIGHT TO LAY CLAIM TO THIS** FUTURE. WE HAVE EARNED IT. WE MUST NOW REACH OUT AND TAKE IT.

MUCH REMAINS TO BE DONE, BUT THE SENATE IS PREPARING TO DO JUST THAT. AS I HAVE SAID BEFORE, TELECOM REFORM WILL BE THE REAL JOBS STIMULUS PACKAGE.

BUILDING THE NECESSARY INFRASTRUCTURE WILL REQUIRE THOUSANDS OF PRIVATE SECTOR JOBS. AND THAT WILL BARELY SCRATCH THE

SURFACE OF THE MILLIONS OF NEW JOBS CREATED AS A RESULT OF EASIER ACCESS TO INFORMATION. JOBS THAT WILL MAKE AMERICA MORE EFFICIENT, MORE PRODUCTIVE, AND ULTIMATELY MORE POWERFUL.

LOOKING BACK ON CONGRESS'S TRACK RECORD, A CASUAL OBSERVER WOULD THINK THAT WE HAVE A GRUDGE

AGAINST THE COMMUNICATIONS INDUSTRY. FORTUNATELY, THIS IMAGE IS CHANGING AND REPUBLICANS ARE GLAD TO SEE THAT TRADITIONAL "PRO-REGULATORS" ARE FINALLY COMING AROUND TO OUR COMPETITIVE WAY OF THINKING.

WE MUST DEVELOP FLEXIBLE

POLICY THAT WILL ACCOMMODATE THE EXPLOSION OF NEW TECHNOLOGY. THAT POLICY, OF COURSE, IS PROMOTING COMPETITION. IT WOULD BE IRRESPONSIBLE, HOWEVER, TO BELIEVE THAT WE CAN DO ANYTHING MORE.

NO ONE KNOWS THE BENEFITS OF FREE AND OPEN COMPETITION BETTER THAN THE COMPUTER AND SEMI-

CONDUCTOR INDUSTRIES. JUST TAKE A LOOK AT A FEW OF THE PLAYERS IN THE U.S. COMMUNICATIONS INDUSTRY.

LAST YEAR, THE COMPUTER INDUSTRY EARNED REVENUES CLOSE TO \$360 BILLION. TWO THINGS ARE AMAZING ABOUT THAT FIGURE. FIRST, IT IS TWICE THE TELEPHONE INDUSTRY'S

REVENUES. AND SECOND, REVENUES FROM THE PERSONAL COMPUTER INDUSTRY, WHICH FOR ALL INTENTS AND PURPOSES WAS NON-EXISTENT IN 1980, ACCOUNT FOR ALMOST HALF OF THAT FIGURE. IN OTHER WORDS, REVENUES IN PERSONAL COMPUTERS HAVE GROWN AS **MUCH IN 14 YEARS AS THE ENTIRE TELEPHONE INDUSTRY DID IN 100.**

IT ISN'T TOO DIFFICULT TO FIGURE OUT THAT THE COMPUTER INDUSTRY BENEFITTED FROM FIERCE COMPETITION AND MINIMAL GOVERNMENT REGULATION. PHONE COMPANIES DID NOT.

CABLE TV ALSO EXPLODED AFTER IT WAS DE-REGULATED IN 1984. AT THAT TIME, ITS REVENUES WERE \$7.8

BILLION AND IT EMPLOYED 67,381 PERSONS. FAST-FORWARD TO 1992. **REVENUES TRIPLED AND EMPLOYMENT** NUMBERS JUMPED TO 108,280. WHILE THESE NUMBERS ARE ALSO GOOD, I WOULD SUGGEST THAT THE CABLE TV **INDUSTRY WOULD HAVE DONE MUCH** BETTER IF IT HAD FACED COMPETITION. **MORE IMPORTANTLY, I WOULD SUGGEST** THAT THERE WOULD NOT HAVE BEEN

THE ABUSES WHICH PROMPTED

CONGRESS TO ENACT RE-REGULATION IN 1992.

YOURS IS ALSO AN INDUSTRY THAT HAS SUCCEEDED IN INTERNATIONAL COMPETITION, OVERCOMING TREMENDOUS OBSTACLES. UNLIKE MANY OTHER AMERICAN BUSINESSES, YOU HAVE SUCCESSFULLY

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RECAPTURED THE WORLDWIDE MARKET LEAD FROM YOUR JAPANESE **COMPETITORS, HOLDING 43 PERCENT OF** A MORE THAN \$100 BILLION WORLD **MARKET IN 1994. YOUR SUCCESS** HOLDS SOME IMPORTANT LESSONS FOR **U.S. GOVERNMENT AND INDUSTRY** LEADERS.

FIRST AND FOREMOST, FOREIGN

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MARKETS MUST BE OPEN. YOU CAN'T GET MARKET SHARE WITHOUT MARKET ACCESS. AS WAS REPEATEDLY NOTED DURING OUR DEBATES ON NAFTA AND GATT, THE UNITED STATES HAS THE MOST OPEN MARKET IN THE WORLD.

LOOK AT LAST YEAR'S \$166 BILLION TRADE DEFICIT. NAFTA OPENED UP MEXICO'S MARKET FOR OUR GOODS,

AND GATT MADE SOME IMPROVEMENTS IN THE WORLD TRADING SYSTEM LIKE **PROTECTING INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY RIGHTS AND BEGINNING TO IMPOSE DISCIPLINE ON OUR TRADING PARTNERS'** AGRICULTURE SUBSIDIES. WORLDWIDE TARIFFS WERE REDUCED BY OVER A THIRD.

YET, SIGNIFICANT PROBLEMS

REMAIN. WE CONTINUE TO RUN HUGE TRADE DEFICITS WITH JAPAN -- \$66 BILLION LAST YEAR. EUROPE CONTINUES TO IMPOSE HIGH TARIFFS ON KEY U.S. ELECTRONICS EXPORTS LIKE SEMICONDUCTORS. AND DESPITE THE **RECENT AGREEMENT ON INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY PROTECTION, CHINA REMAINS** A WORRY, ESPECIALLY AS IT SEEKS TO JOIN THE NEW WORLD TRADE

ORGANIZATION WITHOUT FIRST FULLY

REFORMING ITS ECONOMIC POLICIES.

LET ME ALSO ADD THAT I KNOW THIS INDUSTRY HAS BEEN ADVOCATING FASTER DEPRECIATION OF SEMICONDUCOR MANUFACTURING EQUIPMENT. I SUPPORT EFFORTS TO ENSURE THAT THE TAX DEPRECIATION RULES ACCURATELY REFLECT THE

USEFUL LIFE OF BUSINESS EQUIPMENT, AND WOULD URGE YOU, AS I URGED PETE WILSON, TO CONTINUE TO WORK WITH SENATOR PACKWOOD.

AMERICA IS AT THE CROSS ROADS. TELECOMMUNICATIONS REFORM WILL CHANGE THE HISTORY OF AMERICA FOREVER. BUT LET'S NOT FOOL OURSELVES. IF WE GET IT WRONG, IT

WILL BE THE MOST DESTRUCTIVE PIECE OF LEGISLATION PASSED IN OUR NATION'S HISTORY. AS I SEE IT, THE MOST IMPORTANT QUESTION WE MUST ASK OURSELVES IS, "WHO WILL DECIDE THE COMMUNICATIONS INDUSTRY'S FUTURE."

UNDER THE CLINTON ADMINISTRATION, GOVERNMENT

BUREAUCRATS WILL DECIDE. I SAY WE ALLOW THE REAL TECHNICAL EXPERTS, YOUR EMPLOYEES, DECIDE. IT SEEMS TO ME THAT THE SPECIALISTS IN THE FIELD WILL DO A FAR BETTER JOB FOR THEIR COMPANIES AND FOR OUR COUNTRY IF BIG GOVERNMENT LEAVES THEM ALONE.

I, FOR ONE, CANNOT ALLOW

GOVERNMENT TO BECOME THE BIGGEST PLAYER IN THE TELECOMMUNICATIONS INDUSTRY. TOO MUCH IS AT STAKE. IT IS NONSENSE TO GAMBLE AWAY MILLIONS OF NEW JOBS. IT IS **NONSENSE TO GAMBLE AWAY** AMERICA'S ABILITY TO COMPETE, AND WIN, AROUND THE WORLD. AND IT IS **NONSENSE TO GAMBLE AWAY THE SPOILS THAT THE INFORMATION AGE**

WILL BRING.

I HOPE THAT AMERICAN BUSINESS AGREES AND WILL HELP US FIGHT FOR A **PRO-COMPETITIVE, DE-REGULATORY BILL.** IT IS ONLY THEN THAT WE CAN CLOSE THE GAPS THAT CURRENTLY FACE CONGRESS. AND IT IS ONLY THEN THAT WE CAN MAKE AMERICA'S RENAISSANCE A REALITY.
