SENATOR BOB DOLE REMARKS PREPARED FOR DELIVERY WINGATE COLLEGE COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES MAY 6, 1995

THANK YOU, PRESIDENT MCGEE, AND THE CLASS OF 1995 FOR INVITING ME HERE TODAY.

WHILE THIS IS MY FIRST VISIT TO YOUR BEAUTIFUL CAMPUS, I HAVE HEARD A GREAT DEAL ABOUT IT FROM TWO PEOPLE. THE FIRST IS MY WIFE, WHO WAS BORN AND RAISED DOWN THE ROAD IN SALISBURY.

ELIZABETH WANTED TO BE HERE TODAY, AND SUGGESTED THAT WHILE I WAS GIVING THIS SPEECH, SHE COULD BE OUT IN THE AUDIENCE COLLECTING BLOOD. I TOLD HER THAT GIVEN YOU'RE ALL WEARING GOWNS, THAT MIGHT BE A BIT MESSY, SO SHE DECIDED TO STAY HOME.

I HAVE ALSO HEARD OF WINGATE'S EXCELLENCE FROM YOUR SENIOR SENATOR AND MY GOOD FRIEND, JESSE HELMS.

MANY OF YOU KNOW THAT WINGATE PLAYED AN IMPORTANT ROLE IN THE LIFE AND CAREER OF SENATOR HELMS. UPON HIS GRADUATION FROM HIGH SCHOOL, JESSE'S FAMILY COULD NOT AFFORD TO SEND HIM TO COLLEGE. THE THEN-PRESIDENT OF THIS COLLEGE WENT TO JESSE'S HOME AND SAID THEY WANTED HIM AT WINGATE, AND THAT HE DIDN'T HAVE TO WORRY ABOUT MONEY.

AND WHEN THE TIME CAME FOR SENATOR HELMS TO DESIGNATE A HOME FOR THE PAPERS THAT HAVE ACCUMULATED DURING HIS REMARKABLE PUBLIC SERVICE CAREER, HE REMEMBERED THE COLLEGE THAT GAVE HIM A START, AND THE PAPERS CAME TO THE JESSE HELMS CENTER HERE IN THE CITY OF WINGATE.

I DID TELL JESSE THAT A FEW KANSAS INSTITUTIONS HAVE EXPRESSED INTEREST IN MY PAPERS FOR A SENATORIAL LIBRARY, BUT I'VE TOLD THEM TO WAIT AWHILE, SINCE I'M STILL HOPING THERE MIGHT BE A NEED FOR A PRESIDENTIAL LIBRARY.

WHEN PRESIDENT MCGEE ASKED ME TO SPEAK TODAY, HE SUGGESTED THAT I SHARE A FEW WORDS OF ADVICE ABOUT THE "REAL WORLD." THAT LED ME TO WONDER WHAT MANY OF YOU ARE PROBABLY WONDERING. SINCE I LIVE AND WORK IN WASHINGTON, D.C., WHAT DO I KNOW ABOUT THE "REAL WORLD?"

HE ALSO TOLD ME THAT WINGATE WAS BEGINNING THE CELEBRATION OF ITS CENTENNIAL, AND I SUGGESTED THAT HE MAY WANT TO INVITE SOMEONE WHO WAS IN THE SENATE WHEN WINGATE WAS FOUNDED A CENTURY AGO--OUR COLLEAGUE, SENATOR STROM THURMOND.

SERIOUSLY, I DO HAVE A FEW THOUGHTS ABOUT AMERICA AND YOUR ROLE IN ITS FUTURE, AND I WANT TO ASSURE YOU THAT MY REMARKS WILL

BE BRIEF. I KNOW THAT A FEW OF YOU WANT TO HAVE TIME TO MAKE ONE LAST TRIP TO "THE SCOREBOARD."

AND I'VE ALWAYS KEPT IN MIND A STORY THAT PRESIDENT BUSH ONCE TOLD ABOUT A COMMENCEMENT SPEAKER AT YALE UNIVERSITY. THE SPEAKER WENT ON FOR AN HOUR AND A HALF, DETAILING HOW "Y" STANDS FOR YOUTH, "A" STANDS FOR ACTION, "L STANDS FOR LOYALTY, AND "E" STANDS FOR EXCELLENCE.

ABOUT THE TIME HE GOT TO "E," ONE OF THE GRADUATES BOWED HIS HEAD IN PRAYER. AND THE GRADUATE NEXT TO HIM ASKED WHAT HE WAS PRAYING ABOUT. AND HE SAID, "I'M GIVING THANKS TO THE LORD THAT I DIDN'T GO TO THE MASSACHUSETTS INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY."

I DO WANT TO NOTE THAT THIS IS A DOUBLY IMPORTANT DAY FOR THE PARENTS OF THE CLASS OF 1995. FOR NOT ONLY DOES TODAY MARK THE END OF WINGATE TUITION BILLS, BUT, ACCORDING TO THE NATIONAL TAX FOUNDATION, IT IS ALSO "TAX FREEDOM DAY."

IN OTHER WORDS, EVERYTHING THE AVERAGE AMERICAN HAS MADE FROM JANUARY 1 UNTIL MAY 6 PAYS LOCAL, STATE, AND FEDERAL TAX BILLS. FINALLY, BEGINNING TODAY, YOU CAN WORK FOR YOURSELF AND YOUR FAMILY.

I'M NOT HERE TODAY TO TALK POLITICS, BUT I DO WANT TO SAY THAT IF SENATOR HELMS, MYSELF, AND THE REPUBLICAN CONGRESS HAVE ANYTHING TO DO WITH IT, "TAX FREEDOM DAY" WILL BE MOVING A LOT CLOSER TO THE BEGINNING OF THE CALENDAR.

NO MATTER WHAT THE DAY, IT HAS BEEN THE PEOPLE WHO WORK HARD AND WHO QUIETLY PAY THEIR TAXES THAT HAVE MADE AMERICA WHAT IT IS TODAY: THE LEADER OF THE FREE WORLD, AND THE GREATEST NATION IN THE WORLD.

WE HEAR ALL TOO OFTEN THESE DAYS FROM THOSE WHO SAY THAT AMERICA HAS NO MORE HEROES. THEY LOOK BACK TO THE HEROES OF MY YOUTH, AND WONDER WHERE ALL THE FRANKLIN ROOSEVELTS, THE LOU GEHRIGS, AND THE DWIGHT EISENHOWERS HAVE GONE TODAY.

AND MY RESPONSE TO THEM IS THAT THEY ARE NOT LOOKING HARD ENOUGH. BECAUSE, IN MY BOOK, YOU DON'T NEED TO LOOK TO HEARING ROOMS, THE BATTLEFIELD, OR THE BASEBALL DIAMOND TO FIND HEROES. THE FACT IS YOU CAN FIND THEM LIVING QUIETLY IN EVERY COMMUNITY IN AMERICA.

IN FACT, THE TWO GREATEST HEROES I EVER KNEW WERE MY PARENTS. MY FATHER RAN A CREAM AND EGG STATION IN RUSSELL, KANSAS. HE NEVER MISSED A DAY OF WORK IN FORTY YEARS, AND HIS WORKDAYS BEGAN AT SIX IN THE MORNING, AND RARELY ENDED BEFORE SUNDOWN. MY MOTHER WATCHED OVER FOUR CHILDREN, AND FOUND TIME TO SELL SEWING MACHINES DOOR TO DOOR.

THEY TOOK AN INTEREST IN COMMUNITY AFFAIRS, NATIONAL EVENTS, AND THEY VOTED IN EVERY ELECTION. THEY TAUGHT US TO TAKE PRIDE IN A JOB WELL DONE, AND THEY TAUGHT US THAT THERE WAS A BIG DIFFERENCE BETWEEN RIGHT AND WRONG. AND THEY PASSED ON TO THEIR CHILDREN THE VALUES THAT BUILT THIS COUNTRY. VALUES OF HARD WORK, HONESTY, DECENCY, PERSONAL RESPONSIBILITY, AND COMPASSION FOR THOSE IN NEED.

SOME WOULD SAY THIS WAS AN ORDINARY STORY, AND, YES, IT WAS AND IS A STORY THAT IS REPEATED AGAIN AND AGAIN BY FAMILIES ACROSS AMERICA, INCLUDING YOURS.

BUT SO-CALLED ORDINARY LIVES MAKE HEROIC CONTRIBUTIONS TO OUR COUNTRY. AND MY PARENTS, LIKE OTHERS BEFORE AND SINCE, AND LIKE MANY PARENTS HERE TODAY, SET AN EXAMPLE THAT WE DESPERATELY NEED TODAY.

BECAUSE IN TOO MANY CORNERS OF OUR COUNTRY, THE VALUES THAT BUILT AMERICA ARE HARD TO FIND.

WE HAVE VIOLENCE IN OUR STREETS AND PEOPLE WHO ARE AFRAID TO LEAVE THEIR HOMES AT NIGHT.

WE HAVE A WELFARE SYSTEM THAT PROVIDES DISINCENTIVES FOR WORK, AND INCENTIVES FOR CHILDREN HAVING CHILDREN.

WE HAVE CRIME IN OUR SCHOOLS, BUT NO ROOM FOR VOLUNTARY PRAYER.

ADDITIONALLY, WHERE OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS ONCE TAUGHT THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN RIGHT AND WRONG, AND THE NEED TO BE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR OWN ACTIONS. TODAY, HOWEVER, THAT IS NO LONGER "POLITICALLY CORRECT."

INSTEAD, IT IS FASHIONABLE TO SAY THAT NO ACTIONS ARE "WRONG," AS LONG AS YOU BELIEVE IN THEM SINCERELY, OR AS LONG AS YOU CAN BLAME SOMEONE OTHER THAN YOURSELF. EVERY PARENT ALSO KNOWS THAT AN EVEN GREATER THREAT TO OUR VALUES IS THE WAY OUR POPULAR CULTURE RIDICULES THEM. OUR MUSIC, MOVIES AND ADVERTISING REGULARLY PUSH THE LIMITS OF DECENCY, BOMBARDING OUR CHILDREN WITH DESTRUCTIVE MESSAGES OF CASUAL VIOLENCE AND EVEN MORE CASUAL SEX.

GIVEN ALL THIS, PERHAPS IT SHOULDN'T COME AS A SURPRISE THAT LESS THAN HALF OF AMERICA'S PARENTS THINK THEIR CHILDREN'S STANDARD OF LIFE WILL BE BETTER THAN THEIRS. AND MORE THAN THREE-QUARTERS THINK THAT OVER THE NEXT TEN YEARS THE AMERICAN DREAM WILL BE HARDER TO ACHIEVE.

I BELIEVE THE MOST IMPORTANT CHALLENGE FACING YOUR GENERATION IS ONE YOU SHOULD ENJOY--PROVING THAT YOUR PARENTS ARE WRONG.

YOU MUST SEE TO IT THAT OUR STANDARD OF LIFE INCREASES. AND YOU MUST PUT THE AMERICAN DREAM IN REACH FOR MORE AMERICANS. IN DOING SO, YOU WILL NOT ONLY PROVE YOUR PARENTS WRONG, YOU WILL ALSO ENSURE THAT AMERICA REMAINS THE LEADER OF THE FREE WORLD.

GOVERNMENT CAN HELP IN THIS MISSION. WE CAN HELP BY TACKLING THE DEFICIT, LOWERING TAXES, REDUCING REGULATIONS AND RED TAPE, RETURNING POWER TO THE STATES AND TO THE PEOPLE, AND JUST GENERALLY GETTING UNCLE SAM'S NOSE OUT OF PLACES WHERE IT DOESN'T BELONG.

BUT MUCH OF THE WORK WILL REMAIN WHERE IT ALWAYS HAS--ON THE SHOULDERS OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE.

IT IS ONLY YOU WHO CAN VOTE THE RIGHT PEOPLE INTO OFFICE, OR RUN FOR OFFICE, YOURSELF.

IT IS ONLY YOU WHO CAN RUN THE ORGANIZATIONS THAT MAKE OUR COMMUNITIES SING--THE PTA'S, THE SCHOOL BOARDS, THE LIONS CLUB, THE LOCAL RED CROSS CHAPTER.

IT IS ONLY YOU WHO INSTILL YOUR CHILDREN WITH TIMELESS AMERICAN VALUES.

IT IS ONLY YOU WHO CAN INSIST THAT OUR SCHOOLS TEACH THOSE VALUES, AS WELL.

IT IS ONLY YOU WHO, THROUGH YOUR ACTIONS, CAN CONVINCE HOLLYWOOD THAT ENOUGH IS ENOUGH.

IT IS ONLY YOU, WHO, THROUGH SEEMINGLY ORDINARY ACTIONS, CAN CONTINUE TO WRITE THE HEROIC HISTORY OF OUR COUNTRY. I AM CONFIDENT THAT YOU WILL MEET THAT CHALLENGE. AND I AM ESPECIALLY CONFIDENT THAT WINGATE GRADUATES WILL HELP TO LEAD THE WAY.

YOU ARE FORTUNATE TO HAVE BEEN EDUCATED AT A COLLEGE THAT LIVES BY ITS MOTTO--"FAITH, KNOWLEDGE, SERVICE." EVERY STUDENT HERE IS REQUIRED TO TAKE A COURSE IN ETHICS, AND HUNDREDS OF YOU HAVE REACHED OUT TO OTHERS THROUGH WINGATE'S UNITED COLLEGIATE ACTION NETWORK, WHICH WAS NAMED A "POINT OF LIGHT" BY PRESIDENT BUSH.

I LEAVE YOU TODAY BY NOTING THAT ON MONDAY, WE WILL MARK THE 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF "VE" DAY. A LITTLE OVER HALF A CENTURY AGO, STUDENTS IN HIGH SCHOOL AND COLLEGE GRADUATIONS ACROSS THE COUNTRY WERE TRADING IN THEIR CAPS AND GOWNS FOR MILITARY UNIFORMS. MANY WERE SENT OVERSEAS, AND MANY WOULD NEVER COME HOME AGAIN.

AND AS YOUR GENERATION TAKES UP THE BURDENS OF LEADERSHIP--WHICH HOPEFULLY WILL NEVER INVOLVE GOING TO WAR--PERHAPS YOU WILL REMEMBER THE WORDS ON A MEMORIAL IN A JUNGLE TOWN IN INDIA, WHICH HONORS THE ALLIED SOLDIERS WHO DIED CHECKING THE JAPANESE ADVANCE

INTO INDIA DURING WORLD WAR II.

HERE ARE THE WORDS ON THAT MEMORIAL: WHEN YOU GO HOME
TELL THEM OF US, AND SAY:
FOR YOUR TOMORROW,
WE GAVE OUR TODAY.

MY WISH FOR YOU IS THAT FIFTY YEARS FROM NOW, THE COUNTLESS ORDINARY TODAYS OF YOUR LIVES, WILL HAVE RESULTED IN A HEROIC TOMORROW FOR AMERICA. THANK YOU, CONGRATULATIONS, AND BEST OF LUCK.

ACADEMIC REGALIA

The formal academic dress worn today originated more than 600 years ago when a warm gown and hood were useful for the scholar and cleric in unheated buildings. The gown set the student apart from fellow citizens. After the Civil War, most American students wore caps and gowns daily while in residence. Today, the lining of the hood carries the colors of the institution which granted the degree. The border of the hood indicates the academic discipline in which the degree was earned: white, arts and letters; scarlet, theology; purple, law; dark blue, philosophy; yellow, science; pink, music; light brown, business; light blue, education; citron yellow, social work; et cetera. The mortarboard of the bachelors and masters carries the black tassel, and the gold tassel is reserved for holders of doctoral degrees.

THE MACE

This symbol of authority has been adopted by institutions to mark the importance of their most traditional ceremonies, including commencement. Ceremonial maces trace their history to antiquity where the mace was a unique weapon because it was not meant to slay an opponent, only to remove him from battle.

The Wingate College Mace was designed and handcrafted by North Carolina artisans and used for the first time at the inauguration of the College's thirteenth president. The mace shows the cross, the lamp of learning and the wreath of olive branches. Together they represent the motto of the college, the cross of faith, the lamp of knowledge and the olive branches of service. Wingate College was established and built on an uncompromising belief in the importance and interdependence of these three essentials of education.

Irwin Belk

The values of hard work, education, community responsibility and faith are exemplified in the life of Irwin Belk. The son of William Henry and Mary Irwin Belk, one of six children, Irwin Belk has spent a lifetime building on the legacy of his parents by devoting his energies to family, to commerce and to church and community, even to public service with terms as both state representative and state senator.

As officer and director of the Belk Group of Stores and President of the Belk Asheville Group of Stores, Mr. Belk has been a leader in the growth of retailing in this region. As Chairman of the Board of Monroe Hardware Company he has been an integral part of that company's expansion into a leading wholesaler of hardware products. His business skills and wisdom have been much sought after over the years as Mr. Belk has served on the boards of a number of corporations engaged in insurance, financial operations and manufacturing.

But it is his philanthropy which most distinguishes Irwin Belk, including his current post as State Chairman of the US Olympic Committee. A former president of the North Carolina Cancer Society, today Mr. Belk is a director of the House of Delegates of the American Cancer Society. He is a former district governor of the Lions Clubs and former president of the Charlotte Central Lions Club. He is a member of the board of the Charlotte Symphony and of the North Carolina Merchants Association, and he is an active member of Myers Park Presbyterian Church where he has served as elder. All of these groups have greatly benefited from the involvement of Irwin Belk.

As a friend of students Irwin Belk has given years of leadership to higher education in the Carolinas. He has served with distinction as a trustee or advisor to numerous colleges, universities and medical centers including Wingate College.

Beyond time, Irwin Belk has given generous resources to assist these institutions and many others as they in turn serve young people. Notable among these gifts is the Carol Grotnes Belk Residence Hall at Wingate. This hall has been a comfortable home away from home for women students since it was dedicated in honor of Mrs. Belk in September of 1966. Since the beginning of the 1980's, Irwin Belk Scholarships have been awarded to Wingate's very finest scholars, recognizing both their academic excellence and the personal qualities of high moral standards, cooperative spirit and enthusiasm which fit them for leadership as students and for the future. Belk Scholars continually provide dividends on Irwin Belk's wise investment in their potential as students and as people. They have been able to take their place of service and leadership in careers and in their own community because of the opportunity for quality education opened to them by Irwin Belk.

For his devotion to good, for his concern for others, particularly the young, for his life example, Wingate College awards Irwin Belk the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

From its establishment in 1895 and its opening in 1896 Wingate has been characterized by its dedication to an educational experience which encompasses academic excellence, the highest standards of morality and service to others.

The earliest voices of our past, concerned parents and church leaders sacrificed to open the Wingate School. Today, we are poised for the start of a second century. As ever, Wingate is blessed with the presence of visionaries. Building on our past, we look forward to new challenges. Our responsibility has never been greater as we prepare Wingate graduates for their places of leadership in a world which is both complex and changing.

It is to those graduates, our alumni and those who will come after them, that Wingate pledges itself. We are determined to continue our pursuit of excellence in all things. Just as we expect our alumni to make us proud with their accomplishments, we want them to take pride in Wingate as it turns vision into reality for students in the next century.
